JOINT MEETING OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS FOR THE METROPOLITAN TRANSIT SYSTEM (MTS), SAN DIEGO TRANSIT CORPORATION (SDTC), AND SAN DIEGO TROLLEY, INC. (SDTI)

January 26, 2006

MINUTES

1. Roll Call

Chairman Mathis called the meeting to order at 9:04 a.m. A roll call sheet listing Board member attendance is attached.

2. Approval of Minutes

Mr. Young moved to approve the minutes of the January 12, 2006, Board of Directors meeting. Mr. Emery seconded the motion, and the vote was 10 to 0 in favor.

3. Public Comments

Chuck Lungerhausen: Mr. Lungerhausen thanked Board members for their support of his fundraising efforts on behalf of MTS and requested their donations for this year's MS Walk. He stated that last year he placed 33 out of 50 fundraisers in the county. He also thanked Board members for their previous support in paving the way for people with Multiple Sclerosis to swim at the Mission Beach Plunge. Mr. Lungerhausen then went on to express support for the future purchase of trolley cars with advanced technology and asked that the new S70 cars not be "dumbed down" to facilitate compatibility with older trolley cars.

Clive Richard: Mr. Richard complimented staff on the new route maps that have been developed and stated that they are a vast improvement over the old maps.

Don Stillwell: He stated that he did not believe Route No. 14 is meeting Americans Disabilities (ADA) requirements. He stated that ADA considers hospitals to be major activity centers that must be served. He also indicated that "path of travel" includes a continuous, unobstructed way of pedestrian passage to the entrance of the facility. He stated that the crossing at Mission Gorge Road does not meet this criterion. He also stated that there should be connections between the Green Line and the eastbound Route No. 14 and that the Grantville Trolley Station should be a designated transfer point. He then stated that the Comprehensive Operational Analysis should be implemented in a way that would improve connections between buses and between buses and the Trolley. He also suggested that the Route No 14 delay its departure for

three minutes to allow transfer between the Green Line and the Eastbound No. 14 at Rio Vista. Mr. Mathis stated that staff is preparing a written response to address Mr. Stillwell's concerns.

Welcome of New Primary Board Member

Chairman Mathis welcomed Mr. Fred McLean, who is now a primary Board member representing Imperial Beach.

4. MTS: Nominations and Elections for 2006 MTS Committees and Outside Agency Appointments (LEG 410, PC 50101)

The Board was advised that the following procedure would be followed for this agenda item: The agenda item would be opened, a report would be given by the Ad Hoc Nominating Committee, and then nominations would be entertained from the floor. If nominations are made from the floor, that particular group would be pulled and voted on separately from the rest of the slate. Chairman Mathis advised the Board that members could not vote for themselves. He stated that the nominations would be voted for in a block, and each Board member's vote would be registered as an abstention where the vote is for that particular Board member. In response to a question from Mr. Maienschein, General Counsel Tiffany Lorenzen stated that, during on her research, she did not find anything in the Political Reform Act that requires Board members to leave the room during voting.

Mr. Ewin pointed out that no alternates are on the proposed slate. Ms. Lorenzen pointed out that Policy No. 22 - Rules Of Procedure For The Metropolitan Transit Development Board, which was revised and approved at the January 12, 2006 Board meeting, sets forth who will serve as alternates for committee appointments; e.g. each board member's alternate on the Board will serve as that Board member's alternate for any Committee assignments as well. Ms. Lorenzen pointed out that the SANDAG SR-671/125 Policy Advisory Committee has been disbanded, and therefore the nominations for that Committee are being withdrawn from the slate.

Action Taken

Mr. Cox moved to receive the proposed nominations for 2006 MTS committees and outside agency appointments and elect and appoint those representatives as nominated by the Ad Hoc Nominating Committee and outlined in Attachment A of the agenda item. Mr. Emery seconded the motion. Mr. Maienschein voted to nominate Mr. Young to the Budget Committee. Ms. Atkins seconded that motion.

Ms. Lorenzen reported the following:

On Item 5a, the Board received a report from staff and gave direction to staff.

CONSENT ITEMS

6. MTS: San Diego State University Station (SDSU) - Trolley Radio Enhancement (CIP 10426.9)

Recommend that the Board of Directors (1) find, by a 2/3 vote, that there is only a single source of procurement and that the purchase is for the sole purpose of duplicating equipment that is already in use, therefore authorizing the purchase to be made without the necessity for competitive bidding; (2) authorize the CEO to execute a contract with Aerial Facilities Limited to procure the equipment under a sole-source finding, in substantially the same form as shown in Attachment A of the agenda item, in an amount not to exceed \$129,320; (3) authorize the CEO to execute a task order with Bearcom Wireless to install the equipment, in substantially the same form as shown on Attachment B of the agenda item, in an amount not to exceed \$5,031.19; (4) approve a 10 percent construction contingency in an amount not to exceed \$13,450; and (5) approve a budget transfer of \$90,000 from the Fare Collection line item to the Communication line item.

7. SDTI: Light Rail Vehicle Coupler Procurement – Contract Award (OPS 970.2)

Recommend that the Board of Directors (1) find by a 2/3 vote that Voith Turbo, Inc. is the sole-source supplier for SD100 light rail vehicle coupler parts; and (2) authorize the President/General Manager to execute a Standard Procurement Agreement (Attachment A of the agenda item) with Voith Turbo, Inc. to supply one new electrical head with cables and one new mechanical head for a total cost not to exceed \$34,358.41 including tax.

8. MTS: Proposed Amendments to Board Policy No. 44 – Travel Expenses (ADM 110.2, PC 50102)

That the Board of Directors approve the proposed revisions to Board Policy No 44 (Attachment A of the agenda item).

Recommended Consent Items

Mr. Mathis recognized Ms. Diane Eidam, SANDAG's recently hired Chief Deputy Director.

Mr. Jablonski referred to Consent Agenda Item No. 10 and stated that this agenda item details some noteworthy statistics as follows: Cumulative trolley ridership to Chargers games increased 51 percent from the 2004 season, a good portion of which is the result of the opening of the Green Line; revenue generated from manual ticket sales booths increased 40 percent; trolley ridership equaled about 23 percent of the gate and, with bus, MTS carried over 25 percent of the gate; and, single-game gate percentage was nearly 30 percent.

Mr. Young moved to approve Consent Agenda Item Nos. 6, 7, 8, 9 and 10. Mr. Emery seconded the motion, and the vote was 12 to 0 in favor.

DISCUSSION ITEMS

30. MTS: Legislative Update and Proposed Federal and State Legislative Goals (LEG 410, PC 50121)

Ms. Sharon Cooney, MTS Director of Government Affairs and Community Relations, provided the Board with an overview of federal and state legislation that was passed during 2005 and its impact on transit. She also reviewed FY 2006 Transportation-Treasury Appropriations. Ms. Cooney also reviewed efforts that MTS has made to influence the various infrastructure bond proposals that are being formulated by the state legislature and Governor Schwarzenegger. Ms. Cooney added that the bond proposals focus on commuter rail and have very little for transit. She stated that MTS is trying to negotiate allocations for transit or at least expanded definitions that would encompass transit. Ms. Cooney advised the Board that on a federal level, Representative Jerry Lewis, the new Appropriations Chair, wants to decrease the number of earmarks legislators can make and enter all requests in the Federal Register. Ms. Cooney also reported that the JCRT directed staff to develop a joint federal legislative program for 2006. She stated that it was decided to also develop a joint state legislative program.

Mr. Jablonski stated that he and staff have been very active over the past several weeks in trying to get the state's infrastructure bond issue to include a transit component; specifically in four broad categories – purchase or rehabilitation of rail cars, purchase of buses, rehabilitation of rail infrastructure, and safety and security. Mr. Monroe referred to a letter that was sent by North County Transit District to SANDAG regarding their funding needs and stated that transit should be unified in its approach to these matters with SANDAG. He did not feel that MTS and NCTD should be pursuing these issues separately. Ms. Cooney stated that there may be occasions when that will be a challenge. She added that MTS and NCTD have been working

very closely together to develop a package to give to SANDAG for the development of the Regional Transportation Plan (RTP). Mr. Jablonski pointed out that funding falls far short in making the RTP happen and even for existing services. Mr. Mathis added that the point is being made to elected officials that Proposition 42 funds have been diverted from their intended use for transportation until this year. Mr. Emery agreed that NCTD and MTS need to take a joint approach to these funding challenges, and SANDAG should be aware that transit stands together on this issue.

Mr. Ewin stressed the importance of keeping fellow council members informed about transit's funding challenges to ensure that transit's message can be clearly conveyed to SANDAG. Mr. Jablonski informed the Board that, at a recent SANDAG Policy Meeting, participants used an interactive polling process to rank the importance of projects all the way from beach-sand replenishment to transit. He stated that funding for transit ranked second only to general infrastructure in this exercise. He also reported that the maintenance of existing infrastructure ranked equally to investment in new infrastructure. He stated that this same exercise is on the agenda for the SANDAG Board Retreat with the full Board. He requested that Board members reiterate to any fellow council members that are attending the retreat that transit funding as a whole and specifically for infrastructure is needed and that both are vital to San Diego's whole transportation network. Mr. Jablonski stated that the SANDAG Board very much understands MTS's funding issues and agrees that there is work to be done. Ms. Cooney distributed copies of a memorandum addressed state legislators regarding the infrastructure bond. It was suggested that Board members provide copies of this memorandum to fellow council members. Mr. Jablonski stated that he would keep Board members informed as developments occur. Mr. Ewin stated that Board members could then pass that information to fellow council members.

Action Taken

Mr. Emery moved to (1) receive a report on 2005 legislative activities; (2) accept the proposed NCTD and MTS 2006 Federal Legislative Program; (3) accept the proposed NCTD and MTS 2006 State Legislative Program; and (4) authorize the CEO to direct MTS's Sacramento and Washington representatives to advocate the state and federal legislative programs. Mr. Monroe seconded the motion, and the vote was 12 to 0 in favor.

31. <u>MTS: Update on the Status of the Grossmont Trolley Station Joint Development Project</u> (LEG 460, PC 50101)

Ms. Lorenzen provided the Board with an update on the status of the Grossmont Trolley Station Joint Development Project. In particular, she reviewed the outstanding issues that will need to be resolved prior to the close of escrow. She reported that the California Department of Transportation (Caltrans) did not approve a waiver evaluation for the acquisition of the real property needed for the pedestrian bridge landing, so MTS is proceeding with a full appraisal process. She also reported that the San Diego and Arizona Eastern (SD&AE) Railway Company's January 24, 2006 meeting was cancelled. She added that, therefore, the granting of easements for the relocation of utility lines and construction of the drainage improvements in SD&AE right-of-way will not be handled until the next meeting, which is on February 15, 2006.

Mr. Ewin requested that he be provided with Fairfield Residential's list of target dates for the various steps in the project. In response to a question from Mr. Monroe, Ms. Lorenzen stated that utility work is scheduled to begin March 7, and construction can start at the beginning of

April. She advised the Board that everyone is working as expeditiously as they can, but there are elements of the project over which they have little or no control; e.g. lender review. Mr. Wesley Espinoza, Fairfield Residential, advised the Board that everyone is working hard to resolve all issues, which should maximize the chances of a speedy review and approval by the lender for the project. He stated that Fairfield is very motivated to move this project forward to ensure that they are not faced with increases in contractor pricing and interest and to keep their investor satisfied. Mr. Jablonski advised the Board that land-lease agreements are very complex and time consuming to handle, and MTS is using outside counsel to assist with the very thorough process MTS is going through. Ms. Hanson-Cox requested an update on this project at each Board meeting. In response to a question from Ms. Hanson-Cox, Mr. Jablonski stated that opportunistic parties ancillary to the project can interfere with the project's completion. In response to a question from Mr. Ewin, Mr. Espinoza stated that the entire project will not be complete until 2009. He stated that the two buildings, one on each side of the project, will be built one at a time and each will take 21 months to construct. Mr. Ewin distributed a list of tasks for the Grossmont Trolley Station Project.

Action Taken

Mr. Emery moved to (1) receive an update from General Counsel regarding the status of the Grossmont Trolley Station Joint Development Project; and (2) authorize the CEO to execute any and all easements, licenses, amendments, and/or agreements necessary to construct the project that will not be recorded on the parcel map, including, but not limited to, easements for utilities to San Diego Gas & Electric and the City of San Diego, and an amendment to an easement in favor of the American Automobile Association for landscaping and ingress/egress. Mr. Young seconded the motion, and the vote was 12 to 0 in favor.

32. <u>SDTC: Retirement Plan Actuarial Valuation Reporting Options</u> (OPS 960.5, PC 50601)

Mr. Cliff Telfer, MTS Interim Chief Financial Officer provided the Board with an overview of how San Diego Transit Corporation's (SDTC) retirement plan is monitored and the recommended options for reporting on the Plan's results. He reviewed factors affecting the funding status of the Plan, reports that are used for monitoring Plan assets; the tracking of liabilities, and the use of actuarial reports. Staff recommended (1) monthly and quarterly reports to the Executive Committee on investment returns, and quarterly reports to the Executive Committee on Plan liabilities; and (2) an annual actuarial valuation and investment performance report to the full Board. Chairman Mathis felt that reports on investment returns would be more meaningful if given quarterly rather than monthly.

Action Taken

Mr. Young moved to approve quarterly reports to the Executive Committee on investment returns and Plan liabilities and an annual actuarial valuation and investment performance report to the Board. Mr. Emery seconded the motion, and the vote was 12 to 0 in favor.

33. MTS: Recognition of Leon Williams (ADM 110, PC 50101)

Mr. Jablonski advised the Board that over 500 people will be attending the luncheon on Friday, January 27, 2006, honoring Mr. Leon Williams, former MTS Chair. He reviewed recent discussions of ways to commemorate Mr. Williams' many contributions within the community

and to MTS. He reviewed the concept discussed with the Executive Committee at its January 19 meeting to create a plaque at San Diego State University (SDSU) Station. This plaque would incorporate a likeness of Mr. Williams and would provide a history of his contributions to MTS and of his affiliation with SDSU. He reported that SDSU President Weber supports this concept. He stated that, if the Board agrees, an announcement could be made at the luncheon on January 27.

Mr. Young wholeheartedly supported the idea and stated that a bust of Mr. Williams should be part of the display. Mr. Emery stated that it is important that the display be placed in a prominent location and that Mr. Williams' accomplishments at the City, County, MTS, and SDSU be part of the display. He stated that thousands of people will see display every day. He also stated that Mr. Williams graduated from SDSU in 1949. Mr. Rindone also expressed his support and pointed out that Mr. Williams is the last of the original charter members of the Metropolitan Transit Development Board and also served as the Board's chair for 11 years. Mr. Monroe suggested that the plaque include recognition of Mr. Williams' wife, Margaret, for her unwavering support. Mr. Jablonski stated that a working group could be formed to secure funding, agree on a location, and develop a more specific proposal for Board approval.

Action Taken

Mr. Young moved to instruct the CEO to form a working group to develop a plan to dedicate the San Diego State University (SDSU) Station to former Chairman and Board Member Leon Williams. The dedication would include a visual display and a plaque commemorating Mr. Williams' achievements, and it would be located at an appropriate a highly visible location at the station. This dedication of the SDSU Station to Leon Williams would preclude honoring anyone else at the station, and the station name would remain the SDSU Station. A public announcement of the dedication would be made at Leon Williams' retirement luncheon on Friday, January 27. Ms. Atkins seconded the motion, and the vote was 12 to 0 in favor.

REPORT ITEMS

45. MTS: November Monthly Performance Indicators (OPS 920.1, 960.5, 970.5, PC 50451)

Ms. Anika Smart, MTS Associate Transportation Planner, provided the Board with an overview of November 2005 monthly performance indicators. She reviewed November's operating environment, system ridership, on-time performance, mean distance between failures for both trolley and bus, collision accidents for both bus and rail, and customer complaints. In response to a question from Mr. Monroe, Ms. Smart stated that the statistics for mean distance between failures includes only those occasions when there was an actual service disruption rather than just a bus replacement enroute.

Action Taken

Mr. Cox moved receive this report for information. Mr. Rindone seconded the motion, and the vote was 10 to 0 in favor.

60. Chairman's Report

There was no Chairman's Report.

61. Chief Executive Officer's Report

ASAC/COA: Mr. Jablonski called the Board's attention to the memorandum from the ASAC that was distributed before the meeting. He stated that they are very pleased with the outreach efforts made by MTS regarding the COA.

62. Board Member Communications

Leon Williams Luncheon: Mr. Rindone pointed out that the luncheon for Mr. Williams is being held at the San Diego Convention Center in Ballroom 20D with the reception at 11:30 a.m. and the lunch and program starting at noon.

63. Additional Public Comments on Items Not on the Agenda

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With all the discussion about saving money in bus operations, why is MTS proposing changes to bus routes #14 and #13 that are guaranteed to waste money?

I refer to the COA (Comprehensive Operational Analysis) that proposes the TRANSFER POINT for bus routes #14 and #13 at KAISER HOSPITAL bus stops instead of at GRANTVILLE Trolley Station.

Review the proposed maps from the COA and you will find the PROPOSED #14 route is designed to SKIP the GRANTVILLE Trolley Station and to connect to the PROPOSED #13 bus route at KAISER HOSPITAL bus stops. The #13 bus, instead of being terminated at GRANTVILLE Trolley Station continues to KAISER HOSPITAL for its connection to the #14 bus.

The PROPOSED COA for the #14 bus route is nearly identical to that portion of the #13 bus route that ran between FASHION VALLEY and SDSU along portions of FRIARS ROAD and included ZION Avenue and continued through the ALLIED GARDENS and NAVAJO communities that existed until July 10, 2005, when the GREEN LINE Trolley commenced operations through the GRANTVILLE Trolley Station. As with the current #14 bus route designed to SKIP the KAISER HOSPITAL bus stops and go directly to the GRANTVILLE Trolley Station, the PROPOSED #14 route is designed to SKIP the GRANTVILLE Trolley Station and connect to the #13 bus at KAISER HOSPITAL.

In order to do this, the #13 bus, scheduled for 15 minute operation under the PROPOSED COA, will be terminated at KAISER HOSPITAL. This will create 136 miles of unnecessary travel (4 trips each direction = 8 miles times 17 hours per day) over this one mile stretch of MISSION GORGE ROAD.

Using MTS estimate of \$20,000 per year to drive the current #14 bus around KAISER HOSPITAL about 0.5 miles, the estimate for this 136 miles of UNNECESSARY travel will exceed \$250,000 per year.

Who has reviewed this plan? The addition of a stop for the #14 bus at GRANTVILLE, the termination of the #13 route at GRANTVILLE, and the designation of GRANTVILLE Trolley Station as the TRANSFER POINT between bus routes 14 and 13 could save this estimated \$250,000 per year and it would REDUCE the bus traffic on this one mile stretch by 4 TRIPS EACH DIRECTION, EACH HOUR. Proposing 12 trips PER HOUR to the KAISER HOSPITAL Bus stops when 4 trips per hour will handle the traffic, is wasteful.

Returning to the CURRENT #14 bus route, the cost to give riders access to the KAISER HOSPITAL bus stops and transfer to the current #13 bus route plus access to the ALLIED GARDENS and NAVAJO communities pales in comparison.

Want to save money? Make the GRANTVILLE Trolley Station the bus transfer point on the COA PROPOSAL and add the KAISER HOSPITAL bus stops to the CURRENT #14 bus route in the interim until the PROPOSED COA goes into effect.

In order to really give the bus riders a quality service, will you delay the departure times of the #14 bus EASTBOUND from FASHION VALLEY and designate RIO VISTA as the TIME POINT in order to allow EASTBOUND GREEN LINE Trolley passengers an opportunity to transfer to the EASTBOUND #14 bus? I have included a proposed schedule to allow time for the transfer.

With the COA (Comprehensive Operational Analysis) meetings scheduled for March 2 and 9, 2006, I respectfully request timely written responses to my concerns over the current and proposed #14 and #13 bus routes and schedules.

RECOMMENDATION:

That the Board of Directors approve the purchase of the MTS Imperial Avenue Division (IAD) Compressed Natural Gas (CNG) fueling station from San Diego Gas & Electric (SDG&E) in the amount of \$376,701.

Budget Impact

A capital budget has been established in the amount of \$2,500,000 for the purchase of three CNG fueling stations. Two stations have been purchased with funds from this budget. The budget has a balance of \$627,961 that is sufficient for the purchase of the remaining IAD station.

DISCUSSION:

During the 1990s, SDG&E constructed three CNG facilities on MTS-owned bus properties, including the South Bay Maintenance Facility (SBMF), Kearny Mesa Division (KMD), and Imperial Avenue Division (IAD). The SBMF and KMD stations were SDG&E ratepayer-owned stations. The California Public Utilities Commission ruled that utility ratepayer ownership of fueling stations of this nature was no longer permissible. Therefore, it was negotiated that SDG&E would sell the two stations to MTS through ENRG Fuel USA, Inc. The purchase transaction for the two stations was completed on June 27, 2002.



The IAD CNG station is an SDG&E stockholder-owned facility. SDG&E no longer has interest in ownership of this station and wants to divest its interest on behalf its stockholders. Given that MTS owns two of the three stations and has remaining funds available to purchase the station, staff feels that it makes good business sense to purchase the station at this time.

ASSET PURCHASE AGREEMENT

This Asset Purchase Agreement (The Agreement) is entered into on day of
2006, by and among the Metropolitan Transit Development Board (MTDB), a
California public agency ("Buyer"), San Diego Gas and Electric (SDG&E), a California corporation
("Seller"), and solely with respect to Sections 1.2.b, 1.9.a, 8.5, and any other provisions related thereto
San Diego Transit Corporation, a wholly owned subsidiary of MTDB. MTDB and SDG&E may be
referred to collectively as the "Parties."

RECITALS

- A. The Seller owns a compressed natural gas (CNG) fueling station located on the property of the Buyer that is utilized for refueling CNG vehicles.
- B. The Seller desires to sell and the Buyer desires to purchase all of the Seller's right, title, and interest in the CNG fueling station located at 100 16th Street, San Diego, California 92101 in accordance with the terms and conditions set forth in this Agreement.

AGREEMENT

In consideration of the foregoing recitals, representations, warranties, and covenants set forth in this Agreement, the Parties agree as follows.

ARTICLE 1: SALE AND PURCHASE OF ASSETS

- 1.1 <u>Sale and Purchase of Assets</u>. The Seller hereby agrees to sell, convey, transfer, assign, and deliver to the Buyer, and the Buyer hereby agrees to purchase, take, and receive all of the Seller's right, title, and interest to the following specific assets and property relating to the CNG Station effective upon the closing date ("Purchased Assets").
 - a. <u>CNG Station</u>. All right, title, and interest in the CNG fueling station located at 100 16th Street, San Diego, California, as set forth on Schedule A (the "CNG Station"); and
 - b. <u>Personal Property.</u> All tangible personal property, including, without limitations, all fixtures, machinery, and equipment (whether or not affixed to real property) and other fixed assets owned by the Seller used in connection with and located at the CNG Station. A list (current as of the date hereof) of all personal property is set forth on Schedule B. It is expressly understood and agreed that the Purchased Assets will not include any intellectual property.
- 1.2 <u>Excluded Assets</u>. Notwithstanding anything contained herein to the contrary, the Seller shall retain all other assets and property of the Seller not set forth in Section 1.1. The Purchased Assets do not include any of the following:

- a. <u>Fueling Station Lease</u>. That certain CNG Fueling Station Lease Agreement, dated as of October 7, 1998 ("Fueling Station Lease") by and between SDG&E and MTDB, which Fueling Station Lease shall be terminated as of the closing date pursuant to Section 1.9 below;
- b. <u>Fueling Station Agreement</u>. That certain CNG Fueling Station Agreement, dated July 8, 1998 ("Fueling Station Agreement") by and among SDG&E, MTDB, and San Diego Transit Corporation, which Fueling Station Agreement shall be terminated as of the closing date pursuant to Section 1.9 below;
- c. <u>Management Agreement</u>. That certain CNG Refueling Station Management Agreement, dated as of November 1, 2001 ("Management Agreement"), by and between SDG&E and ENRG Fuel USA, Inc. (as assignee of ENRG, Inc., formerly known as PFCeFuels, Inc., successor to Pickens Fuel Corp.), which Management Agreement shall be terminated by SDG&E as of the closing date; or
- d. <u>Emissions Reduction Credits</u>. The emission reduction credits that have been allocated to SDG&E pursuant to Section XI of the Fueling Station Agreement or any other emissions reduction credits.
- 1.3 <u>Liabilities</u>. Upon the terms and subject to the conditions contained herein (at the closing date), the Buyer shall assume <u>only</u> those obligations and liabilities accruing, arising out of, or relating to events or occurrences happening after the closing date regarding the Purchased Assets.
- 1.4 <u>Purchase Price</u>. As payment for the sale, transfer, and assignment of the Purchased Assets, the Buyer shall pay the Seller the aggregate sum of three hundred seventy-six thousand, seven hundred and one dollars (\$376,701), plus the applicable sales tax in the amount of zero dollars (\$0.00) as determined by the Parties pursuant to Section 4.9. The foregoing amount shall be payable by check upon the closing.
- 1.5 Disclaimer of Seller. Except as otherwise provided herein:
 - a. the Purchased Assets are being conveyed from Seller to Buyer as is with all faults and without warranties of any kind, except as specifically provided herein, and, without limiting the generality of the foregoing, SELLER MAKES NO WRITTEN OR ORAL REPRESENTATION OR WARRANTY, EITHER EXPRESS OR IMPLIED, WITH RESPECT TO THE FITNESS, MERCHANTABILITY, OR SUITABILITY OF THE PURCHASED ASSETS FOR ANY PARTICULAR PURPOSE OR THE OPERATION OF THE PURCHASED ASSETS BY BUYER;
 - b. the Buyer acknowledges that the Seller has not conducted any environmental investigations of the Purchased Assets;
 - c. the Buyer acknowledges that it may conduct any environmental investigation such as a Phase 1 or a Phase 2 environmental site assessment of the Purchased Assets, provided it obtains prior written permission from Seller to do so; and
 - d. the Buyer acknowledges that the Purchased Assets may or may not contain certain hazardous substances (as defined below), except as provided in Section 2.12 hereof. The Seller makes no representation or warranty to the Buyer regarding the presence or absence of any hazardous substances. Notwithstanding the foregoing

acknowledgement, the Buyer shall not be deemed to in any way waive or diminish the warranties, representations, or covenants of the Seller contained in this Agreement expressly including (but not limited to) the Seller's indemnity obligations contained in Article 8 hereof.

- Acknowledgement of Buyer. The Buyer acknowledges that it has been permitted full and complete access of the books and records, facilities, properties, contracts, reports, and other documents relating to the Purchased Assets that are available, and it has desired or requested to see and/or review. The Buyer has had the opportunity to meet with the Seller to discuss the Purchased Assets, and the business assets of the Seller related to the CNG Station. The Buyer acknowledges that it is not relying upon any verbal or written representations or warranties whatsoever to Buyer, whether express or implied, except as expressly provided in this Agreement, or any projection, or analysis prepared by, or on behalf of the Seller, or for which the Seller could be held responsible to the prospects, or likelihood of the success of the business of the CNG Station as conducted by the Buyer after the closing date. Notwithstanding the foregoing, nothing herein contained including, without limitation, the foregoing acknowledgment by the Buyer, shall be deemed to in any way waive or diminish the warranties, representations, or covenants of the Seller contained in this Agreement expressly, including (but not limited to) the Seller's indemnity obligations contained in Article 8 hereof.
- 1.7 <u>Closing.</u> The closing of the transaction contemplated by this Agreement shall be effective as of ______, 2006 ("closing date") and shall take place at the offices of SDG&E located at 101 Ash Street, San Diego, California 92101, or at such other place mutually agreeable by both Parties.
- 1.8 <u>Instrument of Transfer</u>. At the closing, the Seller shall transfer the CNG Station to the Buyer by a good and sufficient "Bill of Sale" in substantially the form of Exhibit 1 (attached) leaving the Buyer with full possession of the Purchased Assets.

1.9 Termination of Agreements

- a. Each of SDG&E, MTDB, and San Diego Transit Corporation agree that the Fueling Station Lease is hereby terminated as of the closing date. Notwithstanding the foregoing, if the closing date shall not occur for any reason, the Fueling Station Lease shall remain in full force and effect in accordance with its terms. Each of SDG&E, MTDB, and San Diego Transit Corporation agree to execute, acknowledge, and deliver any other documents reasonably requested by SDG&E, MTDB, or San Diego Transit Corporation to evidence and accomplish the foregoing termination.
- b. Each of SDG&E and MTDB agree that the Fueling Station Agreement is hereby terminated as of the closing date. Notwithstanding the foregoing, if the closing date shall not occur for any reason, the Fueling Station Agreement shall remain in full force and effect in accordance with its terms. Each of SDG&E and MTDB agree to execute, acknowledge, and deliver any other documents reasonably requested by either SDG&E or MTDB to evidence and accomplish the foregoing termination.

1.10 Access to Records after Closing Date

a. For a period of three years after the closing date, the Buyer shall permit the Seller and its officers or authorized representatives access to the books and records of the Buyer with respect to the operation of the CNG Station during normal business hours. Seller

may reasonably request or obtain information and make copies of relevant documents in connection with any audit (for tax or other purposes) of its operations or for any other valid business purpose. If at any time during a three-year period the Buyer determines that it is not necessary to maintain the information currently maintained by the Buyer, the Buyer may dispose of or destroy such information 60 business days after the Buyer has notified the Seller and allow the Seller the right to remove such information from the Buyer's premises at the Seller's expense.

- b. For a period of three years after the closing date, the Seller shall allow the Buyer and its officers or authorized representatives access to the books and records of the Seller's information pertaining to the CNG Station during normal business hours. Buyer may reasonably request or obtain information and make copies of relevant documents in connection with any audit (for tax or other purposes) of the CNG Station's operations or for any other valid business purpose. If at any time during the three-year period, the Seller shall determine that it is not necessary (for its purpose) to maintain or retain the information currently maintained by the Seller, the Seller may dispose of or destroy such information 60 business days after the Seller has notified the Buyer and allowed the Buyer the right to remove such information from the Seller's premises at the Buyer's expense.
- 1.11 <u>CNG Station Signage</u>. Effective on the closing date, the Buyer shall remove all signage at the CNG Station that refers to the Seller.

ARTICLE 2: REPRESENTATIONS AND WARRANTIES OF SELLER

Except as otherwise set forth herein, the Seller hereby represents and warrants to the Buyer as of the date hereof as follows.

- 2.1 Organization and Authority. The Seller is a corporation duly organized and in good standing under the state laws of California. The Seller has all necessary corporate power to carry on the business of the CNG Station as it is now being conducted to own or use the property and assets that it purports to own or use, and to execute and deliver this Agreement to perform its obligations hereunder.
- Authorization. This Agreement has been duly authorized, executed, and delivered by the Seller and constitutes the legally binding obligation of the Seller in accordance with its terms except as the same may be limited by bankruptcy, insolvency, reorganization, or other laws affecting the rights of creditors and to general equity principles.
- 2.3 <u>Consents and Approvals</u>. The execution and delivery by the Seller of this Agreement does not require the Seller to obtain any consent, approval, action, filing, or to give any notice to any corporation, partnership, person, firm, or other entity or any public, government, or judicial authority.
- 2.4 <u>No Undisclosed Liabilities</u>. There are no material liabilities directly relating to the CNG Station of which the Seller has knowledge except liabilities disclosed elsewhere in this Agreement.

- 2.5 <u>Absence of Certain Changes</u>. The Seller has and will transfer upon the closing date a good and marketable title to use all of the Purchased Assets free and clear of all liens or encumbrances of any kind to the Buyer.
- 2.6 <u>Absence of Certain Changes</u>. The Seller acknowledges that since Buyer's inspection of the CNG Station on [_____], there has not been any loss, damage, or destruction of the Purchased Assets excepting normal wear and tear.
 - a. Any mortgage, pledge, or material lien, charge, or encumbrance of any kind on any of the Purchased Assets; and
 - b. Any transaction entered into by the Seller with respect to the CNG Station other than the ordinary course of business is consistent with past practice.
- 2.7 Taxes. The Seller has filed all tax returns and reports required with respect to the CNG Station. All returns and reports will accurately reflect all taxes, charges, and assessments owed by the Seller relating to the CNG Station. To the best of Seller's knowledge, there is no unassessed tax deficiency proposed or threatened against the Seller relating to the CNG Station. Nor is there any action pending or, to the best of Seller's knowledge, threatened by any government authority for assessment, reassessment, or collection of any taxes affecting the CNG Station. The Seller has withheld and duly paid the appropriate governmental authorities all payroll taxes required with respect to the CNG Station.
- 2.8 <u>Compliance with Laws</u>. The Seller is in compliance with all applicable laws and regulations affecting the Purchased Assets, including, without limitation, federal, state, county, and city laws, and ordinances and regulations, except where the violation or failure to comply, individually or in the aggregate, would not have a material adverse effect on the Purchased Assets.
- 2.9 <u>Licenses</u>. Schedule C sets forth all governmental licenses and permits held by the Seller for the operation of the business at the CNG Station (collectively referred to herein as "Licenses"). Except for licenses or permits for which applications are shown in Schedule C, no written notices of any violation have been received by the Seller (with respect to licenses) with no proceeding pending that would suspend, revoke, or limit any license.
- 2.10 <u>Litigation</u>. The Seller has not received service or other written notices of any action, suit, or investigation presently pending related to the CNG Station nor does the Seller have any knowledge of any action, suit, or investigation pending or threatened against the Seller by any federal, state, municipal, or other governmental court related to the CNG Station.
- 2.11 <u>Brokerage</u>. No broker or finder has acted directly or indirectly for the Seller. Nor has the Seller incurred any obligation to pay any brokerage or finder's fee or other commission or similar fee in connection with the transaction contemplated by this Agreement. The Seller agrees to indemnify and hold the Buyer harmless with respect to any and all claims of brokers' fees, commissions, or other similar fees arising out of the conduct of the Seller.

2.12 Environmental

- a. <u>Definitions the following terms shall apply to this section:</u>
 - <u>CERCLA</u> shall mean the Comprehensive Environmental Response Compensation and Liability Act of 1980, as amended, and set forth in Title 42, United States Code, Section 9601 et seq.
 - ii. <u>Environmental Laws</u> shall mean all federal, state, local environmental land use, zoning, and chemical use laws; statutes, ordinances, and codes relating to the protection of the environment or governing the use of storage treatment, generation, transportation, processing, handling, production, or disposal of a hazardous substances; and rules, regulations, decisions, and orders applicable to the CNG Station of federal, state, and local governmental agencies and authorities.
 - iii. <u>Environmental Permits</u> shall mean all permits, licenses, approvals, authorizations, consents, or registrations required by applicable Environmental Laws in connection with the ownership use and/or operation of the CNG Station for storage, treatment, generation, transportation, processing, handling, production, or disposal of hazardous substances.
 - iv. Facility shall mean the real property on which the CNG Station is located.
 - v. <u>Hazardous Substances</u> means any substance:
 - 1. which requires investigation or remediation under any federal, state, or local statute, regulation, ordinance, order, action, policy, or common law;
 - 2. defined as a "hazardous waste," "hazardous substance," pollutant, or contaminant under any federal, state, or local statute, regulation, rule, ordinance, or amendments thereto including, without limitation:
 - i. CERCLA (42 U.S.C. Section 9601 et seq.);
 - ii. Resource Conservation and Recovery Act as amended;
 - iii. Hazardous and Solid Waste Amendments of 1984, (U.S.C. Section 6902 et seq.);
 - iv. Clean Water Act (33 U.S.C. Section 466 et seq.);
 - v. Safe Drinking Water Act (14 U.S.C. Sections 1401-1450);
 - vi. Toxic Substances Control Act (15 U.S.C. Sections 2601-2629);
 - vii. Hazardous Materials Transportation Act (49 U.S.C. Section 1801 et seq.);

- viii. California Hazardous Waste Control Law, Hazardous Substance Account Act, and California Health and Safety Code (Chapters 6.5 through 6.95); or
- ix. Porter-Cologne Water Quality Control Act, California Water Code Section 13000 et seq., or hazardous substances found to be a pollutant, contaminant, or hazardous waste in any reported decision of the State of California or federal court.
- a. that is toxic, explosive, corrosive, flammable, infectious, radioactive, carcinogenic, mutagenic, or otherwise hazardous and becomes regulated by any governmental authority, agency, department, commission, board, or instrumentality of the United States, the State of California, or any political subdivision thereof;
- b. the presence of which on the property causes or threatens to cause a nuisance upon the property or to adjacent properties or poses or threatens to pose a hazard to the health or safety of persons on or about the property; or
- c. contains gasoline, diesel fuel, or other petroleum hydrocarbons.
- vi. Release shall have the same meaning as given to the term under CERCLA and the regulations promulgated hereunder.
- b. Except as otherwise set forth in Schedule D hereto, to the Seller's knowledge, there has been no unauthorized release on or from the facility by which, through soil, subsoil, bedrock, surface water, or ground water migration, a Hazardous Substance could come to be located on the Facility, and the Seller has not received any form of notice from a federal, state, or local governmental agency or authority, or from any operator, tenant, subtenant, licensee, or occupant of the Facility with regard to a release or the threat of a release on the Facility.
- c. There are no actions, suits, claims, or proceedings pending, agreements, consent orders, decrees, judgments, licenses, or permit conditions or other orders or directives of any federal, state, or local court government agency or authority, to the best of Seller's knowledge, relating to the present ownership, use or operation of the Purchased Assets, which require any change in the present condition of the Purchased Assets or any work, repairs, construction, containment, cleanup, investigations, studies, removal, or other remedial action or capital expenditures with respect to the Purchased Assets.
- d. To the best of Seller's knowledge there are no actions, suits, claims, or proceedings pending or threatened, which would cause the occurrence of expenses or costs or the seeking of money damages, injunctive relief, remedial action, or any other remedy that arises out of or relate to as a result from: (i) violation or alleged violation of any applicable Environmental Law or noncompliance or alleged noncompliance with any Environmental Permit with respect to the Purchased Assets; (ii) the presence or release of any Hazardous Substance or release on or from the Purchased Assets; or (iii) human exposure to any Hazardous Substance to the extent the same arise from the condition of the Purchased Assets or the ownership, use, or operation thereof.

2.13 No Breach. The execution, delivery, and performance of this Agreement and the consummation of the transaction contemplated hereby, in accordance with the terms and conditions hereof, will not conflict with or violate any provision of the Articles of Incorporation or Bylaws of the Seller and does not and will not conflict with or violate, or result in a breach, or cause a default under: (i) any provision of any federal, state, or local law or regulation relating to the Purchased Assets; (ii) any provision of any order, arbitration award, judgment, or decree to which the Seller is subjected; or (iii) any provision of any agreement or instrument to which the Seller is subject to, the violation of which, would have a material adverse effect on Purchased Assets or the ability of Seller to consummate the transactions hereunder. The Seller has not received any notice from any federal, state, or local agency that any real property utilized in connection with the CNG Station is now in violation of any applicable zoning requirement, classification, building code, pollution control ordinance, statute, or any other applicable law; ordinance, regulation, order, or requirement.

ARTICLE 3: REPRESENTATIONS AND WARRANTIES OF BUYER

Buyer represents and warrants to Seller as of the date hereof as follows:

- Organization and Authority of Buyer. The Buyer is a transit authority duly organized, validly existing, and in good standing under the laws of the State of California. The Buyer has all necessary power and authority to own, lease, and operate its assets, property, and business to carry on its business as now being and as heretofore conducted to execute and deliver this Agreement and perform its obligations hereunder.
- Authorization. This Agreement has been duly authorized, executed, and delivered by the Buyer and constitutes the legal, valid, and binding obligation of the Buyer in accordance with its terms, except as the same may be limited by bankruptcy, insolvency, reorganization, or other laws affecting the rights of creditors and general equity principles. Buyer has the right, power, authority, and capacity to execute and deliver this Agreement and perform its obligations hereunder.
- 3.3 <u>Consents and Approvals</u>. The execution and delivery by the Buyer of this Agreement does not require the Buyer to obtain any consent, approval, action, filing, or to give any notice to any corporation, partnership, person, firm, or other entity or any public, government, or judicial authority.
- No Breach. The execution, delivery, and performance of this Agreement and the consummation of the transaction contemplated hereby, in accordance with the terms and conditions hereof, will not violate any provision of the enabling legislation or organizational documents of the Buyer and does not and will not conflict with, violate, or result in a breach of or cause a default under:

 (i) any provision of any federal, state, or local law or regulation relating to the Purchased Assets; (ii) any provision of any order, arbitration award, judgment, or decree to which the Buyer is subject; or (iii) any provision of any agreement or instrument to which Buyer is subject, the violation of which would have a material effect on the Purchased Assets or the ability of Buyer to consummate the transactions hereunder.
- 3.5 <u>Brokerage</u>. No broker or finder has acted, directly or indirectly, for the Buyer, nor has the Buyer incurred any obligation to pay any broker or finder's fee, or other commission or similar fees, in connection with the transaction contemplated by this Agreement. The Buyer agrees to

indemnify and hold the Seller harmless with respect to any and all claims for brokers' fees, commissions, or other similar fees arising out of the conduct of the Buyer.

ARTICLE 4: COVENANTS AND AGREEMENTS

- 4.1 <u>Conditions</u>. From the date hereof to the closing date, the Buyer and Seller shall each use its commercially reasonable efforts to:
 - satisfy the conditions precedent to consummation of the transactions contemplated by this Agreement to the extent they are to be performed by its agents or representatives;
 and
 - b. cooperate with one another to satisfy the conditions precedent to consummate the transactions contemplated by this Agreement.
- 4.2 <u>Regulatory Approvals</u>. On or prior to the closing date, the Seller shall have obtained any and all governmental regulatory approvals necessary for the transfer of the CNG Station from Seller to Buyer.

4.3 Litigation

- a. From the date hereof through the closing date, the Seller shall notify the Buyer promptly of any actions or proceedings of the type described in Section 2.9 that, from the date hereof, are threatened or commenced against the Seller with respect to the CNG Station.
- b. From the date hereof through the closing date, the Buyer shall notify the Seller promptly of any actions or proceedings threatened or commenced against the Buyer with respect to this Agreement, which would impact the Buyer's ability to consummate the transactions set forth herein.
- 4.4 Continued Effectiveness of Representations and Warranties of Seller and Buyer. From the date hereof through the closing date: (i) the Seller shall use its commercially reasonable efforts to conduct its affairs in such a manner that, except as otherwise contemplated or permitted by this Agreement, the representations and warranties contained in Article 2 shall continue to be true and correct on and to the closing date if made on the closing date; and (ii) the Buyer shall use its commercially reasonable efforts to conduct its affairs in such a manner that, except as otherwise contemplated or permitted by this Agreement, the representations and warranties contained in Article 3 shall continue to be true and correct as of the closing date if made on and of the closing date.
- 4.5 <u>Expenses</u>. The Parties shall each bear their respective expenses incurred in connection with the preparation, execution, and performance of this Agreement. The transactions contemplated hereby, including, without limitation, all fees, and expenses of agents, representatives, counsel, and accountants.
- 4.6 <u>Further Assurances</u>. Each of the Parties shall, at any time, execute, acknowledge, and deliver any other assignments, conveyances, other assurances documents, and instruments of transfer or assumption reasonably requested by any Party. It will take any other action consistent with the terms of this Agreement that may reasonably be requested by any Party for the purposes of

accomplishing the agreements set forth herein. Each such Party shall use its commercially reasonable efforts to fulfill or obtain the fulfillment of the conditions to the closing date as promptly as practicable.

- 4.7 <u>Bulk Sales Law.</u> Buyer and Seller hereby agree to waive compliance with the provisions of any applicable "Bulk Transfers Law."
- 4.8 Risk of Loss. From the date hereof to the closing date, the risk of loss or damage to any of the Purchased Assets shall be borne by the Seller. If at or prior to the closing date, all or any material part of the Purchased Assets are destroyed or damaged, then the Buyer shall have the option exercisable in writing:
 - a. to reduce the purchase price for the Purchased Assets that have been affected by an amount equal to the cost of repair;
 - b. to complete the transactions contemplated hereby without reduction of the purchase price, in which event all proceeds of insurance or compensation for such loss shall be payable by Seller to the Buyer to the extent necessary to rebuild or make operational such destroyed or damaged CNG Station, and all rights and claims of the Seller to any such amounts shall be assigned to the Buyer; or
 - c. to terminate this Agreement in the event the CNG Station is damaged beyond repair.
- 4.9 <u>Tax Liability</u>. The Seller shall be responsible for and pay any and all taxes of any nature whatsoever incurred by the Seller in connection with the transaction contemplated by this Agreement, including, but not limited to all transfer, excise, use, and license taxes. Notwithstanding the foregoing, Buyer shall reimburse the Seller for all sales tax relating to this Agreement paid by the Seller upon receipt of the Buyer of satisfactory evidence of the calculation and payment thereof.

Buyer and Seller agree that for California sales tax purposes, the Purchased Assets are sufficiently affixed to the realty pursuant to California Sales Tax Regulation 1596. Furthermore, Buyer and Seller agree that the Purchased Assets will transfer "in place" with the realty, and both Buyer and Seller do not contemplate removing any Purchased Assets from the property. Accordingly, Buyer and Seller expect that the transfer of Purchased Assets will not be subject to California sales or use tax, and sales tax reimbursement will not be added to the selling price at the closing.

In the event that California sales or use tax is assessed on the transaction as a result of review by the California State Board of Equalization, Buyer hereby agrees to reimburse the Seller for any tax, interest, or penalty that is assessed.

ARTICLE 5: CONDITIONS TO THE OBLIGATIONS OF SELLER

The obligation of the Seller to enter into and complete the closing is subject to the fulfillment on or prior to the closing date of the following conditions:

- 5.1 <u>Litigation</u>. On the closing date there shall be no litigation, proceeding, or investigation pending or threatened, pertaining to the transactions contemplated by this Agreement, which would materially affect the CNG Station or the ability of the Parties to consummate the transactions hereunder.
- Absence of Adverse Government Action. No action shall have been taken, proposed, or threatened, and no statute, rule, regulation, or order shall have been proposed, enacted, or entered by any governmental body, agency, or any court with jurisdiction over the transaction contemplated herein and with the authority to prohibit or unduly delay consummation of such transaction on the terms and provisions herein set forth.
- 5.3 Deliveries by Buyer to Seller. On the closing date, the Buyer shall deliver to the Seller:
 - a. a Certificate from the Buyer certifying to the fulfillment of the conditions specified in Article 5 and certifying the power and authority of the Buyer to enter into and consummate the transaction contemplated by this Agreement in form reasonably satisfactory to Seller; and
 - b. other documents or instruments as may be reasonably necessary to consummate the purchase and sale of the Purchased Assets in accordance with the terms and conditions of this Agreement. However, the Buyer shall not be obligated to deliver any documents, which would: (a) materially change the terms of this agreement; or (b) require the Buyer to incur material expenses in connection with the preparation of such documents or instruments.
- 5.4 <u>Approval of Documentation</u>. The form and substance of all certificates, instruments, opinions, and other documents delivered to the Seller under this Agreement shall be reasonably satisfactory in all respects to the Seller and its counsel.

ARTICLE 6: CONDITIONS TO THE OBLIGATIONS OF BUYER

The obligation of the Buyer to enter into and complete the closing is subject to the fulfillment on or prior to the closing date of the following conditions, any one or more of which may be waived to the extent permitted by law.

- 6.1 <u>Litigation</u>. On the closing date there shall be no litigation, proceeding, or investigation, pending or threatened, pertaining to the transactions contemplated by this Agreement, which would materially affect the CNG Station or the ability of the Parties to consummate the transactions hereunder.
- 6.2 <u>Approval of Documentation</u>. The form and substance of all certificates, instruments, opinions, and other documents delivered to the Buyer under this Agreement shall be reasonably satisfactory in all respects to the Buyer and its counsel.

- 6.3 <u>No Material Adverse Changes</u>. From the date hereof, there shall not have been any material adverse changes in the condition, business, operations, or prospects of the CNG Station.
- 6.4 Deliveries by Seller to Buyer. On the closing date, the Seller shall deliver to the Buyer:
 - a. the Bill of Sale duly executed by the Seller;
 - a Certificate of an Officer of Seller certifying as to the fulfillment of the conditions specified in Article 6 and certifying as to the power and authority of the Seller to enter into and consummate the transaction contemplated by this Agreement in a form reasonably satisfactory to the Buyer;
 - c. evidence satisfactory to the Buyer of the calculation by the Seller of the State California sales tax to be incurred and paid by the Seller on behalf of the Buyer in connection with the consummation of the transactions contemplated by this Agreement; and
 - d. such other documents or instruments as may be reasonably necessary to consummate the purchase and sale of the Purchased Assets in accordance with the terms and conditions of this Agreement. However, the Seller shall not be obligated to deliver any documents, which would: (a) materially change the terms of this Agreement; or (b) require the Seller to incur material expenses in connection with the preparation of such documents or instruments.

ARTICLE 7: SURVIVAL OF REPRESENTATIONS, WARRANTIES, COVENANTS, AND AGREEMENTS

All representations, warranties, covenants, and agreements of the Parties shall survive the execution and delivery of the closing date and, except as otherwise specifically provided in this Agreement, shall thereafter terminate and expire one year from the date of this Agreement with respect to any claim based upon, arising out of, or otherwise involving any fact, circumstance, action, or proceeding relating to this Agreement.

ARTICLE 8: INDEMNIFICATION

8.1 Obligation to Indemnify

a. The Seller agrees to indemnify, defend, and hold harmless to the Buyer, including, without limitation, its directors, officers, employees, agents, affiliates, and assigns, from and against all losses in excess of the amounts received by the Buyer from insurance proceeds subject to the limitations contained in Article 7, based upon or related to: (i) a claim based upon, arising out of, or relating to any known inaccuracy or known omission from any representation or warranty of Seller contained in this Agreement; (ii) a claim based upon, arising out of, or relating to or breach of any covenant, or agreement of Seller contained in this Agreement; (iii) any third-party claim relating to Seller's ownership or operation of the Purchased Assets and matters or events, which occur on or prior to the closing date; and (iv) any liens on any of the Purchased Assets, including, but not limited to, judgment liens, financing statements (UCC-1s), tax liens, mechanics, or materialmen's liens that arose out of facts or circumstances occurring prior to the closing date.

- b. The Buyer hereby agrees to indemnify, defend, and hold the Seller harmless, including, without limitation, its directors, officers, employees, agents, affiliates, and assigns, from all losses in excess of the amounts received by the Seller from insurance proceeds subject to the limitations contained in Article 7 based upon or related to: (i) subject to the limitations contained in Article 7, a claim based upon, arising out of, or relating to any known inaccuracy or known omission from any representation or warranty of Buyer contained in this Agreement; (ii) a claim based upon, arising out of, or relating to or breach of any covenant, or agreement of Buyer contained in this Agreement; (iii) any third-party claim relating to Buyer's ownership or operation of the Purchased Assets and matters or events, which occur on or following the closing date; and (iv) from any assessment of California sales or use tax, interest, and penalty in connection with the transfer of the Purchased Assets.
- 8.2 Notice of Asserted Liability. Promptly after receipt by the Buyer or the Seller of notice of any demand, claim, or circumstances, which would give rise to a claim for which a Party is entitled to indemnification, or the commencement or threatened commencement of any action, preceding, or investigation (an Asserted Liability), which may result in a loss attributable to a claim for which a Party is entitled to indemnification, the Party receiving such notice (Indemnitee) shall give notice thereof to the other Party (Indemnitor). The notice shall describe the Asserted Liability in reasonable detail and shall indicate the amount of loss that has been or may be suffered by Indemnitee.
- 8.3 Opportunity to Defend. Indemnitee may elect to compromise or defend at its expense, and by its counsel, any Asserted Liability provided. However, the Indemnitor may not compromise or settle any Asserted Liability without the consent of Indemnitee, unless such compromise or settlement imposes no liability or obligation on the Indemnitee, other than a monetary payment, which Indemnitee and any other Parties hereunder are fully indemnified against or involves other matters not binding upon Indemnitee or such other Parties. Parties may participate at their expense in the defense of any Asserted Liability, which any such person may have an indemnification obligation under Section 8.1. If either party chooses to defend or participate in the defense of any Asserted Liability, it shall have the right to receive from the other party any books, records, or other documents within such party's control that are necessary or appropriate for such defense.
- 8.4 <u>Limitation on Liability</u>. Except in connection with a Party's obligation to indemnify the other Party or its directors, officers, employees, agents, affiliates, and assigns, from any claims raised by third parties, neither Party shall have any liability for consequential damages, punitive damages, lost profits, damage to reputation, or the like.
- 8.5 Governing Agreements. Notwithstanding anything to the contrary in this Agreement, the allocation of liability among SDG&E, MTDB, and San Diego Transit Corporation under the Fueling Station Agreement for the period prior to the closing date shall remain in full force and effect and shall govern to the extent there is any conflict between the provisions hereof and thereof.

ARTICLE 9: TERMINATION OF AGREEMENT

- 9.1 Termination. This Agreement may be terminated prior to the closing as follows:
 - a. at the election of the Seller, if the Buyer has breached or defaulted under any representation, warranty, covenant, or provision contained in this Agreement provided; however, that the Seller shall provide written notice to the Buyer specifying the nature of the breach or default promptly upon the Seller becoming aware of the breach or default. Seller shall have no termination right hereunder, unless such breach or default under any representation, warranty, covenant, or agreement shall not have been cured by the Buyer no earlier than: (a) the closing date; or (b) five business days after the Buyer shall have received notice from Seller that it intends to exercise its right to terminate under this paragraph;
 - b. at the election of the Buyer, if the Seller has breached or defaulted under any representation, warranty, covenant, or provision contained in this Agreement provided; however, that the Buyer shall provide written notice to the Seller specifying the nature of the breach or default promptly upon the Buyer becoming aware of the breach or default. Buyer shall have no termination right hereunder, unless such breach or default under any representation, warranty, covenant, or agreement shall not have been cured by the Seller no earlier than: (a) the closing date; or (b) five business days after the Seller shall have received notice from the Buyer that it intends to exercise its right to terminate under this paragraph; and
 - c. at any time on or prior to the closing date by mutual written consent of the Seller and the Buyer.

In the event that the Buyer or Seller elect to terminate this Agreement pursuant to Sections 9.1(i) or (ii) hereof, the terminating Party shall deliver an Irrevocable Notice to the other Party of this Agreement declaring its election to terminate this Agreement in accordance with the provisions of Sections 9.1(i) or (ii), as the case may be, and setting forth therein the basis for such termination. If this Agreement terminates, it shall become null and void and have no further force or effect, except as provided in Section 9.2.

9.2 <u>Survival</u>. If this Agreement is terminated and the transactions contemplated hereby are not consummated as referenced above, this Agreement shall become void and no further force will take effect except for the provisions of this Agreement relating to the obligation of the Parties hereto to keep confidential and not to use the confidential information and data obtained from the other Party. None of the Parties shall have any liability with respect to termination of this Agreement, except to the extent that failure to satisfy the conditions of Articles 5 and 6 results from the intentional or willful violation of the representations, warranties, covenants, or agreements of such Party under this Agreement. For purposes of the preceding sentence, the failure of any Party to comply with its respective obligations under Articles 1 and 2 promptly after all conditions to such compliance are fulfilled will constitute an intentional or willful violation of the Agreement by such Party.

ARTICLE 10: MISCELLANEOUS

- 10.1 <u>Notices</u>. Any notice or other communication required or permitted hereunder shall be in writing and shall be delivered personally via facsimile transmission or sent by certified mail with return receipt requested and postage prepaid. Budget Impact

The TDA claim amendment would result in the receipt of an additional \$564,077 in TDA Article 4.0 funds for MTS from the formula developed to determine the amounts to be transferred each year as a result of consolidation.

DISCUSSION:

At its June 9, 2005, meeting, the MTS Board of Directors approved the FY 2006 Operating Budget, which includes the TDA allocations. On June 24, 2005, the San Diego Association of Governments (SANDAG) Board of Directors approved the TDA allocations. Once both Boards approved the allocations, MTS submitted a funds claim for the specified purposes. This claim amendment revises the transfer amount for MTS based on the recent Board-approved addendum to the Master Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between SANDAG and MTS. Rather than determining the transfer amounts annually based on negotiation, an addendum to the Master MOU developed a formula to determine the amounts to be transferred each year. This formula results in an additional \$564,077 to MTS with a corresponding reduction for SANDAG.

WHEREAS, a Memorandum of Understanding between the San Diego Association of Governments, the North San Diego County Transit Development Board, and the Metropolitan Transit System Defining the Functions and Responsibilities of the Three Agencies ("Memorandum of Understanding") has been entered into; and

WHEREAS, the agencies seek to append the Memorandum of Understanding with this Addendum Number Four to describe the methodology for ongoing funding of functions transferred under SB 1703.

IN CONSIDERATION of the mutual promises set forth herein, the Parties agree as follows:

Transfers of functions from SANDAG to MTS that have already taken place are three Service Planners, one Right-of-Way Manager, and one Manager of Business Development.

- 1. This MOU contemplates that the TDA allocation formula in (4) below has been adjusted by \$400,000 to allow MTS to hire certain staff to fulfill its obligations under consolidation. Additionally, MTS will take responsibility for Web site content (SANDAG retains overall responsibility for Web site development). SANDAG will take responsibility for the pass by mail program.
- 2. Funding for said transfer of functions and responsibilities shall be provided directly from SANDAG to MTS from the annual TDA 4.0 apportionment.
- 3. SANDAG shall receive 2.78 percent of MTS' annual available TDA apportionment, which includes Article 4.0, Article 4.5, and TDA 10 percent (\$78,753,413 in FY 2006). This percentage accounts for the transfers of people in (1) above and transfers of functions in (2) above, if applicable.
- 4. This is the final adjustment related to consolidation. Any future needs shall be handled by each respective agency as part of the overall budget process.

We appreciate the previous actions of SANDAG in adding this important economic development project to the "Early Action Program" for expenditure of TransNet funds and your previous support for the Mid City Transit Gateway Plazas improvements nearing completion at the bridge deck over crossings at both University Avenue and El Cajon Boulevard.

These Transit Gateways are the first phase of the Mid City Bus Rapid Transit system. The next phase, now included in the Early Action Program, includes the development of the center median transit lanes and right of way dedicated in 1993 for the necessary enclosed in-line station platforms and elevators and escalators to connect to the Transit Gateways.

MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING

CONCERNING MITIGATION FOR

STATE ROUTE 15 (40TH STREET CORRIDOR)

The State of California, Department of Transportation (State) proposes to improve a 2.2 mile segment of State Highway Route 15 through a portion of the City of San Diego (City) along the 40th Street corridor in an area known as the Mid-City Community.

A MEMORANDUM OF AGREEMENT (MOA) for this project was signed on May 21, 1985. This Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) will supplement and supersede any conflicting portions of the May 21, 1985 agreement to include the features of the 40th Street Project Strip Map, Attachment 1, of City Manager's Report No. 92-198 issued June 11, 1992 (attached). Funding commitments, providing for the deposit of funds or specific work phases, will be covered by one or more separate cooperative agreements.


The following paragraphs include measures considered to satisfactorily mitigate the impacts of the project and City/State coordination details.

- Federal funds of \$5,000,000 from the Intermodal Surface Transportation Efficiency Act (ISTEA) will be used toward 1. funding of bridge widenings and enhancements and possible park improvements.
- \$1,250,000 of non-federal funds must be available for match of the ISTEA demonstration funds. Every effort will be made 2. by the State to obtain these funds from its own sources including from savings identified in project design. If State funds are not available for match, City funds from the Redevelopment Agency will be used.
- By Council resolution on June 22, 1992, the City committed up to \$2.5 million; and on August 4, 1992, the Council voted to commit an additional \$2.5 million in redevelopment funds to provide for additional bridge widenings (see item #18 below). By Council action on August 9, 1993 the above \$5,000,000 was withdrawn from this project due to lack of DOCUMENT NO 12 8 2 4 8 7 funds.



My name is Don Giaquinto and I am here on behalf of

I would like to bring to your attention an important issue which the
City Council has been dealing with. Recently, the City Council learned
that MTS has approved re-routing bus lines 13 and 14.

As you are aware, Mr. Don Stillwell has informed me and my colleagues on the City Council that the proposed #14 bus route between Fashion Valley and SDSU is nearly identical to the #13 bus route tht served this area before the opening of the Green Line Trolley. The major concern of Mr Stillwell is that the #14 bus is not scheduled to stop at the Grantville Trolley station, a station similar to Fashion Valley that was built for bus and trolley transfers, but will connecdt with the #13 bus route at this point, the expense of 136 extra miles per day between these two pints seems excessive. Proper timing will ensure proper connections.

As he pointed out Mr Stillwell has estimated the cost of making Kaiser Hospital the transfer point between the two bus lines rather than the Grantville Trolley station will be in excess of \$250,000 per year.

I am respectfully requesting that MTS provide a response to Mr Stillwell and to all members of the City Council in regards to the MTS calculations for the cost per year of their plan versus what Mr Stillwell suggests. I would also like to suggest that you or a member of staff ride the bus routes 13 and 14 so that Mr Stillwell might be able to point out the flaws before final decisions are made.

To my knowledge there has not been a formal presentation by MTS to the Navajo Community Planning Group to take public comment. The Navajo planning area encompasses routes 13, 14, and the Grantville Trolley Station.

I request that MTS respond to Mr Stillwell all members of the City Council and the over 400 people who signed a petition in favor of Mr Stillwells proposed changes as uickly as possible as meetings on the overhaul of the bus system is scheduled for March 2 and 9th.



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We have been advised that the COA proposal for the #14 route will not be completed until next June. For this reason, we have asked the MTDB to make the minor changes described in the attachments to include the RIO VISTA Trolley to #14 bus connections and the addition of the ZION AVENUE and CRAWFORD STREETS bus stops at KAISER HOSPITAL to the #14 bus route.

A marked-up JANUARY 29, 2006, map of the #14 bus route replaces FENTON PARKWAY bus stop with the RIO VISTA bus stop as the designated TIME POINT and shows the proposed departure times from FASHION VALLEY and RIO VISTA. For information, the distance from the RIO VISTA Trolley platform and the RIO VISTA bus stop is 500 feet. The map should also be corrected to designate the RIO VISTA Trolley stop and to place it WEST of Qualcomm Way where it is actually located. The line designating the trolley tracks should also be much closer to Rio San Diego than Camino de La Riena as the map currently appears to indicate.

Finally, I would like to critique the COA proposal. As mentioned previously, the COA proposal has returned the route #14 bus to the PRE-JULY 9, 2005 route of the #13 bus between Mission Center Road and SDSU. It does not include a stop at the GRANTVILLE Trolley Station to allow passengers to make timely connections to the #13 bus to FAIRMOUNT Avenue in NORTH PARK. This STOP MUST BE ADDED, for the reasons already given.

For 6 months the current #14 bus riders have had to transfer to the #13 bus at GRANTVILLE in order to actually arrive at the ZION AVENUE bus stop at KAISER HOSPITAL, thus creating a GUARANTEED delay of 45 minutes if one did not wish to cross the DANGEROUS MISSION GORGE ROAD at the RAINIER AVENUE bus stop at MCDONALDS.

By scheduling both the #13 and the #14 buses to stop at GRANTVILLE Trolley Station, the #13 riders could transfer to the #14 bus at GRANTVILLE for the connection to the ZION AVENUE bus stop at KAISER HOSPITAL.

As currently proposed, the #13 bus would make 4 trips to the ZION AVENUE bus stop and return EACH HOUR, for a total of 136 miles in a 17 hour day on this ONE MILE stretch of MISSION GORGE ROAD.

The #14 bus proposal (MIRRORING the PRE-JULY 10,2005 schedule) will make 2 trips per hour each direction to the ZION AVENUE bus stop on its trips to and from its destination. A transfer from the #13 bus to the #14 bus at the GRANTVILLE Trolley Station could provide the same service frequency as BEFORE July 10, 2005, and could SAVE 136 MILES OF TRAVEL and congestion on this ONE MILE stretch of MISSION GORGE ROAD.

Using a previous MTDB evaluation of \$20,000 PER YEAR to go around the KAISER HOSPITAL loop of 0.5 miles every 45 minutes (a total of 11 miles per day), it would appear that transferring between the #13 and the #14 buses at GRANTVILLE Trolley Station and eliminating this 136 miles every 17 hour day, could save nearly \$250,000 PER YEAR. The PLANNERS really should reconsider and do the logical, reconnect the #13 and #14 bus routes at the first opportunity, GRANTVILLE Trolley Station and connect the current #14 bus to the ZION AVENUE and CRAWFORD STREET bus stops at KAISER HOSPITAL. All we are asking for is 11 miles per day, of which you could save more than half if you drop all runs to GRANTVILLE after 2 p.m. each day. TRY IT, YOU MIGHT LIKE IT. We certainly would.

HISTORY of bus service for the Allied Gardens, Navajo, and Grantville Communities begins with the #13 bus route from Fashion Valley to the Euclid Trolley and existed until the July 10, 2005 opening of the GRANTVILLE Trolley Station and the GREEN LINE Trolley between OLD TOWN and SANTEE. The portion of the route between FASHION VALLEY to the KAISER HOSPITAL bus stop on ZION Avenue averaged about 30 minutes per trip. Attached is a copy of the #13 schedule used through July 9, 2005.

The Comprehensive Operational Analysis (COA) proposal shows the #14 route from FASHION VALLEY between the junction of MISSION CENTER ROAD and CAMINO DE LA REINA and the SDSU is IDENTICAL to the #13 route to SDSU that operated through July 9, 2005, the day BEFORE the #13 route was split into two parts, labeled Routes #13 and #14.

My conclusion, based on the COA, would be that the #14 bus route currently being used was, and is, a FAILURE; otherwise, why would the planners go back to the original design? This is a list of the CURRENT FAILURES.

There is NO CONNECTION between the EASTBOUND Green Line Trolley and the EASTBOUND #14 bus. Attached is a proposal already submitted to MTDB for a minimum 3 minute delay of the #14 bus departure from FASHION VALLEY and a TIME POINT at the #14 bus stop at RIO VISTA Trolley stop, which would change this NO CONNECTION to an almost PERFECT connection.

Next, there is no connection to the ZION AVENUE and CRAWFORD STREET bus stops at KAISER HOSPITAL where a TIMELY CONNECTION could be made to the #13 bus to the ALLIED GARDENS and NAVAJO communities PLUS a CONNECTION which consists of a CONTINUOUS, UNOBSTRUCTED way of PEDESTRIAN PASSAGE to the ENTRANCE OF THE FACILITY (KAISER HOSPITAL) which describes a "PATH OF TRAVEL" required by the AMERICANS WITH DISABILITIES ACT (ADA) for their facilities.

Also, there is a tremendous waste of resources in the evenings and on the weekends. The #14 bus route, if connected to the KAISER HOSPITAL bus stops, could be terminated at the hospital and be routed back to FASHION VALLEY, eliminating the ONE MILE SEGMENT to and from the GRANTVILLE Trolley Station that is more than adequately covered by the #13 bus route during these hours. REASON: The mentally and physically disabled passengers that use the bus to and from FASHION VALLEY only use the buses between 8 a.m. and 2 p.m. weekdays. This is also the reason the #14 bus trips from KAISER HOSPITAL to GRANTVILLE could be eliminated for all trips after 2 p.m. weekdays.

The lack of CONNECTION at the KAISER HOSPITAL bus stops by the #14 bus requires EASTBOUND users to exit the bus at McDONALDS at the corner of MISSION GORGE ROAD and RAINIER AVENUE and to cross the OBSTRUCTED and VERY DANGEROUS MISSION GORGE ROAD to get to the KAISER HOSPITAL, or to continue to the GRANTVILLE Trolley Station and transfer to the #13 bus. This is a GUARANTEED 45 minute delay for access to the KAISER HOSPITAL or to points on ZION AVENUE and in the ALLIED GARDENS and NAVAJO communities.

P.S. More HISTORY. The public was not informed of the #14 bus schedule until the morning of July 10, 2005. It was not known until that morning that the 45 minute schedule had been created, that the #14 bus was not going to the bus stops on ZION Avenue and CRAWFORD Street at KAISER HOSPITAL, that the travel direction on RANCHO MISSION ROAD was reversed and that the bus was no longer going to the MISSION SAN DIEGO Trolley Station. At my request, signs were placed on the bus stops on RANCHO MISSION ROAD to indicate the destination of the bus from each side of the street. It took at least a week to get this done. QUESTIONS:

When something is broken, intentionally, as the #13 route was, it would seem logical that one would try to mend the break at the first opportunity. The first opportunity to reconnect the NEW #14 bus route to the NEW #13 bus route, on July 10, 2005, would have been at the KAISER HOSPITAL bus stops on ZION and CRAWFORD. Logically, the #14 route should have ended there with transfers to the #13 bus and the #14 bus returned to FASHION VALLEY. A 20 minute trip each direction would have provided a 20 minute break for the driver at FASHION VALLEY each hour.

When did DESTINATION become more important than the users of the service? Why were the needs of residents, hospital patients, hospital workers, and hospital visitors considered of less importance than getting the #14 bus to the GRANTVILLE Trolley Station?

What are the plans to INFORM THE PUBLIC when the COA goes into effect and the #14 bus REVERSES its direction on RANCHO MISSION ROAD to its PRE-JULY 10, 2005 route? This attitude of FIND OUT FOR YOURSELF, or TAKE IT OR LEAVE IT, or LIKE IT OR LUMP IT, doesn't go over very well with users of PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION. As an example, many of the elderly at NAZARETH HOUSE used to take the #13 bus to FASHION VALLEY and to the KAISER HOSPITAL and ZION AVENUE corridor prior to JULY 10, 2005. Now they do not use the #14 bus at all.

MTS: UPDATE ON THE STATUS OF THE GROSSMONT TROLLEY STATION JOINT **DEVELOPMENT PROJECT**

RECOMMENDATION:

That the Board of Directors receive an update from General Counsel regarding the status of the Grossmont Trolley Station Joint Development Project.

Budget Impact

Revenue generation estimated at \$381,285 beginning in year 1 of the Ground Lease, with total revenue projection over the 99-year lease term at \$635,278,000.

Capital Project Funds. Capital project funds in the amount of \$4.7 million are allocated for related station improvements, including \$2 million in San Diego Association of Governments (SANDAG) for Smart Growth grant funds awarded to the City of La Mesa and MTS, and \$540,000 in local Transportation Development Act (TDA) funds contributed by the City of La Mesa.

DISCUSSION:

The purpose of this item is to update the Board on the status of the negotiations regarding the Grossmont Trolley Station Joint Development Project.



In July 2003, the MTS Board entered into an Exclusive Negotiating Agreement (ENA) with the City of La Mesa and Fairfield Residential, LLC (Fairfield) to create a mixed-use, transit-oriented development project. Fairfield is proposing to develop 527 apartments over the existing parking lot at the Grossmont Transit Center Station. Eighty of these units would be made affordable to low- and moderate-income families. The project will also provide 2,800 square feet of ground-floor commercial space. The bus stop and trolley station would be retained on site along with planned pedestrian enhancements. The apartments would be built over two levels of structured parking. Six hundred exclusive parking spaces would be provided at ground level of the parking structure oriented to the existing trolley station to replace the existing 600 surface parking spaces.

After several months of negotiations, MTS and Fairfield reached an agreement regarding the financial terms and conditions for the development of the Grossmont Transit Center Station and a long-term lease of the land thereafter. Those terms and conditions are memorialized into two documents—a DDA and a Ground Lease. The DDA governs how the project will be designed and constructed, and the Ground Lease gives Fairfield a long-term lease for the project.

The economic terms of the DDA include:

- <u>Term of Ground Lease</u>: 55-year lease term with two options to renew for 15 years and a third option to renew for 14 years. Total term of 99 years.
- Base Rent: \$85,333 years 0-2 or until 1/3 of the units are completed; \$170,667 years 2-4 or until 2/3 of the units are completed; \$256,000 per year thereafter until year 30.
- Base Rent Commencement Date: Upon close of escrow.
- Base Rent Escalation: Consumer Price Index adjustment every 5 years, limited to 15 % commencing in year 31.
- <u>Appraisal Adjustment of Base Rent</u>: Base rent is adjusted to 8% of the fair market value of the land based upon "mark-to-market" appraisal at years 31, 56, and 80, but in no case greater than 6.5%, 8.0%, and 10% of gross collections based upon appraisals at years 31, 56, and 81.
- Overage Rent: 1.25 % of gross income commencing year 1 and completing in year 30.

MTS has been negotiating the other legal terms and conditions of the DDA and Ground Lease with Fairfield since mid-October. Once the DDA and Ground Lease are in final form, they will be forwarded to Fairfield's lender for review and comment. It is common for lenders to make changes to the terms and conditions of these documents, and MTS anticipates that the negotiations with the lender will take an additional two to three weeks. Once an agreement has been reached with the lender, staff will bring the final versions of the documents back to the Board for approval. We estimate that Board approval will occur some time in February, and escrow will close some time in March with Fairfield starting construction thereafter.

The following is an update on the status of the outstanding issues that will need to be resolved prior to the close of escrow:

- Outside counsel for both MTS and the City of La Mesa met to discuss the latest draft of the Purchase and Sale Agreement. There are still several major issues that need to be resolved; staff anticipates making progress on those issues prior to the Board meeting.
- The San Diego and Arizona Eastern (SD&AE) Railway Company is scheduled to authorize granting easements to San Diego Gas &Electric and the City of La Mesa for the relocation of utility lines and construction of the drainage improvements in SD&AE right-of-way at its February 15, 2006, meeting.
- Staff and Fairfield met again with one of the adjacent property owners on Wednesday, February 1, in an attempt to finalize the amendment to one of the three existing parking licenses. The Executive Committee was briefed in closed session on the status of this negotiation earlier that day. Staff hopes to reach resolution on this issue at our next meeting scheduled for Friday, February 3, 2006.
- Staff and Fairfield are scheduled to finish negotiations and finalize the DDA on February 3, 2006. The DDA will then be forwarded to Fairfield's lender for their review and comment. It is not known how long the lender will need to review and comment on the DDA.
- Staff and Fairfield are also going to discuss the latest round of comments from
 Fairfield regarding the Ground Lease. The most recent version of the Ground
 Lease was transmitted to Fairfield on January 18, 2006. Fairfield was not able to
 provide comments to the latest draft until Tuesday January 31, 2006. Staff and
 Fairfield have blocked the entire day on Friday, February 3, 2006, to discuss the
 outstanding issues on the Ground Lease and hope to make significant progress
 on the document by the end of the day.
- Tim Allison and Paul Jablonski are scheduled to meet with employees of the property owner for the pedestrian bridge landing to continue discussions about the design and construction of the landing.
- The City of La Mesa is working on a letter agreement, which will memorialize the obligations of all parties with respect to the design, construction, and maintenance of the drainage work being performed as part of the concurrent capital project. Staff anticipates receiving a draft of that letter agreement prior to the February 9, 2006, Board meeting.
- On January 26, 2006, General Counsel was informed by Fairfield's counsel that an appraisal of the property would need to be performed as a condition of closing escrow. This request was based upon a letter issued by the Department of Industrial Relations wherein the sale of property by a redevelopment agency to a developer was found to constitute a contribution of public monies, which required the developer to pay prevailing wage on his entire project. Staff and Fairfield are

working to determine whether that letter and subsequent case law applies to this project. If that is found to be the case, an appraisal will need to be performed to determine that the lease price paid by Fairfield constitutes fair market value. It is common for appraisals of real property within in the County of San Diego to take 60 to 90 days to complete. Staff is currently working with Fairfield to locate a qualified appraiser who can perform the work within 30 days.

 A draft project checklist for this project is attached (Attachment A) to this agenda item outlining the remaining tasks that need to be completed prior to the close of escrow.

General Counsel will provide an oral update on the progress of these and other items during the Board meeting.

MTS: PROHIBITION ON SMOKING AT TRANSIT STATIONS AND BUS STOPS

RECOMMENDATION:

That the Board of Directors receive a report on potential options for prohibiting smoking at transit stations and bus stops and provide direction to staff on how to proceed.

Budget Impact

\$55 per sign, up to ten signs per station, located at 53 stations for a total estimated cost of \$29,150.00. This estimate does not include posting signs at individual bus stops. The American Lung Association has expressed a willingness to participate in offsetting these costs.

DISCUSSION:

MTS has received comments and complaints regarding smoking at bus stops and transit stations for a number of years. At the request of Board member Emery, staff was asked to research whether MTS may regulate smoking at transit stations and bus stops. The following summarizes the current state and local laws regarding smoking.

California Health and Safety Code (Cal. H&S) section 118875, also known as the California Indoor Clear Air Act (ICAA), was enacted in 1976 and provides that "tobacco smoke is a hazard to the health of the general public." The ICAA also specifies that "a local government body may ban the smoking of tobacco, or may regulate smoking in any manner not inconsistent with this article and Article 3 (commencing with Section 118920)



or any other provision of state law." The provisions of the ICAA govern the prohibition of smoking indoors.

In 1995, the Legislature enacted Cal. H&S sections 118920-118945, which prohibit smoking:

in any vehicle of a passenger stage corporation, the National Railroad Passenger Corporation (Amtrak) except to the extent permitted by federal law, in any aircraft except to the extent permitted by federal law, on a public transportation system, as defined by Section 99211 of the Public Utilities Code¹, or in any vehicle of an entity receiving any transit assistance from the state.

That chapter goes on to state that every public transportation agency must designate and post a continuous area of not less than 75% of any area made available as a waiting room as nonsmoking (Cal. H&S §118935(a)). Public transportation agencies are also required to post signs prohibiting smoking in any building where tickets, tokens, or other fare media are sold. (Cal. H&S §118935(b)). Finally the chapter concludes by stating it does not prohibit "any local ordinance on the same subject where a local ordinance is more restrictive to the benefit of the nonsmoker." (Cal. H&S §118940.)²

In City of San Jose v. Department of Health Services (1998) 66 Cal. App. 4th 35, the Court of Appeals for the sixth district considered whether a city ordinance would take precedence over state rules and regulations. The court found that with respect to the ICAA, the Legislature had clearly stated its intent to allow local authorities the flexibility to regulate smoking within their areas of jurisdiction. "Evidently, the rationale for the Legislature's deference to local governments is the Legislature's recognition that local governments, equipped as they are with superior knowledge of local conditions, are better able to handle local problems relating to the regulation of tobacco smoking." (*Id.* at 42.)

Based on Cal. H&S and City of San Jose v. Department of Health Services, MTS has the authority to regulate smoking inside public transportation vehicles and enclosed areas and buildings where waiting rooms are provided or fare media is sold; i.e., San Diego State University Station. What is not clear is to what extent MTS may regulate smoking at public transportation stations or stops which are unenclosed.

Local Law

The San Diego County Code of Regulatory Ordinances (SDCCRO) prohibits smoking "in any public place (any enclosed area to which the public is invited or permitted) or place of employment (area under the control of a public or private employer which employees normally frequent during the course of their employment), except in designated smoking areas." (SDCCRO section 32.803.)

¹ Public Utilities Code section 99211 specifies: "Public transportation system" means any system of an operator which provides transportation services to the general public by any vehicle which operates on land or water, regardless of whether operated separated from or in conjunction with other vehicles.

² Cal. H&S 118945 concludes by specifying any violation of the article constitutes an infraction punishable by a fine not exceeding \$100 for the first violation, \$200 for the second violation within one year, and \$500 for each subsequent violation within one year.

The San Diego Municipal Code prohibits the smoking of tobacco in any public place (§43.1001) and defines a public place as "any enclosed area where the public is routinely permitted without special invitation . . . [including] public transportation facilities."

Other Transit Agencies

Both the Los Angels Metropolitan Transit Authority and Bay Area Rapid Transit prohibit smoking inside their transit stations. Many of these stations are located underground, similar to the San Diego State University Station.

Possible Action

Given that there do not appear to be any existing ordinances with respect to banning smoking in unenclosed transportation facilities or at bus stops, staff is requesting direction on how to proceed with a potential smoking ban, if any. Possible options include:

- Work with our state lobbyist to enact legislation that specifically prohibits smoking in all public transportation facilities, including transit stations and bus stops:
- Direct General Counsel to draft an amendment to Ordinance 13 prohibiting smoking in any enclosed public transit station or bus stop; or
- Direct General Counsel to draft an amendment to Ordinance 13 that prohibits smoking in any public transit station or bus stop.




Please put a stop to smoking at bus stops.


Time and time again, I have been forced to get up and leave the bus stop because smokers arrive and turn it into a smoking section. This happens about three times a week and I am getting tired of it.

On behalf of the American public, I am petitioning for non-smoking areas at trolley stations in the County of San Diego. Personally I can't tolerate sharing the immediate trolley stations air with smokers. I have asthma which smoking triggers my coughing. Not all, but some are polite with their smoking habits. Others, I'm intimidated to ask. When a smoker sits down, lights up and puffs smoke away, the smoker shouldn't cause the non-smokers to relocate at a distant seat while waiting for the trolley. Non-Smokers should not be subjected to breathe second-hand smoke.

I am petitioning the County of San Diego to introduce and pass legislation for San Diego County trolley stations to reflect "Non-Smoking Area" on one side, leaving the other side as a designated area to smoke—at a distant. SEC. 32.801. PURPOSE OF CHAPTER.

Because smoking of tobacco, or any other weed or plant, is a positive danger to health and a cause of material annoyance, inconvenience, discomfort and a health hazard to those who are present in confined places, and in order to serve public health, safety and welfare, the declared purpose of this chapter is to prohibit the smoking of tobacco, or any other weed or plant, in public places and places of employment. except in designated smoking areas.

SEC. 32.802. DEFINITIONS.

- "Smoke" or "smoking" as defined in this chapter shall mean and include the carrying of a lighted pipe, or lighted cigar, or lighted cigarette of any kind, or the lighting of a pipe, cigar or cigarette of any kind.
- "Public place" shall mean any enclosed area to which the public is invited or in which the public is permitted, including but not limited to, retail stores, retail service establishments, retail food production and marketing establishments, restaurants, theaters, waiting rooms, reception areas, educational facilities, health facilities and public transportation facilities. A private residence is not a "public place".
- "Place of employment" shall mean any area under the control of a public or private employer which employees normally frequent during the course of employment, including, but not limited to work areas, employee lounges, conference rooms, and employee cafeterias. A private residence is not a "place of employment."

SEC. 32.803. PROHIBITIONS.

No person shall smoke in a public place or place of employment, except in designated smoking areas.

SEC. 32.804. DESIGNATION OF SMOKING AREAS.

- Smoking areas may be designated in public places and places of employment by proprietors or other persons in charge except in retail stores, retail service establishments, food markets, food service lines, restaurant waiting areas, hospital and health care facilities, public conveyances, theaters, auditoriums, public assembly rooms, meeting rooms, restrooms, elevators, pharmacies, libraries, museums or galleries, including restaurants within the above specified establishments which are constructed so that smoke can drift into the non-restaurant part of the establishment, which are open to the public or any other place where smoking is prohibited by law, ordinance or regulation. Smoking areas may not be designated in areas where the public must walk through to get to no smoking areas unless this is structurally not possible. Where smoking areas are designated, existing physical barriers and ventilation systems shall be used to minimize the toxic effect of smoke in adjacent non-smoking areas. It shall be the responsibility of employers to provide smoke-free areas for nonsmokers to the maximum extent possible within existing facilities. Restaurant owners or operators covered by the provisions of this article shall designate at least fifty percent (50%) of indoor seating capacity for no smoking and shall inform all patrons that a no smoking section is provided. Hotel and motel owners and operators shall designate an adequate number of guest rooms for no smoking to sufficiently meet demands and shall inform all patrons that no smoking rooms are provided.
- (b) Smoking areas may not be designated in a shared work area of a place of employment. A shared work area is any room in which more than one employee is assigned to perform work during the course of a work day. Employers shall provide written information to employees concerning smoking at the place of employment, including the location of designated smoking or non-smoking areas.
- (c) No ashtrays or other ash receptacles shall be placed in areas where smoking is prohibited.

SEC. 32.805. OPTIONAL PROHIBITION.

All managers and owners of any establishments serving or doing business with the public may at their discretion post "No Smoking" signs within various areas of their businesses and utilize the full right of the provisions of this chapter. No public place other than the ones enumerated in Section 32.808 shall be designated as a smoking area in its entirety.

SEC. 32.806. POSTING OF SIGNS.

No-smoking signs shall be specifically placed in retail food production and marketing establishments, including grocery stores and supermarkets open to the public, so they are clearly visible to persons upon entering the store, clearly visible to persons in checkout lines, and clearly visible to persons at meat and produce counters. In addition, signs shall be placed at all entrances to public places

and places of employment, except restaurants, that read substantially as follows: NO SMOKING EXCEPT IN DESIGNATED SMOKING AREAS. Restaurants shall either place a sign at the restaurant entrance as provided above or shall place signs in the restaurant interior which designate smoking or no-smoking areas. Signs which designate smoking or no-smoking areas established by this chapter shall be clearly, sufficiently, and conspicuously posted. The manner of such posting including the wording, size, color design, and place of posting whether on the walls, doors, tables, counters, stands or elsewhere shall be at the discretion of the owner, operator, manager, or other person having control of such room, building, or other place so long as clarity, sufficiency, and conspicuousness are apparent in communicating the intent of this chapter.

SEC. 32.806.5. RETALIATION AGAINST PERSON REQUESTING COMPLIANCE PROHIBITED.

No person shall intimidate or threaten any reprisal or effect any reprisal for the purpose of retaliating against another person because such other person seeks to attain compliance with the provisions of this chapter.

SEC. 32.807. GOVERNMENTAL AGENCY COOPERATION.

The Chief Administrative Officer shall annually request governmental and educational agencies involved with their specific business within the County of San Diego to establish local operating procedures to cooperate and comply with this chapter. As to premises within the County of San Diego which are owned, operated or leased by the Federal or State governments or by special districts, school districts or community college districts, the Chief Administrative Officer shall urge enforcement of the existing no-smoking prohibitions of those agencies and request cooperation with this chapter.

SEC. 32.808. EXCEPTIONS.

- (a) Private offices in places of employment assigned to only one person, provided that such offices have floor-to-ceiling walls and doors that shut. Smoking shall be permitted in such private offices only when the doors are closed, no smoke drifts into shared work areas, and when no non-smoking person is present.
- (b) Hotel and motel banquet, meeting, and assembly rooms, and areas and rooms while in use for private social functions.
- (c) Psychiatric facilities, including psychiatric units of hospitals, chemical dependency and substance abuse facilities, including dependency and substance abuse units within hospitals, and long-term skilled nursing facilities.
- (d) Stores that deal exclusively in tobacco products and accessories.
- (e) Bars, lounges and similar establishments where the primary business is sale of alcoholic beverages for consumption on the premises and which require all occupants to be 21 years of age or older.

- (f) Pool halls.
- (g) Card rooms.
- (h) Any owner or manager of a business or other establishment subject to this ordinance may apply to the Chief Administrative Officer for an exemption or modification of the provisions of this chapter due to unique or unusual circumstances or conditions.

SEC. 32.809. ENFORCEMENT AND APPEAL.

- (a) Violation of the provisions of this chapter or failure to comply with the mandatory requirements of this chapter shall constitute an infraction punishable as specified in Section 11.116 of the County Code.
- (b) The Chief Administrative Officer shall be responsible for compliance with this chapter when facilities which are owned, operated or leased by the County of San Diego are involved.
- (c) The owner, operator or manager of any public place or place of employment within the purview of this chapter shall comply herewith. Such owner, operator or manager shall post or cause to be posted all "No-Smoking" signs required by this chapter. Such owner, operator or manager shall inform any person who violates this chapter by smoking in a public place or place of employment not designated as a smoking area of the provisions of this chapter and may refuse services or sales to such persons.
- (d) It shall be the responsibility of employers to disseminate information concerning the provisions of this chapter to employees.
- (e) The Department of Health Services, prior to its initiating criminal proceedings, shall give owners, operators or managers of any public place or place of employment subject to this chapter written notice of violations and a thirty-day period after such notice to bring their operations into compliance.

SEC. 32.810. VIOLATIONS AND PENALTIES.

Any person who violates any provision of this chapter by smoking in a posted "No Smoking" area, or by failing to post or cause to be posted a "No Smoking" sign required by this chapter is guilty of an infraction, and upon conviction thereof, shall be punished by (1) a fine not exceeding fifty dollars (\$50) for a first violation; (2) a fine not exceeding One Hundred Dollars (\$100) for a second violation of the same ordinance within one year; (3) a fine not exceeding Two Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$250) for each additional violation of the same ordinance within one year.

SEC. 32.811. EDUCATION FOR NO-SMOKING PROGRAM.

The Chief Administrative Officer will work with all cities in the County through the City Managers to assure County-wide educational and legislative programs discouraging the harmful practice of smoking.

§43.1001 Purpose and Intent

The smoking of tobacco, or any other weed or plant, is a positive danger to health and is a material annoyance, inconvenience, discomfort, and health hazard to those who are present in confined spaces, and to small children playing in Tot Lots. Therefore, in order to serve the public health, safety and welfare, the declared purpose of this Division is to prohibit the smoking of tobacco, or any weed or plant, in Public Places and Places of Employment except in designated smoking areas identified by signs as set forth in Section 43.1005 of this Division. A further purpose of this Division is to prohibit smoking in and around public Tot Lots. (Amended 11–27–2000 by O–18892 N.S.)

§43.1002 Definitions

For purposes of this Division, the following definitions shall apply:

"Bar" means an establishment where the primary business is sale of alcoholic beverages for consumption on the premises and where all occupants are required to be twenty—one (21) years or older.

"Place of Employment" means any enclosed area under the control of a public or private employer which employees normally frequent during the course of employment. It includes work areas, private offices, employee lounges, conference rooms, and employee cafeterias. It does not include a private residence or a Public Place.

"Public Park" has the same meaning as in Municipal Code section 113.0103.

"Public Place" means any enclosed area where the public is routinely permitted without special invitation. It includes retail stores, retail service establishments, retail food production and marketing establishments, restaurants, theaters, waiting rooms, reception areas, educational facilities, health facilities, and public transportation facilities. It does not include a private residence.

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"Shared Work Area" means a room in a Place of Employment in which more than one person is assigned to perform work during the course of a work shift period. "Smoke" or "smoking" includes the carrying of a lighted pipe, lighted cigar, or lighted cigarette of any kind, or the lighting of a pipe, cigar, or cigarette of any kind.

"Tot Lot" means a play area designed for use by children that is located in a Public Park. The boundary of a Tot Lot is typically defined with concrete or wood, but may be defined by other material.

§43.1003 Prohibitions

- (a) It is unlawful to Smoke in a Public Place or Place of Employment except in a designated smoking area lawfully established in accordance with this Division.
- (b) It is unlawful to Smoke in a Tot Lot or within fifty feet of a Tot Lot. This prohibition does not apply to private property.
- (c) It is unlawful for an owner, operator, or manager of any facility, business, or agency to designate or maintain a smoking area in a Public Place or Place of Employment which does not comply with the requirements set forth in Sections 43.1004 and 43.1005 of this Division.
- (d) It is unlawful for an owner, operator, or manager of any facility, business, or agency to knowingly permit ashtrays or other ash receptacles to be located in areas where smoking is prohibited by this Division.
- (e) It is unlawful to intimidate, threaten any reprisal, or effect any reprisal, for the purpose of retaliating against another person who seeks to attain compliance with the provisions of this Division.

§43.1004 Designation of Smoking Areas

(a) Smoking areas may be designated in Public Places, including facilities where bingo games are conducted pursuant to Section 33.3401 et seq., by proprietors or other persons in charge except in retail stores, retail service establishments, food markets, food service lines, restaurant waiting areas, hospitals and health care facilities, public conveyances, theaters, auditoriums, public assembly

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rooms, meeting rooms, rest rooms, elevators, pharmacies, libraries, museums or galleries which are open to the public, including restaurants within the above specified establishments which are constructed so that smoke can drift into the non-restaurant part of the establishment, or any other place where smoking is prohibited by the Fire Marshal or by other law, ordinance or regulation. Smoking areas may not be designated in areas through which the public must walk to gain access to nonsmoking areas, unless such arrangement is structurally necessary. Where smoking areas are designated, existing physical barriers and ventilation systems shall be used to minimize the toxic effect of smoke in adjacent nonsmoking areas.

- (b) In those Public Places where smoking areas may be designated, including bingo facilities, no less than seventy percent (70%) of indoor seating capacity shall be designated as a nonsmoking area and, after July 1, 1995 no less than eighty percent (80%) of indoor seating capacity shall be designated as a nonsmoking area.
- (c) Smoking areas may be designated in Places of Employment only in fully enclosed areas that meet ventilation standards recommended by the National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health (NIOSH). Pursuant to NIOSH standards, the air from designated smoking areas must be exhausted directly outside and not recirculated within the building or mixed with the general dilution ventilation for the building. Smoking areas shall not be designated in a Shared Work Area of a Place of Employment. Smoking shall be permitted in designated smoking areas only when the doors are closed so that no smoke drifts outside the designated smoking area, and when nonsmoking persons are not present in the designated smoking area. Employers shall provide to employees written information concerning smoking at the Place of Employment, including the location of designated smoking and no–smoking areas.
- (d) Notwithstanding any other provisions of this Division, any facility or area may be designated in its entirety as a no-smoking area by the owner or manager thereof.

§43.1005 Posting of Signs

(a) The owner, operator or manager of any Public Place or Place of Employment shall ensure that signs are posted in accordance with this section to designate smoking and no-smoking areas.

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- (b) Signs which designate smoking or no-smoking areas established by this Division shall be clearly, sufficiently, and conspicuously posted in every room, building, or other place so covered by this Division.
- (c) No-smoking signs shall be specifically placed in retail food production and marketing establishments, including grocery stores and supermarkets open to the public, so that they are clearly visible to persons entering the store, and clearly visible to persons at meat and produce counters.
- (d) Signs shall be placed at all entrances to Public Places and Places of Employment, except restaurants, that read substantially as follows: NO SMOKING EXCEPT IN DESIGNATED AREAS.
- (e) Smoking shall be permitted in Public Places and Places of Employment, except restaurants, only in areas containing a sign that reads substantially as follows: DESIGNATED SMOKING AREA.
- (f) Restaurants shall either place a sign at the restaurant entrance as provided above or shall place signs in the restaurant interior which designate smoking or no-smoking areas. The manner consisting of posting signs required by this Division, including the wording, size, color, design, and place of posting whether on the walls, doors, tables, counters, stands or elsewhere shall be at the discretion of the owner, operator, manager, or other person having control of such room, building, or other place so long as clarity, sufficiency, and conspicuousness are apparent in communicating the intent of this Division.

§43.1006 Governmental Agency Cooperation

The City Manager shall annually request such governmental and educational agencies involved with their specific business within the City of San Diego to establish local operating procedures to cooperate and comply with this ordinance. In Federal, State, County, and special school districts within the City of San Diego, the City Manager shall urge enforcement of their existing no–smoking prohibitions and request cooperation with this ordinance.

§43.1007 Exemptions

(a) No-smoking areas are not required in hotel and motel meeting and assembly rooms rented to guests, areas and rooms while in use for private social functions, private hospital rooms, psychiatric facilities, including psychiatric

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units of hospitals, chemical dependency and substance abuse facilities, including chemical dependency and substance abuse treatment units within hospitals, long term nursing facilities, jails, bars, and stores that deal exclusively in tobacco products and accessories.

- (b) Nothing in this Division shall be construed to prohibit smoking by any theatrical or musical artist while such artist is performing on stage, provided that smoking is a bona fide part of the act and that no other laws, ordinances, or regulations are violated thereby.
- (c) Any owner or manager of a business or other establishment subject to this Division may apply to the City Manager for an exemption or modification of the provisions of this Division due to unique or unusual circumstances or conditions.
- (d) Criteria for Exemption

The City Manager, or a designee of the City Manager, shall have the sole authority and discretion to grant or deny requests for exemptions submitted under Section 43.1007. In passing decision on such applications, the City Manager, or designee, shall take due account of the following considerations, as they reasonably apply to each application:

- (1) Whether the applicant has demonstrated an adequate understanding of the requirements of this Division, such that it is clear that the application is not based on a misunderstanding of the minimum requirements of compliance.
- (2) The extent of efforts the business has made toward compliance with the requirements of this Division.
- (3) The physical structure of the area for which the exemption is sought.
- (4) The number of employees in or near the area for which the exemption is sought.
- (5) The nature and frequency of contact that the applicant's business has with the public.
- (6) Whether physical disabilities of employees would render compliance with the requirements of this Division unreasonably difficult.

The burden of proof shall be upon the applicant to show by substantial evidence that such unique or unusual circumstances exist, in respect to the foregoing considerations, that there is a necessary and compelling reason to grant an exemption.

§43.1008 Duty to Enforce

- (a) The City Manager shall be responsible for compliance with this Division when facilities which are owned, operated or leased by The City of San Diego are involved. The City Manager shall provide business license applicants with copies of this Division.
- (b) The owner, operator or manager of any facility, business or agency shall post or cause to be posted all signs required by Section 43.1005 of this Division. Owners, operators, managers or employees of same shall be required to orally inform persons violating this Division of the provisions thereof. The duty to inform such violator shall arise when such owner, operator, manager or employee of same becomes aware of such violation.
- (c) It shall be the responsibility of employers to disseminate information concerning the provisions of this Division to employees.
- (d) Any owner, operator, manager, or employee of any facility, business, or agency who after having informed a violator of this Division of the provisions herein continues to witness said violation, shall have the express right to refuse business or service to that violator.

§43.1009 Violations and Penalties

- (a) Any person who violates any provision of this Division by smoking in a posted "No Smoking" area is guilty of an infraction and, upon conviction thereof, shall be punished by a fine of not less than ten dollars (\$10) nor more than one hundred dollars (\$100).
- (b) An owner, operator or manager of any facility, business or agency who knowingly permits patrons to violate Section 43.1003, or who knowingly fails to discharge any duty arising from the provisions of this Division, is guilty of a misdemeanor and subject to any enforcement option or penalty provision set

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forth in Chapter One of this Code to address violations of law. (Renumbered from Sec. 45.0109 and amended 3–8–1994 by O–18047 N.S.)

§43.1010 Education for No-Smoking Program

The City Manager, through the office of Citizens Assistance and Information, shall engage in a continuing program to inform and clarify the purposes of this Division to citizens affected by it, and to guide owners, operators and managers in their compliance.

The City shall leave the responsibility of conducting a public education campaign, regarding the health-degrading aspects of smoking, to other governmental and health agencies equipped with the needed expertise to conduct such campaigns. (Renumbered from Sec. 45.0110 and amended 3-8-1994 by O-18047 N.S.)

Supervisor Roberts is going to talk about the California Air Resources Board report and its implications for decision-makers like how to deal with a life or death issue: What can you do to protect the public from exposure to a toxic air contaminant and known carcinogen?

Of the three options presented in the staff report, we urge you to support #3. Kicking the issue up to the state will probably mean that nothing will happen. Option #2 is moot, we believe. Enclosed transit stations are already required to be smoke-free by the state labor code and by municipal ordinance. If you are concerned about making all bus stops smoke-free, you could certainly do a phase-in and just include trolley stations and bus shelters in the beginning.

We are working with jurisdictions throughout the county on smoke-free policies, and today we find that the question is not so much Why?, but How? How will it work? How will we educate our staff and clients, and how will they respond? How much voluntary compliance will we get from smokers? How much will it cost, both for signage and administrative and enforcement? You probably have questions we haven't even thought of.

The American Lung Association is prepared to help you work through these issues. We can provide technical assistance on educational messages for riders and smokers. We can provide ideas for how your staff can implement the new rules effectively and efficiently. Now more than ever, "No Smoking" is truly a sign of the times, and we wish we were in a position to pay for the necessary signs. What we can do is help identify sources of signs such as the County, as well as recruit partners such as the California Smokers Helpline to help out with signage and messaging.

We urge you to move forward and we are looking forward to working with you.







MTS: COMPREHENSIVE OPERATIONAL ANALYSIS: SERVICE DEVELOPMENT PLAN

RECOMMENDATION:

That the Board of Directors: (1) submit the proposed Service Development Plan for public hearing; and (2) approve the recommended public hearing schedule.

Budget Impact

If approved, implementation of the Service Development Plan is expected to result in an annual operating subsidy savings of \$5 million.

DISCUSSION:

The goal of the Comprehensive Operational Analysis (COA) is to evaluate and restructure MTS's services and operations to more efficiently and effectively serve the region's transit needs and meet regional transportation goals within the constraints of the current financial and operating environment.

At its September 22, 2005, meeting, the MTS Board of Directors approved a Draft Service Development Plan for public review. The draft plan represented a completely redeveloped system of MTS services based on technical analysis and fieldwork, as well as input from operators, passengers, and the public, received through outreach efforts, Stakeholder Planning Sessions with project committee members and other interested stakeholders, and other public comments received via phone, fax, e-mail, and U.S. mail.



The draft plan was based on the Board-adopted Regional Service Concept, which includes the following three tiers of service:

- <u>Urban Network</u> Rich network of services that support spontaneous use for a
 wide range of travel needs within areas demonstrating sufficient all-day transit
 demand. Frequent services (15-minute or better base frequencies) are planned
 on key corridors within the urban network area.
- Commuter Services Commuter services have been established where a
 "critical mass" of demand exists between key origins and destinations. Four
 routes have been developed to serve Downtown, Kearny Mesa, University City,
 and Sorrento Valley from South Bay, East County, and the Interstate 15 (I-15)
 corridor.
- 3. <u>Community-Based Services</u> Community-based services provide basic mobility where and when services can be efficiently tailored to individual community needs. We have been working with local jurisdictions and community representatives to develop community service options for areas where all-day fixed-route service is not warranted.

PROPOSED SERVICE DEVELOPMENT PLAN

Over the past four months, the draft plan was reviewed by individuals, communities, local jurisdictions, social services, academic institutions, industry leaders, and other stakeholders. Based on this outreach and additional analysis, the draft plan has been revised. These changes have been incorporated into a final Service Development Plan that is proposed for review through public hearing and adoption by the MTS Board in March 2006.

The following attachments provide additional details on the proposed Service Development Plan:

Attachment A - Regional and Sub-Regional Maps of the proposed transit network

Attachment B - Individual maps for each proposed route

Attachment C - Itineraries (left/right sheets) for each proposed route

Attachment D - Weekday frequency and span of service for each proposed route

Attachment E - Maps indicating changes to each existing route

Attachment F - Productivity and cost-efficiency analysis of deleted segments

Community-Based Services

As originally envisioned, community-based services should be the result of a cooperative effort between the community and MTS in which the community works together to identify specific transit markets that demonstrate a sufficient demand to ensure a minimum level of productivity. In turn, MTS staff provides technical assistance to develop a service that is specific to the identified demand. The transit markets can be preexisting travel markets, such as school demand, or developed by organizing individual travel needs into defined travel patterns, such as establishing a specific time and day of the week to serve each important destination. By combining individual trips together, community services are better utilized and thus more productive and cost-effective.

Unfortunately, through our collaborative planning efforts, local communities were unable to organize their travel needs into defined travel patterns. The only identified travel patterns that demonstrated sufficient demand were school trips on existing routes. Therefore, most groups requested a lifeline level of general circulation through their communities. As a result, the community-based services proposed in the Service Development Plan are fixed-route circulators that would operate every 60 minutes throughout the weekday. Through continued collaboration and cooperation with local communities, we hope to eventually transform these routes into more market-specific services tailored to the critical demands of each community.

The priority for developing community-based services was to reinstate limited service in areas where fixed-routes were proposed for deletion in the original draft plan. Not all areas losing service were proposed to be backfilled with these services. Due to limited funding, only areas where a significant transit void exists have been considered for service. The community-based services proposed for implementation are:

Attachment G provides the productivity and cost-efficiency measures for the existing service segments that are proposed to be replaced with the community-based services (listed above). As evident in Attachment G, without active community support, marketing, funding, and ridership, we do not envision that these services will be very productive and cost-effective. More importantly, committing resources to providing these services results in a lost opportunity to provide more productive services elsewhere within the system. Therefore, we propose that these community-based services are evaluated after six months of operations to identify whether revisions or reductions in service are warranted.

Community-based service proposals that were developed but are not recommended for implementation at this time due to duplication or proximity to other fixed-route include:

Fixed-Route Services - Significant Changes from the Draft Plan

The proposed Service Development Plan reflects changes made to the original draft plan based on public outreach, addition of community-based services, and MTS's capital program funding shortfall.

 <u>Public Outreach</u> – Route-specific adjustments have been made based on significant public concerns expressed during our outreach program. Most of these changes restore service to segments of existing routes that were originally proposed for elimination.

These segment extensions typically result in a reduction in frequency on the base route to accommodate the increase in route mileage. The following identifies the major changes.

 <u>Community-Based Services</u> – As indicated in the section above, ten community-based services are being proposed for implementation accounting for roughly 24,400 revenue hours of service per year. Given our funding limitations, an equal amount of resources was reduced from other routes to accommodate these services. • <u>Capital Program Funding Shortfall</u> - The funding shortfall in MTS's capital program requires that we continue to aggressively identify opportunities to address high-priority capital needs, including bus and rail vehicle replacement/rehabilitation, infrastructure and facility needs, and safety and security issues. Given that \$29 million of the \$50 million FY 2007 capital budget deficit is attributed to the capitalization of ongoing maintenance costs, we propose to reduce the annual operating budget by \$5 million to fund a portion of this capitalized maintenance. Therefore, some of the new services originally proposed for implementation, including express buses, have been removed from the service plan and are now being recommended for implementation only when new sources of operating funds are secured.

The following identifies reductions made to routes in the original draft plan to fund the community-based services and capital needs.

27	Frequencies reduced from 15 minutes to 30 minutes. Change consistent with current schedules.
35	Frequencies reduced from 15 minutes to 30 minutes. Change consistent with current schedules.
48/49	Frequencies reduced from 15 minutes to 30 minutes. Change consistent with current schedules.
88	Route 88 (downtown circulator from Little Italy to East Village via Market Street) originally proposed as a new route has been eliminated from the plan.
115	Frequencies reduced from 30 minutes to 60 minutes after 7:00 pm. Change consistent with current schedules.
150	Frequencies reduced on Route 150 from 30 minutes to 60 minutes in midday. Still represents improvement over current schedules.
923	Frequencies reduced from 15 minutes to 30 minutes in peak, and 30 minutes to 60 minutes in midday. Still represents improvement over current schedules.
A	Route A (Escondido/I-15/Mira Mesa – Sorrento Valley/University City) originally proposed as a new route has been eliminated from the plan.
B, 20	Route B (Escondido – Downtown via I-15 and Mid-City) has been replaced with Route 20 until I-15 BRT lanes and priorities are constructed along I-15 and SR 94 and operating funds are available from TransNet.

C, 870	Route C (El Cajon/Santee – Kearny Mesa/University City/Sorrento Valley) originally proposed as a new route has been replaced with current Route 870 from El Cajon/Santee to Kearny Mesa.
D, 960	Route D (East Chula Vista/National City/Mid-City – Kearny Mesa/University City/Sorrento Valley) originally proposed as a new route has been replaced with current Route 960 from Euclid Avenue Station to Kearny Mesa/University City.

ADA Paratransit Service

Changes in the fixed-route network will impact the geographic coverage of Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) paratransit services. While some areas will see a slight increase in ADA coverage, several areas will no longer be eligible for ADA service. With the addition of community-based services, the amount of service coverage reduced from the existing network is minimal. Therefore, our estimated impact to current ADA passengers (those that that have used the service within the past six months) is minimal at 20 to 30 passengers.

To provide a smoother transition for those impacted, we propose that the existing geographic coverage for ADA service be retained for a period of six months after fixed-route service changes are implemented. While this proposal exceeds the requirements for ADA service and will result in additional operating costs during the six-month period, it will provide existing riders with additional time to find alternative transportation options or make lifestyle changes accordingly.

This proposal was reviewed by the Accessible Services Advisory Committee (ASAC) on January 19, 2006. The committee was in support of our proposal and appreciated the additional six months of service retention. The committee also complimented MTS planning staff on the public outreach conducted to date and passed a motion requesting that outreach is continued with the same amount of effort in support of service implementation.

RIDERSHIP AND BUDGET IMPACT

As stated above, the proposed budget target for Phase II of the COA is an annual operating subsidy savings of \$5 million. This target is expected to be realized through a projected net increase in ridership and operational efficiencies as summarized below.

PROJECTED BUDGET IMPACT OF COA

Revenue Increase	\$2 million

Ridership – One of the primary service objectives of the COA is to establish a frequent network of services within the urban areas. Industry research indicates that improving frequency has a positive impact on ridership. Increasing frequencies on a route from 15 minutes to 10 minutes could be expected to yield ridership increases of 20 to 25 percent. A much more substantial increase from 30 minutes to 15 minutes could be expected to increase ridership by as much as 50 to 100 percent. As a conservative estimate, given the frequency

improvements within the urban area and accounting for ridership losses on deleted segments, we estimate that the Service Development Plan would yield a net increase in daily passengers of 8,700, which translates into a projected net increase in annual revenues of \$2 million. More details on this analysis will be presented at the February 9, 2006, meeting.

Operational Efficiencies – Another objective of the COA is to develop more
efficient routes, schedules, and route assignments. Through the planning
process, routes have been optimized to ensure that buses deployed are in
revenue service to the maximum extent. In addition, opportunities exist to
reassign routes between contracts and possibly operators. Overall, we expect to
yield an annual subsidy savings of \$3 million through operational efficiencies.

PUBLIC HEARING

Given the significance of the changes proposed, we recommend that two public hearings be conducted prior to the Board's decision on the Service Development Plan. Our proposal would be to hold two meetings in downtown San Diego because of the easy transit access from all parts of the region. Specifically we propose the following dates, times, and venue for the public hearings:



No formal Board action will be taken on March 2. All public comments received on March 2 will be forwarded to the MTS Board for consideration on March 9. The approval of the Service Development Plan will be requested on March 9. To accommodate anticipated interest in the COA, we propose to conduct the March 9 MTS Board meeting at Golden Hall (Plaza Hall room) at the San Diego Concourse. Proper notification of the venue change for the March 9 Board meeting will be issued. In addition, Take Ones will be posted onboard vehicles at least 15 days in advance of March 2 to notify passengers

of the upcoming public hearings. If approved, implementation of the service changes is scheduled to begin in June 2006.

That the Board of Directors receive this report for information regarding the 25th and Commercial/Cesar E. Chavez Station Improvement Project.

Budget Impact

None.

DISCUSSION:

The 25th and Commercial/Cesar E. Chavez Station Improvement Project has been presented to the MTS Board on five previous occasions (May, 13, September 16, November 4 and 18, 2004, and February 24, 2005). This Orange Line upgrade project at one of our system's older stations added lighting enhancements, station shelters, additional seating, and upgraded landscaping. The construction budget for the upgrade project was \$350,000.

In addition, this project gave us an opportunity to work with area artists and residents who secured an art grant from the City of San Diego Commission for Arts and Culture through the National Endowment for the Arts (NEA). Artwork honoring Cesar E. Chavez was requested in our community workshops; this independent art funding allowed for the fulfillment of the community's request at no cost to MTS or the San Diego Association of Governments (SANDAG).









The artwork, which was previously approved by the Board, includes on its westbound platform an 18-foot tall eagle sculpture with directional signs indicating destinations like the Villa Montezuma Museum, Chicano Park, the Memorial Library, and the Central Village business district. The art installation also includes panels in English and Spanish with an appropriate community-related quote from Cesar E. Chavez ("We cannot seek achievement for ourselves and forget about progress and prosperity for our community.") The new seating elements located on both the westbound and eastbound platforms have mosaics illustrating the life story of Cesar E. Chavez. The art is entitled "Achievement/Progress/Community: In the Spirit of Cesar E. Chavez." The budget for all of the artwork and art installation was \$60,000, which was paid through the NEA grant. Attachments A and B show images of the metal sculpture and the mosaic work.

On March 23, 2006, after the MTS Board meeting, the City of San Diego Commission for Arts and Culture will host an "unveiling" of the completed artwork and dedication panel. The Board and the public are invited to this community event (Attachment C). In addition to the title of the art in English and Spanish, the dedication panel will have the following information:




