MINUTES

1. Roll Call

Chairman Mathis called the Board meeting to order at 9:08 a.m. A roll call sheet listing Board member attendance is attached.

3. Public Comment

Clive Richard: Mr. Richard stated that Senate Bill 1685 will give the region an opportunity to fund current transit operations and maintenance. He also stated that future projects should come with their own funding packages for the life of the project. He added that he hoped CEO Jablonski would speak strongly in favor of transit interests related to quality of life.

Mr. Richard also reported that he was recently on a trolley when the operator noticed a fire and called in an alert. Mr. Richard stated that it didn't appear anyone was aware of the fire, and there were children playing nearby. Chairman Mathis stated that staff would like to have the details so the operator could be identified and appropriately recognized.

Lorraine Leighton: Ms. Leighton reported that she discovered pot seeds in one of the restrooms along Route 872 on Sunday between 9:15 a.m. and 9:30 a.m. She also presented an item that contained a razor blade that she found in a restroom along Route No. 702.

CONSENT ITEM:

Action on Recommended Consent Items

Mr. Emery moved to approve Consent Agenda Items No. 6 and 7. Mr. Clabby seconded the motion, and the vote was 10 to 0 in favor. Agenda Item No. 6 was reintroduced later in the meeting, and the subsequent staff presentation and Board discussion is contained in pages 2 and 3 of these minutes.

CLOSED SESSION:

24. Closed Session Items (ADM 122)

There were no Closed Session items.

NOTICED PUBLIC HEARINGS

25. There were no noticed public hearings.

DISCUSSION ITEMS:

30. MTS: C Street Crossover Project Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) and Budget Transfer (OPS 960.6)

Mr. Paul Jablonski, MTS CEO, reported that he has been working with Gary Gallegos, SANDAG Executive Director, to eliminate the need for joint action on items like this one, and an agreement to memorialize that may be brought back to the Board for action. He stated that, under such an agreement, if the MTS Board approved a budget change, that item would be presented on the Consent Agenda at SANDAG.

Mr. Wayne Terry, Chief Operating Officer – Trolley, provided the Board with a history of the C Street Crossover Project and explained how a paneled crossover installation works. He then explained that the encased high voltage traction power cables were not installed to code and provided visuals to illustrate where corrections needed to be made. He added that staff is in the process of determining who is responsible so cost recovery can be sought. In response to a comment by Mr. Clabby, Mr. Terry stated that staff has no evidence that a change order was signed to approve the moving on the conduit, and that will be investigated.

Action Taken

Mr. Emery moved to (1) authorize the CEO to execute an MOU (in substantially the same form as Attachment A of the agenda item) with SANDAG for emergency work performed by SANDAG related to the C Street Crossover Project; and (2) approve a fund transfer for CIP 11199 – Miscellaneous Capital (All Divisions) with Federal to SANDAG's City College station Realignment Project (CIP 1049400) (in substantially the form as shown in Attachment B of the agenda item – Budget Transfer Summary). Mr. Rindone seconded the motion, and the vote was 11 to 0 in favor.

2. <u>Approval of Minutes</u> (Taken Out of Order)

Mr. Clabby moved to approve the minutes of the August 21, 2008, MTS Board of Directors meeting. Mr. Roberts seconded the motion, and the vote was 11 to 0 in favor.

CONSENT AGENDA (Continued)

Mr. Monroe moved to pull Agenda Item No. 6, MTS: <u>Annual Anticipated Disadvantaged</u>
<u>Business Enterprise Participation Level (AADPL) Methodology for Federal Fiscal Year 2008-2009</u> for a staff presentation and Board discussion. Mr. Emery seconded the motion, and the vote was 11 to 0 in favor.

Ms. Tiffany Lorenzen, MTS General Counsel, reviewed the Federal Transit Administration's (FTA) regulatory requirements for Disadvantaged Business Enterprise (DBE) participation. She reviewed the methodology used to arrive at the desired participation level and reported that calculations are performed for each type of contract (construction, services, and durable goods) and as a mean average for the whole. Ms. Lorenzen then provided the Board with detail on MTS's outreach efforts in this area. She reported that MTS's DBE liaison makes herself available to DBE contractors and helps them put together their bid packages.

Ms. Lorenzen confirmed for Mr. Young that, since the FTA specifies the methodology to be used in calculating the AADPL, the Board is being asked to receive the report, not approve the goals. Mr. Young felt that the overall participation level of 1.66 percent was not good and that outreach efforts should be more aggressive in order to increase DBE participation. Ms. Lorenzen stated that, in spite of increased outreach efforts by MTS, DBE participation has actually decreased. She stated that DBE contractors have told her that the Caltrans certification process is too cumbersome. She added that when DBE requirements were dropped in the FTA regulations, there was also a decrease in the number of contractors that sought certification. Ms. Lorenzen reported that MTS will accept firms that are DBE-certified by any other agencies that certify. Ms. Lorenzen advised Mr. Young that if MTS succeeded in getting more participation, the mean calculation would go up, thereby increasing the AADPL. Ms. Lorenzen added that MTS has done more outreach in the last six years than in the years preceding that period but that she couldn't confirm that effort resulted in increased participation. She stated that MTS participates in many outreach activities, works with the FTA and business owners, and welcomes participants. She stated that MTS wants them to be included. Mr. Young stated that MTS should look for opportunities to have discussions on how outreach can be improved. Ms. Lorenzen stated that staff could come back to the Board with more detail on outreach that has taken place in the past and proposals regarding future outreach.

Mr. Roberts agreed with Mr. Young's comments and suggested that staff make recommendations regarding interaction with groups more involved in the community that could have a greater effect on the participation level. In response to a question from Mr. Roberts, Ms. Lorenzen reported that MTS is participating jointly with Los Angeles Metro, Orange County Transit, and SANDAG in a disparity study that should be completed by late 2009. Mr. Roberts requested that more detail on this study be brought back to the Board. In response to another comment by Mr. Roberts, Ms. Lorenzen stated that MTS has very few construction projects – most are now SANDAG projects – and that this category has the highest rate of DBE participation. She referred to page B6 of the report and pointed out that MTS has only five construction projects for a total of \$427,000. She stated that Professional Services is now MTS's largest category. Mr. Roberts stated that MTS should participate in partnerships that would increase the number of businesses seeking certification as DBEs. Ms. Lorenzen stated that she would speak with the Caltrans liaison about participating in their outreach. Chairman Mathis encouraged Mr. Young to provide staff with the names of community organizations that could be contacted in an effort to conduct more effective outreach.

In response to a question from Mr. Monroe, Ms. Lorenzen stated that contracts in the categories mentioned earlier are awarded on a cost basis. Mr. Monroe stated that he would like to see how many DBE's submitted bids for projects, and Ms. Lorenzen stated that contract award agenda items presented at future meetings could include that information. Ms. Lorenzen advised Mr. Monroe that, as a result of past litigation, there are no penalties for failing to reach DBE goals. Mr. Monroe asked if MTS could set goals higher than those that result from the FTA-mandated methodology.

Mr. Roberts stated that the Board has a desire to improve in this area but noted that many of the items that MTS purchases, as outlined in the agenda attachment, are very specialized in nature. He added that MTS would be lucky to find any contractors in San Diego for these types of items much less DBE contractors.

Chairman Mathis stated that, if businesses are declining to become certified because the process is too onerous, maybe that process needs to be looked at.

Action Taken

Mr. Young moved to receive this report. Mr. Monroe seconded that motion, and the vote was 11 to 0 in favor.

REPORT ITEMS:

45. MTS: Preliminary FY 2008 Operations Budget Status Report (FIN 310.2)

Mr. Jablonski pointed out that MTS did well in spite of the fact that it was a difficult year. He stated that fares were raised primarily because of the increase in gas prices, and the revenue projections provided by the consultant were actually understated. He pointed out that ridership usually decreases as a result of fare increases, but, because gas prices were so high, ridership actually increased. He added that the ridership increase generated \$4.5 million to the budget. He stated that while these are positive events, there are still challenges ahead related to the uncertainty of state funding and future levels of sales tax revenues, which will probably remain flat.

Mr. Larry Marinesi, MTS Budget Manager, reviewed the details of the January fare adjustments, revenues and expenses compared to budget for transit operators, and subsidy revenue compared to amended budget. Mr. Jablonski pointed out that MTS experienced a \$1.00 increase in the cost of diesel over a 60-day period that resulted in a \$2 million increase in fuel expense. Mr. Marinesi then provided a comparison to amended budget for revenue less expenses and reported that MTS did not have to use reserves or carryover to balance the budget at year end.

Action Taken

Mr. Emery moved to receive an MTS preliminary FY 2008 operations budget report. Mr. Rindone seconded the motion, and the vote was 10 to 0 in favor.

60. Chairman's Report

The Chairman made no report.

61. Audit Oversight Committee Chairman's Report

No report was given.

62. Chief Executive Officer's Report

Mr. Jablonski reported that he recently traveled to San Francisco for California Transit Association Strategic Plan Task Force meeting. He reported that he is the Chairman of this task force.

63. Board Member Communications

Trolley Power Substation Problem: At Mr. Emery's request, Mr. Jablonski provided an overview of the recent problems with a trolley power substation that overloaded during a Chargers game and temporarily shut down service. Mr. Terry explained that electricity burned through the contact wire, and it took 3 ½ hours to repair the problem. He stated that operations were continued on a single track during the repair period, and service was restored by the end of the game. He stated that most Charger fans were transported to the game before the overload occurred.

Mr. Jablonski pointed out that, when the Central Train Control system is completely installed, these types of problems will be detected immediately, and, in this case, disruption of service would have been prevented. He also reported that bus service carried 2,700 people to the game compared to last year's number of about 2,300 per game.

APTA Annual Meeting: At Mr. Monroe's request, Mr. Jablonski reported that information regarding the APTA Annual Meeting and badges for the EXPO with be forthcoming in the near future. He stated that MTS is in the process of filling the 400 volunteer slots that are open. He added that Board and staff members will be able attend sessions and just about anyone can have access to the EXPO.

Ms. Atkins reported that there are often an inadequate number of taxicabs at the airport, and she has had to wait as long as 15 minutes for a cab. Mr. Jablonski stated that MTS will have a welcome desk at each airport terminal and the Santa Fe Depot where arriving conference attendees can get information on transportation options to their hotels. He stated that Route 992 can be used and that MTS is also providing a secondary route on the first two and last two days of the conference that will also serve the conference hotels.

Mr. Young reported that he has brought up the shortage of cabs with the Airport Authority, and they are looking into this problem. He also stated that he had discussions with people at the Seattle APTA Board Member Seminar who were interested in how MTS manages taxicab operations in San Diego. He suggested that staff host some type of session on this at a future APTA conference.

There were no additional Public Comments.

65. Next Meeting Date

The next regularly scheduled Board meeting is Thursday, September 25, 2008.

Chairman Mathis adjourned the meeting at 10:17 a.m.

OPPOSITION

Chairman Mathis, and Members of the Board.

I am Mitch Beauchamp, formerly an MTDB and San Diego Trolley Director, representing National City. Since leaving my 8 years of service on those Boards, I have been involved with restoring a two-railroad company service to the San Diego — Tijuana region. Part of the effort was to open the Desert Line and accessing another operator to that line and having two rail lines serve San Diego, as with most large cities in the U.S.

The main effort in providing competitive rail service was to open the Desert Line by clearing the tunnels and getting the rock slides removed. Concurrent with that was getting the Mexican portion of the line in a contractually compatible condition. My presence before you today is to present you with the request to move forward with selling the Desert Line to a responsible rail operator so that (1) the liability faced by MTS in the operation of that line is removed; (2) the sale of the line can relieve a portion of the budgetary problems now faced by MTS; (3) the necessary investment can be made in the privately-owned rail line to upgrade the system to handle the anticipated volumes from a competitive Union Pacific Railroad; and (4) hazardous liquid petroleum cargo and empty gas tank cars can be removed from the San Diego urban region and, particularly right in front of the Convention Center and MTS headquarters.

By ordering an appraisal and offer to sell of the Desert Line to a responsible operator, you can move forward positively on the issue of the access to the San Diego and Tijuana markets by a viable, competitive, Class I railroad and restore the full value of the gift of John D. Spreckels to the residents of the region. As with all sales of MTS right of way in the past, the retention of an easement and right of reversion by failure to retain as a transportation feature would be assumed as part of the sale.

I thank you for the opportunity to present this proposal to you and ask that you share the vision of John D. Spreckels and provide leadership in this important action.

- under the provisions of MTS Board Policy No. 52 (4E), authorize the Chief 3. Executive Officer (CEO) to award a sole-source, fixed-price contract to Siemens to repair SDTI LRV No. 2052.

This action requires a two-thirds vote of all members of the Board of Directors.

Budget Impact

The estimated cost is between \$400,000.00 and \$750,000.00 for the completed repair, which would be encumbered under the LRV Maintenance line item of the FY 09 operating budget. This line item would be replenished from the insurance reimbursement funds less the \$25,000.00 deductible. The total impact is therefore estimated to be \$25,000.00.



Executive Committee Recommendation

At its meeting on September 18, 2008, the Executive Committee recommended forwarding this item to the Board of Directors for approval.

DISCUSSION:

On March 14, 2008, SDTI LRV No. 2052 was involved in a collision with a full-sized pickup truck going approximately 35 miles per hour. The truck failed to stop at a crossing protected by warning bells and gates and entered into the path of the approaching 2-car train. The train could not avoid the collision and struck the pickup truck broadside pushing the vehicle approximately 80 feet. The collision and the continued forward momentum resulted in substantial front and side body damage. The impact also caused the derailment of the A-End power bogie of the LRV. Other damage included major structural and component damage of the A-end and B-side of the LRV. Major visible damages include the coupler, front and side body panels, doors leaf, and steps within the doors and windows. LRV No. 2052 also sustained major under-car component damage to the main propulsion unit (chopper) and associated equipment.

After careful inspection by staff, it was determined that it is in the best interest of MTS to contact Siemens, the original equipment manufacturer (OEM), as Siemens has the technical expertise and facilities for these types of repairs. Siemens would certify that the repairs are properly made, install new equipment, warranty the repair and equipment, and test the entire car system in accordance with SDTI and California Public Utilities Commission standards. SDTI does not have the technical expertise or staff to perform this type of major rework. Damages to the LRV are extensive and require specialized equipment (i.e., jigs, stands, and tools). Because the electrical wiring raceways are in the damaged area, all electrical systems require rework, new wiring harness and connections, new and repaired equipment installed, and system testing to ensure system functionality. Siemens would perform the required electrical tests and commission the electrical system and vehicle to ensure that the repaired systems are as new or in a safe and reliable condition to return the car to revenue services.

SDTI does not have copies of the structural drawings for the SD 100 vehicles. These drawings are considered proprietary in nature and a trade secret of Siemens. Therefore, Siemens is considered the sole-source provider of accident damage repair services for the SD 100 vehicle.

Siemens proposed and SDTI concurs that the repair process be undertaken in four phases.

- Phase 1: Detailed investigation of the vehicle in order to understand the magnitude of the damage. The vehicle will require partial disassembly in the affected areas.
- Phase 2: Define all necessary work and a list of parts that need to be repaired or replaced.
- Phase 3: LRV vehicle will be reassembled and all work documented.

Phase 4: LRV will be tested in Sacramento and commissioned at the SDTI

maintenance facility pursuant to Siemens Series VI documentation for the

SD 100 vehicle.

Staff is working with Risk Management staff regarding recovery of all costs and liabilities from the insurance carrier.

The total estimated proposed cost to repair the vehicle ranges between \$400,000.00 and \$750,000.00. The \$25,000.00 amount is the insurance deductible portion, which SDTI must pay directly to Siemens.

Overall, the proposal submitted by Siemens was found to be responsive for the repairs necessary to meet the needs and to return the LRV back into revenue service in a reliable and safe condition.

MTS: NEW FLYER BUSES FOR CHULA VISTA - CONTRACT AMENDMENT

RECOMMENDATION:

That the MTS Board of Directors authorize the Chief Executive Officer (CEO) to execute MTS Doc. No. G1101.2-07 (in substantially the same format as Attachment A) with New Flyer of America, Inc. to purchase five 40-foot, low-floor, compressed natural gas (CNG) transit buses.

Budget Impact

Encumber \$1,940,731.55 to MTS Capital Improvement Project (CIP) Chula Vista 40-Foot CNG Low-floor Buses (CIP 11250-1300) and \$150,407 for MTS payment to the Franchise Tax Board for sales tax to CIP 11250-1300. This would leave a balance of \$298,861 remaining in the procurement line item.

DISCUSSION:

The Chula Vista transit service currently operates several buses that are past their useful lives and in need of replacement. The operation is also currently below the recommended spare-bus ratio and in need of additional buses to adequately cover peak service and improve the spare-bus ratio to 20%. This purchase would result in the retirement of several old diesel buses replacing them with new, clean CNG-powered transit buses.



In February 2008, MTS awarded a contract to New Flyer for 35-foot and 40-foot low-floor transit coaches with options available on an as-needed basis for a period of five years. MTS staff has had discussions with New Flyer to finalize technical issues and is ready to award a contract amendment with options for five new 40-foot, low-floor buses. Following award of the contract, it is expected that the buses would be delivered within four to five months (approximately February 2009).

In accordance with federal regulations, the MTS Internal Auditor is conducting the preaward audit. This audit confirms that New Flyer, the manufacturer of the buses, meets all Buy America and Federal Motor Vehicle Safety Standards compliance requirements.

MTS: LIABILITY CLAIMS ANALYSIS REPORT

RECOMMENDATION:

That the Board of Directors receive the Liability Claims Analysis Report (Attachment A) for MTS, San Diego Transit Corporation (SDTC), and San Diego Trolley, Inc. (SDTI).

Budget Impact

No budget impact resulting from receiving the Liability Claims Analysis Report.

DISCUSSION:

The Liability Claims Analysis Report (Attachment A) is the ninth since the decision to utilize third-party administrators (TPAs) was put into effect in March 2002. The report identifies pertinent information regarding claims management, such as the number of claims, claim payouts, and unfunded incurred liabilities for MTS, SDTC, and SDTI through June 2008. The report encompasses loss information data from MTS, SDTC, and SDTI

In an effort to save costs and provide for greater efficiencies, the administration of liability claims was brought in house. McDowell Adjusting Company (McDowell) was contracted to act as the TPA for third-party liability claims through September 2007 and CorVel Enterprise Comp, Inc. - Hazelrigg Risk Management Services (Hazelrigg) is the TPA for workers' compensation claims.



A total of 6,097 liability incidents have been submitted to the TPA for processing since March 2002. Of those claims, 97% (5,892) have been closed. During fiscal year 2008, a total of 438 unique liability claims occurred compared to 853 in 2007. However, formal unique claims that require an individual to submit the MTS Agency Claim Form to the Board totaled 189 claims in fiscal year 2008 compared to 228 in 2007. This 17% decrease in unique-incident formal claims reflects the ongoing efforts in employee management, training, and claims administration. The total for all formal claims associated with these incidents reduced by 20% from 246 claims (FY 07) to 197 (FY 08).

Incurred future reserve liability costs are established by the claims administration staff. A claim reserve is an estimate of the potential expense to the corporation based on currently available information. The reserve estimates for specific claims may be adjusted as claims are incurred and developed allowing for any unforeseen growth of claims' costs over time.

Along with claims severity, claims frequency is the dominant factor that affects the overall cost of liability claims management. SDTC and SDTI both experienced some fluctuation in the monthly claims frequency attributable to tracking and recording methodology changes, which occurred as claims administration was brought in house and the new claims administration database was developed and put into production.

The review of unique formal claims indicates that vehicle collisions between moving vehicles accounted for 27% (48) of the claims, followed by vehicle collisions with stationary objects at 14% (26), and start/stop falls onboard vehicles of 12% (21).

The monthly liability claims TPA costs (\$386,343 - annualized) varied little between fiscal year 2007 and fiscal year 2008. Establishment of an in-house Claims Administration Department was completed and put into place in October 2007. The additional monthly staff internal claims management expense, including an overhead load factor of 40%, is approximately \$9,273. Compared to the former monthly average TPA charges of \$32,195, this equates to a 71% claims management expense savings. Annualized, this savings is greater than \$275,066.

For workers' compensation, the frequency of combined agency indemnity claims is displaying a slight decreasing trend. The overall claim-count frequency also has shown a similar declining trend. The issue of claims closure continues to be emphasized with the TPA. The average cost per claim measured over the last four fiscal years has decreased from \$6,896 to \$6,303. This positive, yet leveling trend reflects third-party claims administration, internal employee management, and the nature of claim types.

The overall cost for litigation appears to have remained flat as measured by the posting of attorney billings. The annual overall difference was calculated to be \$5,163. Breakdown between agencies for tort-related litigation was 10% for MTS, 68% for SDTC, and 22% for SDTI. The workers' compensation legal costs remained nearly flat compared with fiscal year 2007. The attorney services utilization breakdown between agencies for workers' compensation matters was 0% for MTS, 84% for SDTC, and 16% for SDTI.

Management and the Risk Department are always working hard to decrease claims costs. For fiscal year 2009, a Workers' Compensation Claims Administration Request for Proposals (RFP) was developed and is currently in the selection process phase. While hard management expenses may not significantly decrease through this process, it is anticipated that superior service will lead to a decrease in overall claims cost. We are also seeking to enhance our claims-related cause information in order to identify and minimize employee injuries through training and other loss prevention measures.

With liability claims administration now in house, our effort will be to consolidate the Risk Management Department to one centralized location (1255 Imperial Avenue) and to confirm and document our internal claims management procedures. Our objectives are to minimize our loss expenses through increased attention to loss prevention and to maximize recoveries via our subrogation efforts. We look forward to the augmentation of our risk-reduction tools through the use of video and audio feeds from vehicle and facility surveillance systems. Use of this information should result in more efficient defense against fictitious claims, more efficient processing of valid claims, and a supplement to our employee training with an emphasis on the minimization of incidents that lead to claims.

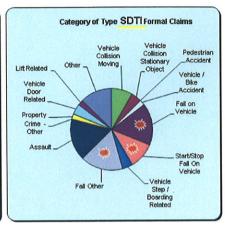






Formal Unique Liability Claim Types
