MINUTES

Roll Call

Chairman Mathis called the Board meeting to order at 9:02 a.m. A roll call sheet listing Board member attendance is attached.

Moment of Silence

Chairman Mathis started the meeting with a moment of silence in honor of Ben Mwangi and Michael Stevenson. He stated that it had been a difficult week for MTS, but that the MTS team had responded as true professionals. Mr. Paul Jablonski, CEO, stated that he was extremely saddened by what happened. He stated that he had spent much time with coworkers of the employees and gave an update on programs set up to help these individuals. He also stated that all maintenance employees reported to work the next day and that, in a show of support, other maintenance employees as well as bus operators volunteered to help that shift and be with them. He stated that he was very proud of the organization. Chairman Mathis also expressed his appreciation of the public support that has been shown as MTS works through this matter.

Approval of Minutes

Mr. Rindone moved to approve the minutes of the March 12, 2009, MTS Board of Directors meeting. Mr. Cunningham seconded the motion, and the vote was 10 to 0 in favor.

3. Public Comments

Chuck Lungerhausen: Mr. Lungerhausen provided the Board with details on the 2009 MS Walk for Land-Lubbers on April 4, 2009 and requested donations. He also expressed his thanks for support given in previous years for this cause.

Theresa Quiroz: Ms. Quiroz expressed her sympathies over the recent tragedy. She stressed the importance of Mr. Jablonski taking an active role in the discussions of MTS's fiscal position that are taking place during SANDAG Transportation Committee meetings. She pointed out that transit riders are being asked to give up funding so it can be used for roads and highways.

4. Recognition of Holiday Music Program

Mr. Young spoke in recognition of this great program supported by the Board, MTS staff, community members of District 4, and the County of San Diego. He introduced Brian Matthews, who coordinated the program. It was reported that music performances were staged at the

Euclid/Market and 62 Street/Cantos stations, and this was the second year for this program. Mr. Matthews introduced Prince Habib, who performed a song for the Board. Coca-Cola was also recognized for its contributions to the program. Mr. Matthews then recognized members of the Lincoln High String Ensemble who were present at the meeting. Mr. Young presented a special commendation to the Lincoln High participants.

6. MTS: Operations Budget Status Report for January 2009 (FIN 310.1)

Recommend that the Board of Directors receive the MTS Operations Budget status Report for January 2009.

9. MTS: Property Insurance Renewal (LEG 491)

Recommend that the Board of Directors authorize the CEO to renew the property insurance coverage for MTS, SDTC, and SDTI with the California State Association of Counties Property Insurance Program, effective March 31, 2009 through March 31, 2010, with a basic coverage deductible of \$25,000, \$100,000 for collision on buses and light rail vehicles, and \$1,500,000 on roads, bridges, and tunnels.

10. SDTI: Gate Turnoff Firing Boards – Contract Award (CIP 11216-0200)

Recommend that the Board of Directors authorize the CEO to execute MTS Doc. No. L0883.0-09, a sole-source contact (in substantially the same format as Attachment A of the agenda item) with Siemens Transportation Systems, Inc. for a five-year period to purchase Gate Turnoff Firing Boards.

11. MTS: Federal Transit Administration 5311 Program of Projects Under the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 (OPS 950.7)

Recommend that the Board of Directors approve Resolution No. 09-13 (Attachment A of the agenda item) authorizing the use of \$401,826.65 of Federal Transit Administration Section 311 funds for the purchase of three Type VII minibuses for use in the rural routes.

Recommend that the Board of Directors adopt Resolution No. 09-14 (Attachment A of the agenda item) approving the revised fiscal year 2009 State Transit Assistance claims.

No. G0867.7-09 (Attachment B of the agenda item) with Motorola to fund the region's Traffic Light Synchronization Program.

Mr. Ewin moved to approve Consent Agenda Item Nos. 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, and 13. Mr. Ovrom seconded the motion, and the vote was 13 to 0 in favor for Agenda Item Nos. 6 through 12. The vote was 12 to 0 in favor for Agenda Item No. 13, with Mr. Roberts abstaining.

Mr. Ewin referred to Agenda Item Nos. 7 and 8, MTS Audit Reports, and stated that he will make sure there is an option for the Audit Oversight committee to look at these reports in more detail.

DISCUSSION ITEMS:

30. MTS: FY 2010 Budget-Related Service Adjustments (SRTP 830)

Ms. Sharon Cooney, Interim Director of Planning and Scheduling, referred to the revised Attachment A handout and stated that this handout reflects changes made to the service adjustments proposed at the March 12, 2009, public hearing on this matter. Mr. Denis Desmond, Senior Transportation Planner, reported that staff continued to collect comments from the public after the hearing, and minor modifications were made to four of the routes based on that input and input from the Board. Mr. Desmond reviewed the proposed service adjustments to achieve a savings of \$4.7 million. In response to a question from Mr. Ewin, Mr. Desmond stated that these service adjustments would be effective June 14 except as noted. Mr. Faulconer requested that he be provided with a monthly update on Route No. 84 that serves Navy personnel.

Public Comment

Don Stillwell: Mr. Stillwell objected to the service changes affecting the Mission San Diego trolley stop, Mission Valley, and Fashion Valley. He suggested getting a sales tax to provide funding for transit instead of raising fares. He requested that Route 14 be continued as it is today. He also requested that the transfer program be reinstated.

Theresa Quiroz: Ms. Quiroz thanked MTS for listening to the public's comments regarding the originally proposed service adjustments for Route 965. She stated that many people need transit to get to essential places. She added that she knows that MTS has lost funding but

stated that now is not the time to cut transit. She suggested that MTS take a stand and insist that SANDAG provide the funds to help transit to continue to run.

Michelle Krug: Ms. Krug echoed Ms. Quiroz's comments about insisting that SANDAG provide additional funding. She stated that she appreciated staff's efforts to minimize service adjustments and suggested that MTS replace capital funds with economic stimulus funds and then use the freed-up capital funds for operations to get through the current financial crisis. She also stated that additional revenue could be generated by MTS if it enforced its ordinances and specifically mentioned the no-smoking ordinance and the ordinance requiring that individuals present identification before being allowed to purchase discounted fare media.

Clive Richard: Mr. Richard stated that he was not in favor of the service adjustments. He felt that it was important for MTS to preserve its network of 15-minute frequencies. He thanked staff for doing a great job of trying to find excess service that could be eliminated. He felt that work on this effort should have started six months ago. He stated that MTS's critical mission should be to improve service, not just maintain it.

Mr. Gloria thanked staff for its efforts regarding Route 965 and its willingness to consider compromises. He stated that there are many people who will benefit from this particular compromise. He stated that MTS needs to be more comprehensive in dealing with funding shortfalls and stated that he could not support reducing service or increasing fares at this time.

In response to a question from Mr. Roberts, Mr. Jablonski stated that SANDAG has been willing to discuss ways of addressing the funding shortfall, including the diversion capital funds. He reminded the Board that this particular approach consists of one-time dollars, not sustainable funding. He also stated that SANDAG is concerned about not impacting projects that the public voted for under TransNet. Mr. Roberts stated that MTS should continue to pursue a funding solution with SANDAG but also take steps now to make service adjustments because delaying would result in an even larger shortfall later. Mr. Rindone agreed that MTS needed to pursue both options. He stated that the service adjustments come at a particularly bad time given that ridership has been on the rise. He also thanked staff for its diligence in mitigating the impact of the reduced funding MTS is facing. He also stated that the Board is responsible for the fiscal solvency of the organization.

Mr. Young stated that if MTS does not take action now, it will have to deal with a much bigger problem later. He stated that staff had done a good job of identifying service cuts that would have minimal impact on the public. He stated that he supported having further discussions with SANDAG regarding funding but felt that the process of identifying additional funding would take some time and, therefore, action needed to be taken now. In response to a question from Ms. Lightner, Mr. Jablonski stated that MTS has discussed using capital funding for operating purposes for the last three budget cycles. She stated that she would like to see MTS request a specific dollar amount for a specified period of time and that she would not be supporting the recommendation for the service adjustments because other options had not been sufficiently explored. Mr. Jablonski stated that this approach had been taken for the operation of the Green Line after new-start funding was no longer available. She stated that this is a different situation, and time should be taken to advocate for funding through SANDAG and to pursue reinstatement of State Transit Assistance (STA) funding from the state.

Chairman Mathis stated that MTS has to operate the system and balance the budget according to law. He stated that MTS cannot borrow money to cover operations because it has to be paid back along with interest, which would result in MTS funding being used to pay that interest

rather than for providing service. He stated that MTS needs long-term sustainable funding. He stressed that MTS has to meet a timeline for implementing service adjustments in order to realize the projected savings. He also pointed out that voters have typically not been in favor of raising taxes and that TransNet passed by a very slim margin.

Mr. Cunningham expressed his appreciation to staff for providing thousands of notices about the public hearing and for responding to public comment on the proposed changes. He recognized that staff worked very hard on developing the original recommendation but was still willing to take a second look and make adjustments. He also stated that MTS cannot wait for the state to reconsider its elimination of STA funding for transit or for SANDAG to reconsider the allocation of TransNet funding.

Chairman Mathis pointed out that this budget is not without risks. He pointed out that the state recently reported an additional \$8 million deficit. He also pointed out that economic stimulus funding is allocated for capital projects only and that sales tax revenues could take another downturn. He stated that MTS will be exploring the need for sustainable revenue with SANDAG. He pointed out that the Los Angeles Metropolitan Transportation Authority has a dedicated 1½-cent sales tax while San Diego gets 1/8 cent.

Mr. Rindone pointed out that North County Transit is having to make even deeper cuts to their system and are on the verge of cutting into major segments of its service. He stated that MTS and NCTD will unite in efforts to seek additional funding through SANDAG.

Action Taken

Mr. Rindone moved to (1) receive a report on public comments received since the March 12, 2009, public hearing; and (2) approve the recommended service adjustments to achieve approximately \$4.7 million in subsidy savings (as described in Attachment A of the agenda item). Mr. Young seconded the motion, and the vote was 11 to 2 in favor, with Mr. Gloria and Ms. Lightner casting the dissenting votes.

31. MTS: Light Rail Network Short-and Long-Term Operating Plans (OPS 970.2)

Mr. Wayne Terry, Chief Operating Officer – Trolley, reported that, while working with a consultant to evaluate procurement options for a new trolley car, it was decided to explore making that part of a larger long-term operating plan. He stated that staff wanted an operating plan that would result in a more effective Central Train Control, that would be more customer friendly, and that would allow the efficient integration of the Mid-Coast extension. Mr. Terry introduced Tom Tupta, Superintendent of Transportation, who reviewed the benefits and improved efficiency of the recommended short- and long-term operating plans. He provided an overview of the current system and the train and car requirements of the plan. He reported that, under these plans, three fewer cars would be needed to operate service.

Mr. Tupta then reviewed enhancements that would be needed at the Santa Fe Depot and America Plaza as well as a change in the East County turn back. He stated that Red Line event service could be eliminated because the Green Line would be able to provide that service. He estimated a total savings in annual operating costs of \$774,100 could be realized under the proposed operating plans. He also briefly discussed how the Mid-Coast extension might integrate into the current system. He stated that, under the proposed plans, there would be no additional train crossings at Broadway, and the need for multiple transfers would be eliminated.

In response to a question from Mr. Jones about parking capacity if the East County turnback is relocated from Gillespie Field Station to Arnele Avenue Station, staff stated that there would be a better timed transfer at Arnele, which should offset the reduced parking capacity at Arnele. Mr. Jones suggested that the improved timed transfer be advertised to riders.

In response to a question from Ms. Lightner, Paul stated staff considers short-term to mean a couple of years, and long-term to be the year 2015 when the Mid-Coast extension is scheduled to be completed.

Chairman Mathis thanked Mr. Terry and Mr. Tupta and stated that the plans were well thought out.

Public Comment

Clive Richard: Mr. Richard stated that he thought this was a great idea. He stated that he supported this item as well as items 32 and 33, which are plans for the integration of low-floor on the entire MTS system and the rehabilitation of the Orange and Blue Lines. He stated that he was also happy to see that a solution had been found for running longer consists on C Street.

Action Taken

Mr. Cunningham moved to adopt a plan for changes to the light rail transit system to improve efficiency in the short-term and accommodate a viable long-term operating plan. Mr. Ewin seconded the motion, and the vote was 13 to 0 in favor.

32. MTS: Booz Allen Hamilton Consultant's Report – Low-Floor Capability Assessment and Light Rail Vehicle Recommendations (OPS 970.2)

Mr. Jablonski reported that the study of procurement options for low-floor trolley cars took into consideration transfer problems at Old Town and problems that would occur in trying to run four-car trains though downtown San Diego. He reported that the current S70 cars are 90 feet in length, which would cause a problem running the Green Line through downtown. He also reported that the U-2 cars are 30 years old, which is close to the end of their useful life, and need to be rehabilitated or replaced. Mr. Jablonski advised the Board that a decision about buying new cars must be made before plans regarding station platforms can be developed. He stated that Booz Allen has been working on recommending station improvements to achieve low-floor access system wide, is validating and prioritizing MTS's 10-year Capital Plan to achieve "state of good repair" on the Blue Line, and is assisting staff in determining the sequence of the various elements of the project.

Mr. Terry provided an overview of the make-up of the current fleet of trolley cars and reviewed alternatives that had been studied by a previous consultant in 2000. He added that the current study confirmed that a low-floor section in the SD 100 car would not offer an acceptable return on investment. Mr. Terry reported on a Vehicle Manufacturer's Symposium that MTS held in order to identify the types of vehicles that were available. He added that Utah Transit Authority was invited to participate as they were considering an LRV purchase also. He reviewed the various cars that were considered and rejected and then reported that Siemens is building an 80-foot car for Utah Transit that will meet MTS's needs. He reported that MTS has an option to order cars under Utah Transit's contract with Siemens for this car. Mr. Terry also showed how the use of 80-foot cars on C Street will eliminate the need to make previously proposed

infrastructure improvements in this area and will allow MTS to operate service in this corridor without blocking traffic flow on the streets. He then displayed system maps showing where improvements would have to be made to accommodate low-floor cars.

Mr. Tupta reviewed four options for the purchase of low-floor cars and showed the make-up of the entire fleet under each of those options. He stated that, because three fewer cars are needed under the proposed operating plan, the cost under each of these options is \$12 million less. Mr. Terry provided the Board with detail on what types of rehabilitation would be pursued for the U-2 cars if that option is selected. He then displayed a picture of the front end of the prototype 80-foot car currently being designed for Utah Transit.

Mr. Faulconer stated that he felt the 80-foot cars would help the entire system and particularly C Street. He stated that he appreciated the amount of work that staff had done to identify an alternative to the infrastructure changes originally proposed to accommodate 90-foot cars. He stated that the city can now proceed with plans for C Street. He stated that this was a very positive solution.

Public Comment

Clive Richard: Mr. Richard stated that he fully supported the purchase of as many low-floor cars as possible. He didn't feel that the U-2 cars should be rehabilitated. He felt they should be retired instead.

Action Taken

Action on this item was taken in combination with the action on Agenda Item No. 33.

33. <u>Implementation Plan for Execution of the San Diego MTS Blue and Orange Line Rehabilitation and Improvement Project</u> (OPS 970.2)

Mr. Terry reviewed an implementation plan for the rehabilitation of the Blue and Orange Lines, including the project tasks. During his presentation of Task 3, which dealt with construction, Mr. John Haggerty, SANDAG Principal Engineer, reported that the way this plan is being implemented will allow eight-hour construction periods rather than the typical four. He stated that this is a much more efficient way of doing construction and will be less costly. Mr. Jablonski pointed out that, with 65,000 to 70,000 passengers and over 200 train movements, MTS cannot stop service during the rehabilitation and improvement construction phase and, therefore, the crossovers are needed so that trains can be run around the construction areas. Mr. Jablonski pointed out that the proposed crossovers not only provide a benefit during construction but also provide a long-term operating benefit. He stated that having crossovers will allow MTS to take a section of track out of service and run service around that section. He stated that this applies to freight service as well.

During the review of the expenditure plan, Mr. Jablonski pointed out that the projects labeled as High Priority must be done as soon as possible, while Medium Priority tasks can be delayed if needed. He stated that all tasks need to be completed. A cost summary was also provided for each of the tasks with each of the vehicle-purchase options. Staff then reviewed the multiple sources of funding that could be used for this project and the preliminary phasing for the High Priority tasks. A cost breakdown for each of the tasks was also presented.

In response to a question from Mr. Jones, Mr. Terry stated that the new 80-foot cars would cost \$2.89 million each. In response to another question from Mr. Jones, Mr. Jablonski stated that there may be some market for the U-2 trolley cars. Mr. Rindone expressed his thanks to staff for developing such a detailed plan.

Action Taken

Mr. Rindone moved to:

Agenda Item No. 32: receive a report regarding the consultant's recommendation for low-floor light rail vehicle procurement.

Agenda Item No. 33: receive a report on implementation of the project phasing plan, light rail vehicle procurement and rehabilitation alternatives, and provide direction to staff regarding (1) the consultant's recommendation for 82-foot low-floor vehicle procurement; (2) pursuit of light rail vehicle procurement/rehabilitation strategy based on funding availability; and (3) project priority plan and phasing program.

Mr. Faulconer seconded the motions, and the vote was 9 to 0 in favor.

That the Board of Directors authorize the Chief Executive Officer (CEO) to execute MTS Doc. No. L0888.0-09 (in substantially the same format as Attachment A) with Knorr Brake Corporation as a sole-source contract for a two-year period.

Budget Impact

The total cost would not exceed \$475,000.00 and would include SD 100 friction brake overhaul kits and services, freight, and taxes. The expenditure would be funded by CIP 11254-0200.

Year 1 FY 09 \$125,000.00 Year 2 FY 10 \$350,000.00

DISCUSSION:

Background

San Diego Trolley, Inc. (SDTI) is currently operating a fleet of 52 Siemens SD 100 light rail vehicles. These rail cars were manufactured by Siemens from 1992 to 1995. The brake system used was manufactured and designed by the Knorr specifically for this type of rail vehicle. Ongoing workload and maintenance requirements at SDTI warrant the need to obtain parts and services from the original equipment manufacturer for the overhaul of the hydraulic friction brake equipment.



Knorr currently supplies the braking systems for two generations of light rail vehicles in the SDTI fleet. Knorr's braking systems meet the standards required by the rail car manufacturer as well as the standards set by the SDTI. Based on these high levels of design criteria and the need for specialized knowledge of hydraulic braking systems for mass transit, staff recommends that only Knorr-certified personnel are permitted to overhaul this equipment. Skilled workmanship and an intimate knowledge of the equipment is necessary for an overhaul to ensure that the finished product will maintain the proper levels of reliability and safety required by SDTI. Staff is also requesting the use of genuine Knorr parts in the overhaul of this critical equipment to guarantee its integrity and reliability.

Knorr has a great deal of experience in the overhaul of braking systems both worldwide and in the United States. In North America, Knorr has completed fleet overhauls on all Acela high-speed transit equipment, Los Angeles Blue Line equipment, San Francisco Muni light rail vehicle equipment, and many others.

This particular braking system is designed and manufactured by Knorr and is the original equipment manufacturer for these Siemens rail cars. All drawings and specifications necessary to manufacture this component are proprietary, and Knorr is the sole source for this component in North America.

Knorr parts originate in Germany and will not meet the Buy America requirements of the specifications. Therefore, this part qualifies for a nonavailability waiver in accordance with 49 CFR 661.7. SDTI has applied for a nonavailability waiver from the Federal Transit Administration (FTA) and expects to receive approval of this waiver in the next few weeks.

In accordance with Policy No. 52, SDTI staff is recommending approval of a sole-source contract with Knorr for the procurement of SD 100 friction brake system overhaul kits and services for overhaul equipment and components. SDTI staff is requesting approval of this contract contingent upon approval of the waiver from the FTA. Pricing has been determined to be fair and reasonable. A cost analysis of previous purchases is included as Attachment B.

Attachment A is a report of MTS investments as of February 2009. The first column provides details about investments restricted for capital support and debt service—the majority of which are related to the 1995 lease and leaseback transactions.

The second column is the unrestricted investments, which reports the working capital for MTS operations for employee payroll and vendors' goods and services. This column includes the investment in San Diego Transit Corporation's (SDTC's) pension obligation bonds that were repurchased and represents an asset that is not currently available to fund operations.

Total cash and investment balances have increased by \$16,720 or less than 0.01%.

The average monthly yield in the Local Agency Investment Fund investment decreased from 2.779% to 1.87% between August and February.



The funds restricted for debt service are structured investments with fixed returns that do not vary with marked fluctuations if held to maturity. These investments are held in trust and will not be liquidated in advance of the scheduled maturities.

Other restricted funds are designated for various capital improvement projects.

Additional hours for the legal services of HSRGB are needed for MVE LRT Project issues. The amount of the contract totals \$2,375,000 as follows:

5. Amendment No. 4 for \$90,000 was approved by the CEO on May 25, 2008;

6. Amendment No. 5 for \$500,000 was approved by the Board on October 16,

2007;

7. Amendment No. 6 was a no-cost increase to add authorized legal staff, which

was approved on June 11, 2008;

8. Amendment No. 7 for \$95,000 was approved by the CEO in December 2008;

9. Amendment No. 8 for \$500,000 was approved by the Board on December 11,

2008;

10. Amendment No. 9 for \$700,000 was approved by the Board on February 19,

2009: and

11. Amendment No. 10 for \$100,000 was approved by the CEO in March 2009.

The hours invoiced by the law firm are reaching the contract limit, and staff will require more legal services from HSRGB until the conclusion of the trial with Balfour Beatty/Ortiz Joint Venture (BBO). DISCUSSION:

The RSS is a regional fixed-bus route and rail-scheduling system. The system provides the regional transit agencies with the necessary tools to build efficient timetables and vehicle and crew schedules for bus and rail operations. It also supports operator bid processing and aids the physical dispatching of bus drivers and train operators.

On January 10, 2002, the Board authorized staff to procure an RSS using a competitive negotiated procurement process. In August 2003, a contract was awarded to GIRO, Inc. The original contract value was \$1,834,275—MTS's share of the cost was \$1,525,893, and NCTD's share of the cost was \$308,382.

As of January 17, 2008, the Scheduling and Operator Bidding Modules have been fully implemented. San Diego Trolley, Inc. has implemented the Operator Dispatch Module, and San Diego Transit Corporation is currently implementing the Operator Dispatch Module. The design specification was approved in November 2005.

(for an amount not to exceed \$113,982) would provide MTS and NCTD with continued support for the RSS, including technical and end-user e-mail and telephone support, corrections to software defects, one update to the geographical data, and renewal of the support agreement coverage period from July 1, 2009, to June 30, 2010.

The adjusted amount of the contract would be \$2,469,625 with an MTS cost share of \$2,096 933, and an NCTD cost share of \$372,692.

- 2. MTS Doc. No. G0868.4-03 (Attachment B) with North County Transit District (NCTD) for a Fund Transfer Agreement.

Budget Impact

MTS Doc. No. G0867.8-03 would not exceed \$737,846.52. The total adjusted cost of the contract would not exceed \$22,070,109.02 without prior written approval from MTS. Funding for Amendment No. 8 would be paid by MTS and NCTD operating funds.

MTS's share of the \$737,846.52 would be \$463,294.00 and would be paid by operating funds.

NCTD's cost share of \$274,552.52 would be governed by the approved Fund Transfer Agreement.



DISCUSSION:

Background Information

The RTMS is a sophisticated vehicle-tracking and communication system that provides for performance and security/safety monitoring of transit vehicles. The regional system is currently being used to support operations of San Diego Transit and NCTD fixed-route services. The system was deployed through a contract with Motorola and went into full operation in December 2006.

Amendment No. 8 to Motorola Service Agreement (Attachment A)

Amendment No. 8 (MTS Doc. No. G0867.8-03) would extend the Motorola warranty support contract to cover the period from July 1, 2009, to June 30, 2010. The cost of the warranty contract is being shared by MTS and NCTD as outlined in the Fund Transfer Agreement.

Amendment No. 4 to the NCTD Fund Transfer Agreement (Attachment B)

As part of the original contract award, MTS and NCTD executed a Fund Transfer Agreement, which provided for the MTS contract execution and NCTD cost-sharing. The extension to the Motorola warranty support contract is a shared expense and affects NCTD's cost share, which required an amendment to the Fund Transfer Agreement.

Conclusion

Modifications to the Motorola service contract are necessary to support continued project expansion activities and deliver enhancements to the RTMS system that improves service delivery to the region and riding public.

Service Terms and Conditions

Motorola, Inc., ("Motorola") and the customer named in this Agreement ("Customer") hereby agree as follows:

Section 1 APPLICABILITY

These Service Terms and Conditions apply to service contracts whereby Motorola agrees to provide to Customer either (1) maintenance, support and/or other services under a Motorola Service Agreement, or (2) installation services under a Motorola Installation Agreement.

Section 2 DEFINITIONS AND INTERPRETATION

- 2.1. "Agreement" means these Service Terms and Conditions; the cover page for the Service Agreement or the Installation Agreement, as applicable; and any other attachments, all of which are incorporated herein by this reference. In interpreting this Agreement and resolving any ambiguities, these Service Terms and Conditions will take precedence over any cover page, and the cover page will take precedence over any attachments, unless the cover page or attachment specifically states otherwise.
- 2.2. "Equipment" means the equipment that is specified in the attachments or is subsequently added to this Agreement.
- 2.3. "Services" means those installation, maintenance, support, training, and other services described in this Agreement.

Section 3 ACCEPTANCE

Customer accepts these Service Terms and Conditions and agrees to pay the prices set forth in the Agreement. This Agreement will become binding only when accepted in writing by Motorola. The term of this Agreement will begin on the "Start Date" indicated in this Agreement.

Section 4 SCOPE OF SERVICES

- 4.1. Motorola will provide the Services described in this Agreement or in a more detailed statement of work or other document attached to this Agreement. At Customer's request, Motorola may also provide additional services at Motorola's then-applicable rates for such services.
- 4.2. If Motorola is providing Services for Equipment, Motorola parts or parts of equal quality will be used; the Equipment will be serviced at levels set forth in the manufacturer's product manuals; and routine service procedures that are prescribed by Motorola will be followed.
- 4.3. If Customer purchases from Motorola additional equipment that becomes part of the same system as the initial Equipment, the additional equipment may be added to this Agreement and will be billed at the applicable rates after the warranty for such additional equipment expires.
- 4.4. All Equipment must be in good working order on the Start Date or when additional equipment is added to the Agreement. Upon reasonable request by Motorola, Customer will provide a complete serial and model number list of the Equipment. Customer must promptly notify Motorola in writing when any Equipment is lost, damaged, stolen or taken out of service. Customer's obligation to pay Service fees for such Equipment will terminate at the end of the month in which Motorola receives such written notice.
- 4.5. Customer must specifically identify any Equipment that is labeled intrinsically safe for use in hazardous environments.
- 4.6. If Equipment cannot, in Motorola's reasonable opinion, be properly or economically serviced for any reason, Motorola may modify the scope of Services related to such Equipment; remove such Equipment from the Agreement; or increase the price to Service such Equipment.
- 4.7. Customer must promptly notify Motorola of any Equipment failure. Motorola will respond to Customer's notification in a manner consistent with the level of Service purchased as indicated in this Agreement.

Section 5 EXCLUDED SERVICES

- 5.1. Service excludes the repair or replacement of Equipment that has become defective or damaged from use in other than the normal, customary, intended, and authorized manner; use not in compliance with applicable industry standards; excessive wear and tear; or accident, liquids, power surges, neglect, acts of God or other force majeure events.
- 5.2. Unless specifically included in this Agreement, Service excludes items that are consumed in the normal operation of the Equipment, such as batteries or magnetic tapes.; upgrading or reprogramming Equipment; accessories, belt clips, battery chargers, custom or special products, modified units, or software; and repair or maintenance of any transmission line, antenna, microwave equipment, tower or tower lighting, duplexer, combiner, or multicoupler. Motorola has no

obligations for any transmission medium, such as telephone lines, computer networks, the internet or the worldwide web, or for Equipment malfunction caused by such transmission medium.

Section 6 TIME AND PLACE OF SERVICE

Service will be provided at the location specified in this Agreement. When Motorola performs service at Customer's location, Customer will provide Motorola, at no charge, a non-hazardous work environment with adequate shelter, heat, light, and power and with full and free access to the Equipment. Waivers of liability from Motorola or its subcontractors will not be imposed as a site access requirement. Customer will provide all information pertaining to the hardware and software elements of any system with which the Equipment is interfacing so that Motorola may perform its Services. Unless otherwise stated in this Agreement, the hours of Service will be 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., local time, excluding weekends and holidays. Unless otherwise stated in this Agreement, the price for the Services exclude any charges or expenses associated with helicopter or other unusual access requirements; if these charges or expenses are reasonably incurred by Motorola in rendering the Services, Customer agrees to reimburse Motorola for such charges and expenses.

Section 7 CUSTOMER CONTACT

Customer will provide Motorola with designated points of contact (list of names and phone numbers) that will be available twenty-four (24) hours per day, seven (7) days per week, and an escalation procedure to enable Customer's personnel to maintain contact, as needed, with Motorola.

Section 8 PAYMENT

Unless alternative payment terms are specifically stated in this Agreement, Motorola will invoice Customer in advance for each payment period. All other charges will be billed monthly, and Customer must pay each invoice in U.S. dollars within twenty (20) days of the invoice date. Customer agrees to reimburse Motorola for all property taxes, sales and use taxes, excise taxes, and other taxes or assessments levied as a result of Services rendered under this Agreement (except income, profit, and franchise taxes of Motorola) by any governmental entity.

Section 9 WARRANTY

Motorola warrants that its Services under this Agreement will be free of defects in materials and workmanship for a period of ninety (90) days from the date the performance of the Services are completed. In the event of a breach of this warranty, Customer's sole remedy is to require Motorola to re-perform the non-conforming Service or to refund, on a pro-rata basis, the fees paid for the non-conforming Service. MOTOROLA DISCLAIMS ALL OTHER WARRANTIES, EXPRESS OR IMPLIED, INCLUDING THE IMPLIED WARRANTIES OF MERCHANTABILITY AND FITNESS FOR A PARTICULAR PURPOSE.

Section 10 DEFAULT/TERMINATION

10.1. If either party defaults in the performance of this Agreement, the other party will give to the non-performing party a written and detailed notice of the default. The non-performing party will have thirty (30) days thereafter to provide a written plan to cure the default that is acceptable to the other party and begin implementing the cure plan immediately after plan approval. If the non-performing party fails to provide or implement the cure plan, then the injured party, in addition to any other rights available to it under law, may immediately terminate this Agreement effective upon giving a written notice of termination to the defaulting party.

10.2. Any termination of this Agreement will not relieve either party of obligations previously incurred pursuant to this Agreement, including payments which may be due and owing at the time of termination. All sums owed by Customer to Motorola will become due and payable immediately upon termination of this Agreement. Upon the effective date of termination, Motorola will have no further obligation to provide Services.

Section 11 LIMITATION OF LIABILITY

Except for personal injury or death, Motorola's total liability, whether for breach of contract, warranty, negligence, strict liability in tort, or otherwise, will be limited to the direct damages recoverable under law, but not to exceed the price of twelve (12) months of Service provided under this Agreement. ALTHOUGH THE PARTIES ACKNOWLEDGE THE POSSIBILITY OF SUCH LOSSES OR DAMAGES, THEY AGREE THAT MOTOROLA WILL NOT BE LIABLE FOR ANY COMMERCIAL LOSS; INCONVENIENCE; LOSS OF USE, TIME, DATA, GOOD WILL, REVENUES, PROFITS OR SAVINGS; OR OTHER SPECIAL, INCIDENTAL, INDIRECT, OR CONSEQUENTIAL DAMAGES IN ANY WAY RELATED TO OR ARISING FROM THIS AGREEMENT OR THE PERFORMANCE OF SERVICES BY MOTOROLA PURSUANT TO THIS AGREEMENT. No action for contract breach or otherwise relating to the transactions contemplated by this Agreement may be brought more than one (1) year after the accrual of the cause of action, except for money due upon an open account. This limitation of liability will survive the expiration or termination of this Agreement and applies notwithstanding any contrary provision.

Section 12 EXCLUSIVE TERMS AND CONDITIONS

12.1. This Agreement supersedes all prior and concurrent agreements and understandings between the parties, whether written or oral, related to the Services, and there are no agreements or representations concerning the subject matter of

this Agreement except for those expressed herein. The Agreement may not be amended or modified except by a written agreement signed by authorized representatives of both parties.

12.2. Customer agrees to reference this Agreement on any purchase order issued in furtherance of this Agreement, however, an omission of the reference to this Agreement shall not affect its applicability. In no event shall either party be bound by any terms contained in a Customer purchase order, acknowledgement, or other writings unless: the purchase order, acknowledgement, or other writing specifically refers to this Agreement; clearly indicate the intention of both parties to override and modify this Agreement; and the purchase order, acknowledgement, or other writing is signed by authorized representatives of both parties.

Section 13 PROPRIETARY INFORMATION; CONFIDENTIALITY; INTELLECTUAL PROPERTY RIGHTS

- 13.1. Any information or data in the form of specifications, drawings, reprints, technical information or otherwise furnished to Customer under this Agreement will remain Motorola's property, will be deemed proprietary, will be kept confidential, and will be promptly returned at Motorola's request. Customer may not disclose, without Motorola's written permission or as required by law, any confidential information or data to any person, or use confidential information or data itself for any purpose other than performing its obligations under this Agreement. The obligations set forth in this Section will survive the expiration or termination of this Agreement.
- 13.2. Unless otherwise agreed in writing, no commercial, financial or technical information disclosed in any manner or at any time by Customer to Motorola will be deemed secret or confidential. Motorola will have no obligation to provide Customer with access to its confidential and proprietary information, including cost and pricing data.
- 13.3. This Agreement does not grant directly or by implication, estoppel, or otherwise, any ownership right or license under any Motorola patent, copyright, trade secret, or other intellectual property including any intellectual property created as a result of or related to the Equipment sold or Services performed under this Agreement.

Section 14 FCC LICENSES AND OTHER AUTHORIZATIONS

Customer is solely responsible for obtaining licenses or other authorizations required by the Federal Communications Commission or any other federal, state, or local government agency and for complying with all rules and regulations required by governmental agencies. Neither Motorola nor any of its employees is an agent or representative of Customer in any governmental matters.

Section 15 COVENANT NOT TO EMPLOY

During the term of this Agreement and continuing for a period of two (2) years thereafter, Customer will not hire, engage on contract, solicit the employment of, or recommend employment to any third party of any employee of Motorola or its subcontractors without the prior written authorization of Motorola. This provision applies only to those employees of Motorola or its subcontractors who are responsible for rendering services under this Agreement. If this provision is found to be overly broad under applicable law, it will be modified as necessary to conform to applicable law.

Section 16 MATERIALS, TOOLS AND EQUIPMENT

All tools, equipment, dies, gauges, models, drawings or other materials paid for or furnished by Motorola for the purpose of this Agreement will be and remain the sole property of Motorola. Customer will safeguard all such property while it is in Customer's custody or control, be liable for any loss or damage to such property, and return it to Motorola upon request. This property will be held by Customer for Motorola's use without charge and may be removed from Customer's premises by Motorola at any time without restriction.

Section 17 GENERAL TERMS

- 17.1. If any court renders any portion of this Agreement unenforceable, the remaining terms will continue in full force and effect.
- 17.2. This Agreement and the rights and duties of the parties will be governed and interpreted in accordance with the laws of the State in which the Services are performed.
- 17.3. Failure to exercise any right will not operate as a waiver of that right, power, or privilege.
- 17.4. Neither party is liable for delays or lack of performance resulting from any causes that are beyond that party's reasonable control, such as strikes, material shortages, or acts of God.
- 17.5. Motorola may assign its rights and obligations, and may subcontract any portion of its performance, under this Agreement.
- 17.6. THIS AGREEMENT WILL RENEW, FOR AN ADDITIONAL ONE (1) YEAR TERM, ON EVERY ANNIVERSARY OF THE START DATE UNLESS EITHER THE COVER PAGE SPECIFICALLY STATES A TERMINATION DATE OR ONE PARTY NOTIFIES THE OTHER IN WRITING OF ITS INTENTION TO DISCONTINUE THE AGREEMENT NOT LESS

THAN THIRTY (30) DAYS OF THAT ANNIVERSARY DATE. At the anniversary date, Motorola may adjust the price of the Services to reflect its current rates.

17.7. If Motorola provides Services after the termination or expiration of this Agreement, the terms and conditions in effect at the time of the termination or expiration will apply to those Services and Customer agrees to pay for those services on a time and materials basis at Motorola's then effective hourly rates.

MTS: FEDERAL ECONOMIC STIMULUS PROGRAMMING RECOMMENDATION

RECOMMENDATION:

That the Board of Directors approve:

- 1. the use of the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 (ARRA) to fund the Overhead Contact Wire Project (Capital Improvement Program [CIP] 1142000) and the Blue Line Rehabilitation Project (CIP 1210001); and
- the transfer of \$6 million from the Overhead Catenary Wire Project to the South 2. Bay Facility Land Acquisition Project.

Budget Impact

Due to the passage of the ARRA of 2009, an additional \$58.6 million has been added to MTS's and San Diego Association of Governments' (SANDAG's) CIPs. As a result of the ARRA funding, \$6 million of Section 5307 formula funds from the FY 2010 CIP has been freed up to fund other capital needs.

DISCUSSION:

On Friday, February 17, 2009, President Barack Obama signed the ARRA into law. The ARRA provides new funding for eligible public transportation capital projects; therefore. under the ARRA, operating funds are not eligible. The ARRA allocation is 100 percent of the net project costs, which means there is no required local match. According to the Federal Register issued on March 5, 2009, the FTA has provided preaward authority to incur expenses before the grant is awarded. Preaward authority allows the grantee to begin using the ARRA funds to stimulate the economy immediately.



The Federal Register states that the Transit Capital Assistance and Section 5340 Urbanized Area apportionment for the Region is \$80.8 million and the Fixed-Guideway Infrastructure Investment apportionment is \$2.9 million. MTS is slated to receive approximately 70 percent of the regional federal apportionment; therefore, it is estimated that MTS will receive \$56.6 million in Transit Capital Assistance and Section 5340 Urbanized Area funding and \$2.0 million in Fixed-Guideway Infrastructure Investment funding for a total of \$58.6 million in ARRA funds available for immediate use.

Upon receipt of the Federal Register notification of expected allocation, MTS staff met with SANDAG staff to determine which capital projects would be "ready to go" to stimulate the economy. It was determined that the Blue Line Rehabilitation Project and the Overhead Catenary Wire Replacement Project would be able to begin quickly to meet ARRA legislation guidelines. The table below displays the allocation proposed by staff:

The ARRA funding would allow the Overhead Contact Wire Project to be fully funded; as a result, a total of \$6 million would be allocated back into to the FY 2010 CIP. MTS staff is recommending that the Section 5307 federal formula funds of \$4 million (including match) and State Transit Assistance (STA) funds of \$2 million be allocated to fund the newly established South Bay Facility Land Acquisition Project. The acquisition of the

land adjacent to the current South Bay Maintenance Facility would allow for a much-needed expansion to the transit service area.

DISCUSSION:

Each year, Caltrans administers a federal transportation planning grant program that provides grants to transit agencies, regional planning agencies, and other community and governmental entities. MTS staff has filed an application for a community-based transportation planning grant under this program for a planning study entitled, "Benefits of Public Transportation to the San Diego Region." The county-wide study would assess the improved mobility, reduced congestion, and enhanced economic development caused by the region's investment in public



transportation infrastructure and service. The grant application requires that a resolution authorizing the CEO to enter into a contract with Caltrans be adopted by the Board of Directors.

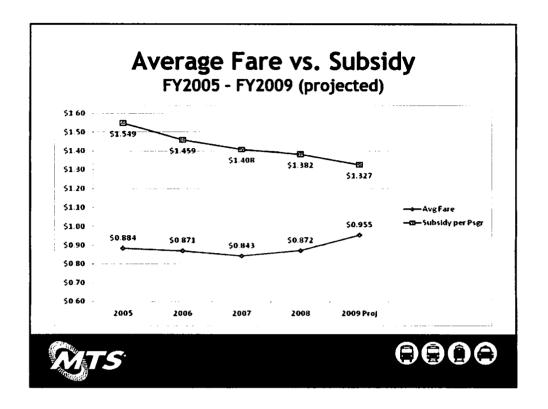


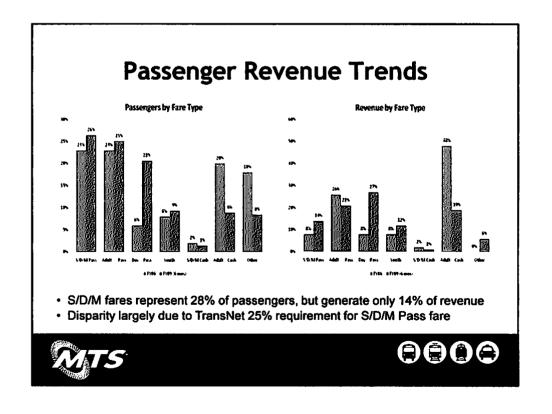


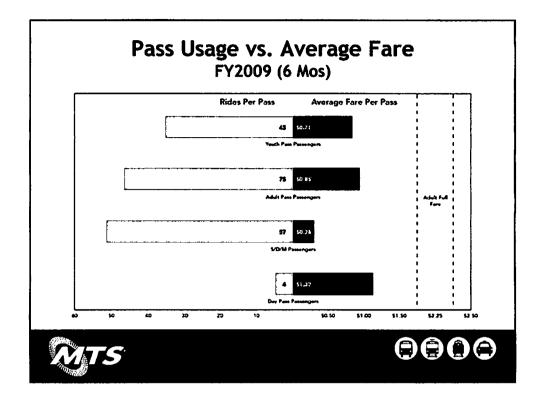

RECOMMENDATION:

That the Board of Directors receive a report for information.

Budget Impact

None.

DISCUSSION:

Statistics related to security incidents concerning the transit system are compiled by staff based on reports generated by security personnel and Code Compliance inspectors. This information is augmented by reports from local police authorities and is then compiled, summarized, and submitted to the Board of Directors on a midyear and year-end basis. The final 2008 year-end report covers the period from January 1, 2008, through December 31, 2008.

SWARM ENFORCEMENT

In order to maximize available resources in ways that afford the department the most visibility to the riding public, a "Swarm" detail was created. Operationally, Swarm is a rolling special enforcement unit with a specific purpose to enforce ordinances, monitor quality-of-life issues on trains and in stations, observe and report crimes (such as graffiti



and vandalism), respond to patrons' complaints, and gather intelligence information relative to gang activity, potential problems, or any other conditions noted that may adversely affect safe and secure operations throughout the system.

During the daily details in 2008, 350,575 patrons were contacted by Swarm units. There were a total of 2,964 patrons in violation of MTS ordinances. Citations (2,263), verbal warnings (239), and written warnings (422) were issued. Of the citations written, 1,933 were for fare evasion. Including fare-evasion citations, written warnings, and verbal warnings, a .74% fare-evasion rate was witnessed by this unit during the calendar year.

C STREET PROBLEM-ORIENTED POLICING (POP) PROJECT

The C Street POP Project brings together a select number of transit enforcement officers and San Diego Police officers who devote special attention to the trains and stations along the C Street business corridor. The project is closely monitored by the San Diego City Attorney's Office, which prosecutes offenders and issues stay-away orders to chronic violators, and it was designed to address chronic offenders and quality-of-life issues in the area.

DEPARTMENT OF HOMELAND SECURITY GRANT FUNDS

Department of Homeland Security Transportation Grant Program

- <u>FY 2005</u>: In concert with the U.S. Department of Homeland Security, project funds totaling \$1.3 million were used for improving security of the Newton Street train yards. At the end of 2007, MTS applied for and was granted an extension to complete the physical security enhancements. The project has been completed, and a preliminary audit by the State of California Office of Homeland Security was conducted. With the closing of this grant, improvements to the yards included security fencing, closed-circuit television (CCTV), spike strips to prevent unauthorized vehicles from entering the train yard, and access control in the C Building.
- <u>FY 2006</u>: In November 2006, the Governor's Office of Homeland Security received approval from the U.S. Department of Homeland Security for funding under the FY 06 Infrastructure Protection Program. Consequently, MTS was awarded \$563,000 for the rail division, and \$682,500 for the bus division. For rail, the projects will include enhanced security at four stations America Plaza, Imperial Transfer Station, Old Town Transit Center, and San Diego State University. Bus projects will include additional security at two of the critical bus yards—Imperial Avenue Division and Kearny Mesa Division. MTS will contribute 25% in additional funds toward each award. Due to the magnitude of projects within this grant, an extension of the December 31, 2008, deadline was requested. A tentative extension of one year has been granted, and MTS is awaiting a formal extension letter due in early 2009.
- FY 2007: In May 2007, the Governor's Office of Homeland Security received approval from the U.S. Department of Homeland Security for funding under the FY 07 Transit Security Grant Program. A total of \$55,071 was awarded to MTS with a requirement that the funds be used for security training relating to terrorists

attacks against rail and bus. The time period for this grant extends to June 30, 2010. It is our intention to use all of the funds awarded.

- FY 2007: Under a separate grant application, MTS requested \$1,285,000 (with matching funds from MTS of \$400,000) in order to expand and enhance an existing program of installing onboard CCTVs. This will be a multiphase project that will ultimately allow MTS to remotely view all CCTV systems at stations and onboard LRVs and busses from the MTS Operations Control Center (OCC). The funds will be used to retrofit 44 existing onboard CCTV busses with wireless remote viewing capability and install CCTV and wireless remote access on 60 LRVs. At the close of 2008, the bus project was completed. For the LRV project, a contract has been awarded to a consulting firm to analyze and issue a final report recommending both the latest technology for this endeavor and a company who can best meet the needs of MTS. A previous company employed for the project is now out of business. A project management team is in place to keep the project focused, and completion is expected in June 2010.
- FY 2008: In 2008, MTS applied for an additional \$1,500,000 to continue the onboard CCTV program. The request was granted; however, MTS has not yet received the Grant Award Notification (GAN) letter. This project is Phase II of a multiphased program to ultimately attain the dual capability of remote surveillance of all stations and onboard vehicles from the MTS OCC. It will consist of installing cameras in 74 LRVs and 56 buses in concert with real-time video feeds to responding law enforcement agencies. The performance time period for this grant has not yet been announced by the Department of Homeland Security.
- <u>FY 2009</u>: In late 2008, MTS was invited to apply for additional grants within the Transportation Security Grant Program (TSGP). MTS is currently in the planning phase for this grant.

CALIFORNIA TRANSPORTATION SECURITY GRANT PROGRAM FY 2007-2008

Proposition 1B funds in the amount of \$2.7 million have been awarded to MTS for the purpose of security improvements to the system. The funds are a result of bonds approved by California voters to be used for public transportation enhancements, including security. This grant expires in March 2011, and the monies will be used to equip ten trolley stations with CCTV and complete the installation of onboard CCTV on the bus fleet.

TRAINING

Training is a dynamic process in the MTS Security Department with ongoing classes, seminars, guest speakers, written directives, and other coaching media. During this reporting period, the following training presentations were completed:

- Land Transportation Antiterrorism Training Program Department of Homeland Security
- Scenario Training In house; topics covered were friendly enforcement, contact and cover, and handling confrontational situations

On a continuing basis, pertinent information received from law enforcement and Homeland Security agencies is circulated to all enforcement personnel to keep them informed of current or developing situations that may affect MTS operations.

SDTC

In August, a Code Compliance Supervisor was assigned as the security liaison for the San Diego Transit Corporation as front line security for any issues that need to be addressed—both internally and contractually. The CCI Supervisor interacts with staff and attends meetings with management. Officers at the main gate are now equipped with handheld radios for better communication for any emergency. Report processing has been more fluent, and staff has been very receptive to this presence.

PASSENGER INSPECTIONS

During calendar year 2008, inspections were:

Rail 9,675,566 – 26.84% of ridership Bus 29,657,073 – 100% of ridership

2008 FARE EVASION RATE: 1.66% - SPECIAL ENFORCEMENT UNIT (SEU)

In addition to regular inspections, MTS conducts Special Enforcement Unit sweeps (SEUs). During calendar year 2008, inspectors and officers contacted 151,207 passengers during 28 scheduled sweeps. Of the passengers inspected, 2,514 passengers did not comply with the published fare structure. Annual statistics from these special fare evasion inspections indicate an average fare evasion rate of only 1.66%.

Of the 2,514 who were not in fare compliance, 2,136 were issued citations and 378 were required to purchase an upgraded fare in order to meet compliance requirements. A total of \$759.75 in revenue was collected from patrons who were required to purchase or upgrade fares when found in noncompliance.

In addition to fare compliance, officers made arrests for quality-of-life violations, such as smoking, possession of alcohol, and illegal substances.

MULTIAGENCY AND SPECIAL ENFORCEMENT OPERATIONS

Illegal transient camps along the MTS rail rights-of-way and other MTS property cause unsafe conditions, potential theft activity, and hazards for trains operating in the areas of these camps. Working with San Diego County Park rangers, federal wildlife agents, a wildlife biologist (from Eckbo, Dean, Austin, and Williams) who provides consulting services to the local and federal governments, San Diego County Sheriff's Department, and law enforcement agencies during the reporting period, sweeps were conducted to remove illegal camps. Contact information for the SDPD Homeless Outreach Team and for local shelters was provided to transients. Illegal weapons were confiscated from the camps and turned over to police. Citations were issued for trespassing, illegal lodging, and possession of hypodermic needles. New fencing and "No Trespassing" signs are

planned for prominent locations. Periodic patrol of these areas continues on an as-needed basis.

Transit enforcement continues to meet with the Border Transportation Council on a monthly basis to discuss and resolve border issues. Other agencies participating include the San Diego Association of Governments (SANDAG), San Diego City Attorney's Office, Customs and Border Protection, Public Utilities Commission, San Diego Police Department, Immigration, and California Highway Patrol. U.S. Customs discussed the new computer system in the inspection booths. The SENTRI pedestrian program (expedited customs and border protections processing for preapproved, low-risk travelers) has also begun at the border. SANDAG discussed the construction at the port of entry. Measureable results for this reporting period include putting four illegal transportation companies out of business. Stronger enforcement was implemented at the bus depot on Rail Court during this reporting period.

MTS staff also regularly attends the South Bay Detectives and Binational Public Safety meetings. Many of the same agencies participate to share information and discuss and resolve crimes and issues related specifically to the South Bay and Tijuana, respectively.

SMART Bus Drill - MTS invited La Mesa Police's Special Response Team (SRT) personnel to conduct training at MTS involving critical incidents relative to the new "Smart Bus." The training scenarios consisted of two incidents, both of which involved an armed gunman who took over a bus filled with about 40 hostages.

In early December, the Transit System Security Department conducted a "Table Top" in accordance with the protocol set by the Federal Transit Administration (FTA) and the grant process.

Later in December, two mock training scenarios were conducted with an MTS "Smart Bus." Participants included MTS management and personnel, TSA officials, SDPD ABLE helicopter, DOT officials, and officials from the "Smart Bus" contractor MagTech.

The La Mesa Police SRT team, along with MTS Bus staff, decided that the drill, the location of the radio dispatcher, and the bus radio personnel would remain remote at their location. The committee agreed that the use of a K9 unit would give some realism to the drill and that the onboard CCTV would be an added benefit in reviewing how well the drill was administered.

The Command Post was established in the parking lot of the Spring Street Trolley Station. The plan was to have the bus leave the Command Post to randomly drive through the city. Officers were then to attempt to track down the bus, follow it, conduct a hot stop (once the remote deactivation system disabled the bus), and then have SRT personnel assault the bus to resolve the incident.

SRT officers decided on their own to exit their vehicle, run up behind the moving bus, and manually disable the bus by lifting the rear panel and turning off the main switch. This immediately disabled the bus and allowed SRT officers to assault the bus. Two light and sound diversionary devices were used during the assault. The suspect was taken into custody quickly, without incident.

After the mock training missions, MTS personnel conducted additional training to SRT officers regarding how to manually deactivate the bus in several locations and how to deactivate the doors in order to manually open them from the outside. Bus supervisors gave insight on how some of the issues would help them during a real-time situation.

LMPD Sergeant V. Brown stated: "The mock missions and training were an outstanding opportunity for La Mesa SRT to practice the training received and to deploy those tactics in a real-time scenario. The opportunity to train with MTS personnel and to conduct these mock scenarios was invaluable and has enhanced our team's efforts to be able to safely resolve a critical incident occurring on a bus."

CLOSED-CIRCUIT TELEVISION (CCTV)

CCTV is a proven crime deterrent as well as a positive forensic tool in solving crimes and assisting law enforcement agencies. CCTV is presently functioning at 17 stations including:

- 1. Old Town Transit Center (12 cameras)
- 2. Euclid Avenue Station (8 cameras)
- 3. Fashion Valley Transit Center (8 cameras)
- 4. Qualcomm Stadium Station (16 cameras)
- 5. 47th Street Station (5 cameras)
- 6. El Cajon Transit Center (2 cameras)
- 7. San Diego State University Station (27 cameras)
- 8. Alvarado Medical Center Station (5 cameras)
- 9. 5th & C Street Station (8 cameras)
- 10. Bayfront/E Street Station (10 cameras)
- 11. H Street Station (10 cameras)
- 12. Palomar Street Station (8 cameras)
- 13. San Ysidro Intermodal Station (19 cameras)
- 14. Spring Street Station (6 cameras)
- 15. Amaya Street Station (8 cameras)
- 16. Imperial Transit Center/parking/building (31 cameras)
- 17. City College/Smart Corner (6 cameras)

Most stations have a combination of fixed and pan-tilt-zoom (PTZ) cameras. The PTZ cameras have the capability of rotating to capture a wide-area view and can zoom/tilt to capture view-specific views. Fixed cameras are aimed at specific targets, such as platforms and heavily populated patron areas. All cameras record to a digital video recorder (DVR) and have the capability of retaining 15 days of recorded history. The Euclid Avenue Station has a 30-day recording capacity. All CCTV systems are viewed on monitors in the Operations Control Center that is staffed with security personnel during train-operating hours. San Diego State University is monitored on 24/7 basis at the on-campus security station.

During this reporting period, work has begun on installing CCTV at the Park & Market Station and America Plaza. Preliminary plans for the Civic Center Station are also in the works. The entire CCTV system is widely used by MTS Transit Enforcement Inspectors and various law enforcement agencies for evidentiary purposes. Many have resulted in court convictions and, while not quantifiable directly, the system is a value-added crime deterrent security measure.

CANINE TEAMS

The canine teams remain active responding to calls of suspicious packages, bags, and suitcases left throughout the MTS system and on non-MTS property assisting law enforcement. They were also called to respond to bomb threats as well as to assist

San Diego Police in explosives detection. The teams have been very successful in maintaining the safety of the system and the surrounding areas.

Officers trained in transit centers, old department stores, warehouses, and on commuter buses in the East County bus yard and on regular buses at the Imperial Avenue and Kearny Mesa Divisions.

The teams attended a refresher course entitled Explosives Handling Safety Course, presented by the TSA. After this training, the teams went to the Sheriff's Bomb and Arson Range and received instruction on explosives and Improvised Explosive Device (IED) recognition.

One team worked a detail at the San Onofre Power Plant, in conjunction with California Highway Patrol and U.S. Customs, randomly checking vehicles entering the facility.

COMMUNITY OUTREACH

Operation Lifesaver presentations continue in conjunction with the MTS Marketing Department. These presentations are paramount in educating the public of the importance of rail safety but also for training police departments. Our K9 representative participated at the Operation Lifesaver booths at both the American Public Transportation Association (APTA) and International Association of Chiefs of Police (IACP) Expos, which were held this fall at the San Diego Convention Center.

The team also made an Operation Lifesaver presentation at Daniel Boone Elementary in National City. There were over 80 second and third graders in attendance, and the "Don't be that Kid" video was shown.

At Kimball Elementary School in National City, another Operation Lifesaver presentation was made to approximately 50 first graders, and 25 parents and family members were in attendance.

One of the K9 units worked the "National Night Out" and "Crime Prevention Day" at the Robert Eggar Sr. South Bay Community Park sponsored by the San Diego Police. In attendance were some 200 families with their children, SWAT, Border Patrol, Retired Senor Volunteer Patrol (RSVP), San Diego Sheriff's Crime Prevention Unit, U. S. Army recruiters, and San Diego Fire and Paramedics.

Staff attended meetings at the San Ysidro Community Center to discuss chronic criminal activity around the port of entry and San Ysidro's centennial celebration. Agencies in attendance were SDPD, US Customs, US Border Patrol, SANDAG, and the San Ysidro Chamber of Commerce. Our officer provided MTS's fare structure information.

MTS personnel attended Safe Passage Meetings each month at a number of local middle and high schools. The purpose of these meetings is to create safe passage for students as they travel to and from school. Over ten agencies are represented at these meetings, and specific MTS bus stops and transit centers have been the focus.
