#### **DRAFT MINUTES**

#### Roll Call

Chairman Mathis called the Board meeting to order at 9:04 a.m. A roll call sheet listing Board member attendance is attached.

#### 2. Approval of Minutes

Mr. Minto moved to approve the minutes of the May 17, 2012, MTS Board of Directors meeting. Mr. Ewin seconded the motion, and the vote was 10 to 0 in favor with Mses. Bragg and England, and Messrs. Alvarez, Cunningham, and Young absent.

NOTICED PUBLIC HEARINGS: (Taken Out of Order)

#### 25. FY 2013 Budget - Public Hearing and Adoption

Mike Thompson, Budget Manager, provided an overview of the fiscal year 2013 budget. He explained that the fiscal year 2013 total budgeted revenue is projected at \$243,921,000, and total projected expenses are budgeted at \$243,921,000 resulting in a balanced budget for fiscal year 2013. He stated that operating revenue totals \$99 million, which is an increase from the fiscal year 2012 amended budget of \$1.9 million or 1.9 %, primarily due to a projected increase in ridership.

Mr. Thompson explained that subsidy revenue totals \$139.1 million, which is an increase from the fiscal year 2012 amended budget of \$5.8 million due to an increase in STA and TransNet funding. He stated that there is a \$3.2 million increase in federal revenue, which is a funding shift from the MTS Capital Improvement Program (CIP) offset by a \$3.0 million decrease in TDA shifted back into the CIP allowing MTS to draw the federal funding in a timelier manner.

He explained that other revenue totaled \$5.8 million, which is a decrease from the fiscal year 2012 amended budget of \$1.8 million due to the proposed increase of \$1.8 million in MTS contingency reserves to reach the 10.0% total MTS contingency balance threshold. He mentioned that the current operating budget utilizes \$10.8 million in one-time funds; \$5.0 million in TDA funds, \$0.8 million in CNG credits, and \$5.0 million in fiscal year 2013 STA funds.

Mr. Thompson talked about the fiscal year 2013 combined expenses total of \$243.9 million, which is an increase from the fiscal year 2012 amended budget of \$11.0 million. He stated that passenger revenues are projected to increase by approximately 2% over the next four years, and that early sales tax projections for fiscal year 2013 show an increase of approximately 4%, which impacts MTS's TDA and TransNet subsidy revenue. He explained that expenses are

projected to increase by approximately 3% over the following four fiscal years primarily due to expected continued operating expense increases, including energy costs.

Mr. Thompson stated that the MTS fiscal year 2013 operating budget closing strategy includes the utilization of one-time funds, including \$5 million in TDA capital funds and \$789,000 in CNG credits that previously have been used in the capital budget, as well as \$624,000 in STA to fund additional service. He stated that the one-time funds sources will grow to \$8.2 million in fiscal year 2014 resulting in projected deficits ranging from \$879,000 in fiscal year 2014 to \$7.8 million in fiscal year 2017.

Mr. Roberts talked about the makeup of the Budget Development Committee (BDC) and mentioned that the BDC has had discussions about pensions and pension contributions. He stated that the BDC is recommending that the Chief Executive Officer require management employees to contribute 2% to pensions. He explained that the BDC concluded that this requirement will help create a long-term sustainable program. He stated that the BDC will continue to look at pensions and will be have more recommendations near the end of summer.

#### Chairman Mathis opened the hearing at 9:19 a.m.

Nohella Patel – Ms. Patel is part of an advocacy network representing City Heights bus riders. She thanked the Board for restoring services and asked to implement a free student ridership initiative. She stated that the free ride will help the roughly 400 families who have lost bus transportation due to cuts by the City School District. She stated that students are at the Board meeting today hoping to forge relationships with MTS and SANDAG and would like a Board member designated to work with their organization.

Jobana Castellon – Ms. Castellon is a full-time student at City College and explained that from Mid-City the cost to ride the bus is high. She did not receive financial aid for 3 months making it difficult for her family to pay for other things such as food and clothing. She is requesting that student fares be subsidized.

Abdul Mohamed – Mr. Mohamed is part of the Mid-City network and a full-time student at Grossmont College. He stated that it is very difficult to afford to get to school, and acknowledges that this is a difficult economic time, but is requesting the Board look into a subsidized bus program.

Jeanette Neeley – Ms. Neeley explained that education is the means to get out of poverty. She stated that City Heights is located between San Diego State University and Downtown San Diego. She explained that when the school system cut the bus program it hurt this community greatly and is asking for the Board to look into subsidy program.

Congressman Bob Filner – Mr. Filner stated that balancing a budget is not an easy thing to do and that these are tough times. He requested that staff take a closer look at some of the recent proposals. He stated that the MTS system is built around bus drivers and that you cannot take away their health care benefits and require them to contribute their own money - it is wrong. He feels that you cannot sacrifice the current employees. Including lifetime health care for the CEO and his wife, then cut the healthcare costs for the employees that make 10% of what their leader does; this action does not give trust to the public. He explained that MTS should not give the impression that you are taking care of the top employees and not the people who run the

show, which is the bus drivers and the operators. When he is Mayor he intends to work with MTS to get kids to school on time and free. He thanked the Board of Directors for their service and stated that he is looking forward to working with MTS to create a better system and a more cost-efficient system that cares about its employees.

Jorge Dominguez – Mr. Dominguez stated that he was not eligible for financial aid and could not attend San Diego State University, which was his first choice of schools because of the cost. Instead he will go to City College and will no longer qualify for the youth pass making it very difficult to afford transportation.

Randy Van Vleck – Mr. Van Vleck is asking for support for a pilot program in the City Heights area for a transit discount program. He stated that free routes in that area similar to that near the University of California, San Diego would greatly benefit their community. He is asking staff to investigate the feasibility of a pilot program in fiscal year 2013.

Sara Garcia – Ms. Garcia is a community organizer in support of a pilot program and stated that it is not fair to students that they cannot go to school because they cannot afford the transportation to get there.

#### Chairman Mathis closed the hearing at 9:43 a.m.

Mr. Gloria wanted to know if staff had an idea of what it would cost to provide a student subsidy. He also stated that families in City Heights sacrifice inordinately for their children and based upon conversations with members of his district, adults are amenable to looking at increased fares to provide a subsidy program for their children. Mr. Jablonski stated that a subsidy program would cost the agency approximately \$8 million at current levels of ridership - not taking into consideration an increase in ridership.

Mr. Ewin wanted clarification as to whether or not the San Diego City School District has shifted the responsibility of transit to MTS. He also stated that there is a Green Keepers program provided through Grossmont College that Mr. Mohamed could look into

Mr. Roberts commented that it is a direct contradiction to pay drivers more and subsidize ridership. He stated that the Board is very enthusiastic in establishing some real basic services and looking for creative ways to create revenue. He stated that the BDC can look into student subsidy, but the subsidy will probably not be possible unless something is cut.

Mr. Young mentioned that he is meeting with the School Board in September to talk about transportation issues, and he stated that it is not the burden of MTS to transport students to school.

#### Action Taken

Mr. Roberts moved to: (1) hold a public hearing, receive testimony, and review and comment on the fiscal year 2013 budget information presented in the report; and (2) enact Resolution No. 12-10 adopting the operating and capital budget for MTS and approving the operating budgets for San Diego Transit Corporation (SDTC), San Diego Trolley, Inc. (SDTI), MTS Contract Services, Chula Vista Transit, and the Coronado Ferry subject to the Budget Development

Committee continuing to evaluate pensions; and (3) directed the Chief Executive Officer (CEO) implement a 2% pension contribution for management employees by the end of 2012. Mr. Ovrom seconded the motion, and the vote was 13 to 0 in favor with Ms. Emerald and Mr. Alvarez absent.

#### 3. Public Comments

John Wood – Mr. Wood commented that the construction contractor working at the Massachusetts Avenue trolley station in Lemon Grove has no common sense. He stated that the construction is taking longer than the construction at the 47<sup>th</sup> Street Station.

Thomas Brill – Mr. Brill commented that his previous employer had a policy that MTS could use to reduce its healthcare costs. He stated that bus drivers that are overweight would be put on notice to lose weight or lose their job.

Mr. McClellan moved to approve Consent Agenda Item Nos. 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, 13, and 14. Mr. Ovrom seconded the motion, and vote was 12 to 0 in favor with Ms. Emerald, Mr. Alvarez, and Mr. Roberts absent.

#### **DISCUSSION ITEMS**

#### REPORT ITEMS:

#### 45. <u>Compass Card Update</u>

Rob Schupp, Director of Marketing, gave an update on the Compass Card conversion. He gave an overview of the card and talked about the advantages of the card. He talked about milestones of implementation. He explained the different types of fare products with monthly pass holders consisting of 63.7% from first to last day of the month. Mr. Schupp talked about the sales by volume stating that 46.8% of riders use a Compass Card. He explained the next steps in converting day pass users to Compass Card holders with the plan of selling Compass Cards for \$2 as of October 1.

#### Action Taken

Mr. Cunningham moved to receive a report on Compass Card implementation. Mr. Ovrom seconded the motion, and the vote was 12 to 0 in favor with Ms. Emerald, Mr. Alvarez, and Mr. Roberts absent.

#### 46. Service Performance Monitoring Report for July 2011 through March 2012

Devin Braun, Senior Transportation Planner, gave a report on service performance for July 2011 through March 2012. He stated that report is based upon evaluation criteria outlined in Policy No. 42. He gave an overview of total passenger ridership and explained that systemwide ridership is up approximately 5.7% from last April. He then explained that for fixed-route buses, riders per revenue hour increased from 32.6 to 34.2, which is a rate change of 5%.

Mr. Braun explained that on-time performance has remained around 84% to 86%. He explained that preventable accidents for MTS Bus and MTS Contract Services are down slightly for FY 12, and MTS Rail has had 3 preventable accidents in FY 12 compared to none in FY 11. He stated that complaints per 100,000 passengers for MTS Bus have fallen by 32.8% and MTS Rail have fallen 21.7%.

Mr. Braun talked about the In-Service Hours and Miles per week with MTS operating approximately 123 more hours per week and 3,070 more in-service miles per week. He talked about the Weekday Peak-Vehicle Requirement, which shows the maximum number of vehicles that are on the road at any time in order to provide the levels of service that have been planned with MTS Bus having an overall decrease of one vehicle while Contract Services increased by one peak bus in the same time period.

Ms. England asked for clarification of preventable accidents on MTS Rail. Wayne Terry, Chief Operating Officer of Rail, gave an overview of the internal procedures following an accident.

Ms. Rios commented on the Contract Services complaints. Claire Spielberg, Chief Operating Officer of Transit, explained that cameras have been installed on buses, which now allow MTS to know exactly what occurred during a reported incident. Mr. Jablonski explained that several years ago, the agency added Contract Services to the call center; therefore there is a natural progression in the number of complaints.

#### Action Taken

Mr. Minto moved to receive a report for information. Mr. McClellan seconded the motion, and the vote was vote was 12 to 0 in favor with Ms. Emerald, Mr. Alvarez, and Mr. Roberts absent.

### 47. Operations Budget Status Report for April 2012

Mr. Thompson gave a status report on the Operations Budget for April 2012. He explained that the year-to-date MTS net-operating income unfavorable balance totaled \$356,000, operations produced a \$445,000 unfavorable variance, and the administrative/other activities areas were favorable by \$90,000. He stated that the year-to-date combined revenues through April 2012 were \$80,228,000 compared to the year-to-date budget of \$80,811,000 representing a negative variance of (-0.7%).

Mr. Thompson stated that the year-to-date combined expenses through April 2012 were \$184,292,000 compared to the budgeted \$184,519,000 resulting in a \$227,000 favorable variance. He talked about the unfavorable personnel costs, favorable outside services,

unfavorable materials and supplies, unfavorable energy costs, favorable risk management, and a favorable general and administrative balance.

#### Action Taken

Ms. England moved to receive an MTS operations budget status report for April 2012. Mr. Cunningham seconded the motion, and the vote was 11 to 0 in favor with Ms. Emerald and Messrs. Alvarez, Roberts, and Young absent.

#### 60. Chairman's Report

Chairman Mathis stated that there was a favorable article regarding covering costs with fares that was recently in the San Diego Union-Tribune.

#### 61. Audit Oversight Committee Chairman's Report

Mr. Ewin stated that the preliminary audit report is complete, and the final report will be brought before the Board in November for action.

#### 62. Chief Executive Officer's Report

Mr. Jablonski stated that he attended the CTA Spring Legislative Conference in Sacramento last month and talked with Legislators about current issues. He mentioned that he traveled last weekend to Boston at the expense of the Transit Cooperative Research Board and participated in a Committee meeting, and yesterday he traveled to Sacramento to meet and participate in legislation regarding bus axle weights.

#### **Budget Impact**

The FY 2013 TDA claims would result in the approval of \$71,437,805 in TDA Article 4.0 funds, \$3,853,644 in Article 4.5 funds, and \$441,644 in Article 8.0 funds for MTS. Article 4.0 provides authority for claiming funds for general transit operations and capital. Article 4.5 funds are set aside by the San Diego Association of Governments (SANDAG) for Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) Access services. Article 8.0 funds are used for the ferry/commuter express.

#### **DISCUSSION:**

On February 24, 2012, SANDAG estimated a total of \$117,143,185 of TDA funds available for the region based on the San Diego County Auditor's sales tax projections. A total of \$74,680,877 is estimated to be allocated to MTS less \$2,801,428 in regional planning/capital project and transferred functions and plus \$3,853,644 in total community transit service. As a result, MTS is expected to receive a net amount of \$75,733,093 in TDA for FY 2013; \$65,123,146 of the claim amount would be utilized for operating activities under the Article 4.0, 4.5, and 8.0 guidelines, and \$10,609,948 would be used to fund the Capital Improvement Program.

The funds would be budgeted under SDTI and SDTC's operating maintenance funds, which uses federal funds (80 percent federal and 20 percent local).



#### **DISCUSSION:**

SDTC and SDTC would be entering into a contract for power vacuum sweeping services for three-year base with 2 one-year options. The contract would be effective August 1, 2012. The scope of work would consist of parking lot sweeping at all 19 SDTI parking lots and SDTC Imperial Avenue Division. The contractor would power vacuum the lots designated (see Attachment B). The contractor would also clean the perimeter of the lots, including the corners, behind the curb stops, underneath parked vehicles, and all entrances/exits. Sweeping services would begin after 10:00 p.m. and prior to 4:00 a.m. All SDTI parking lots would be cleaned two times per week while SDTC's Imperial Avenue Division would be done once every two weeks.

MTS's Invitation for Bids was solicited and opened on April 24, 2012, for parking lot sweeping services for SDTI and SDTC for a five-year period. Seven responsive bids were received (see Bid Summary - Attachment C). Alpha & Omega Venture Group LLC was the lowest responsive, responsible bidder at \$164,320.00. Pursuant to MTS Policy No. 52, staff recommends award of MTS Doc. No. G1450.0-12 to Alpha & Omega Venture Group LLC.

The funding for this contract would be allocated under San Diego Trolley, Inc. operating maintenance funds (352-54510), which uses 80% federal funds and 20% local funds.



#### DISCUSSION:

MTS Policy No. 52 governing procurement of goods and services requires a formal competitive bid process for procurements exceeding \$100,000. This solicitation was to obtain LRV pantograph carbon strips from a qualified provider.

MTS's goal is to purchase an estimated quantity of 2,800 LRV pantograph carbon strips for a five-year period. This agreement would provide LRV pantograph carbon strips for MTS's Siemens' LRV models U-2, SD 100, S70, and SD-8.

On May 15, 2012, MTS issued an Invitation for Bids (IFB) for Light Rail Vehicle (LRV) Pantograph Carbon Strips for a five-year period. On June 19, 2012, MTS received three bids. All three bids were responsive and responsible (see Bid Summary - Attachment B). Schunk Graphite, Inc. was found to be the lowest responsive and responsible bidder for the five-year period at \$370,720.00. Based on the comparison between the in-house cost estimate, and Schunk Graphite, Inc.'s bid amount, MTS's cost savings would be approximately 23 percent, which is a decrease of \$114,637.00 over the five-year period (see Cost Analysis - Attachment C).

Pursuant to MTS Policy No. 52, staff recommends award MTS Doc. No. L1074.0-12 to Schunk Graphite, Inc.

SUBJECT:

TYPE II CLASS B PARATRANSIT BUSES - CONTRACT AWARD

#### RECOMMENDATION:

That the Board of Directors authorize the Chief Executive Officer (CEO): (1) to execute MTS Doc. No. B0588.0-12 (in substantially the same form as Attachment A) with Creative Bus Sales to purchase 40 Class B Cutaway buses manufactured by Starcraft Bus; (2) exercise an option to purchase up to 6 additional Class B Cutaway buses for paratransit services; and (3) amend the contract to adjust the sales tax rate if necessary to be consistent with state law during the term of the contract. This is a piggyback procurement under the CalACT Purchasing Cooperative Contract No. 11-03 CBS.

#### **Budget Impact**

This purchase is budgeted under MTS Capital Improvement Program (CIP) 11306.

- The purchase of 40 Class B buses would not exceed \$2,817,504.00. The cost per bus would be \$66,640.25 plus 7.75% sales tax of \$3,797.35 for a total amount of \$70,437.60 per bus.
- The option for the additional 6 Class B buses would not exceed \$419,625.60. The cost per option bus would be \$66,140.25 plus 7.75% sales tax of \$3,797.35 for a total amount of \$69,937.60 per bus.
- The grand total budget impact, including options, would not exceed \$3,237,129.60.



## **DISCUSSION:**

MTS has a contractual obligation to provide its paratransit contractor with a bus fleet capable of meeting service demands. The Federal Transit Administration (FTA) regulations require that MTS schedule 100% of its daily trip demand with a zero-denial rate. In order to fulfill this obligation, MTS must maintain a sufficient spare ratio to accommodate routine preventative maintenance and demand growth while meeting its current service requirements. These vehicles will replace existing vehicles in the fleet, which are close to the end of their service life.

The FTA Circular 4220.1F, Chapter V, Section 4, encourages federal grant recipients to use state and local intergovernmental agreements for procurements of property and services. Based on this, MTS staff identified an intergovernmental agreement that provides Class B buses that meet MTS specifications. The Class B buses are available through a local government purchasing schedule administered by the California Association of Coordinated Transportation (CalACT). The CalACT Vehicle Purchasing Cooperative allows MTS to select vehicles from a pre-competed menu of choices from different vendors and manufacturers.

The CalACT Vehicle Purchasing Cooperative was competitively bid in accordance with FTA procurement guidelines and contains all of the federally required clauses and certifications. Pricing obtained through the latest CalAct purchasing cooperative represents a price savings of roughly \$5,400 per vehicle or a total savings of \$216,000.00 for the initial order of 40 vehicles. The vehicles being purchased are the same make and model and are similarly equipped as the majority of the current MTS paratransit fleet.

MTS staff has conducted a preaward audit and certifies that the Class B buses are compliant with federal regulations for purchasing rolling stock with federal financial assistance.

Delivery of the initial 40 Class B buses would occur approximately 120 days after contract award and would allow MTS to continue to provide Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) services with zero denials.

Based on the above information, MTS staff has concluded that awarding a contract to Creative Bus Sales for Class B buses manufactured by Starcraft Bus represents the best value to MTS. Pricing and other factors considered, it is recommended that the Board approve awarding a base contract to Creative Bus Sales in the amount of \$2,817,504.00 for 40 Class B buses and grant the CEO the authority to exercise the option in the amount of \$419,625.60 for up to 6 additional Class B paratransit buses.

#### RECOMMENDATION:

That the Board of Directors:

- ratify MTS Doc. No. L0936.0-10 dated December 17, 2009, with Sperry Rail Services for ultrasonic rail testing, which was previously executed pursuant to the Chief Executive Officer's (CEO) authority<sup>1</sup>; and
- 2. authorize the CEO to negotiate and execute an amendment to MTS Doc. No. L0936.0-10 for ultrasonic rail testing through December 2012.

## **Budget Impact**

Contract amounts would increase by approximately \$55,000 for rail testing paid for from the San Diego Trolley, Inc. Track Department Operating Budget (371-53710). No increase in the fiscal year 2013 budget would be required by this action.

## **DISCUSSION:**

In December 2009, following a Request for Quotes process, the CEO awarded a 3-year contract for ultrasonic rail testing to low bidder Sperry Rail Services for \$93,356.67. The contract set an annual lump sum for mobilization and testing expenses and established an hourly rate for testing services. The contract also used hourly estimates for how long each rail test would take to complete:

The Federal Railroad Administration (FRA) requires that MTS conduct a full system rail test every 12 months. Because of the age of the line, MTS has elected to conduct 2 additional tests each year on the south end of the Blue Line. Ultrasonic rail testing is vitally important to MTS safe operations because rail defects can lead to a train derailment.

The contract requires testing of the rail lines, including all freight crossovers, yard leads, and spurs. Testing is done when the light rail operations have concluded, generally between 12:00 a.m. and 5:00 a.m. The testing vehicle must work around the active freight operations during this time.

The time required to complete each test depends upon any rail conditions that are found, additional manual inspections conducted, and delays caused by the freight activities in the corridor. Over the first 30 months of the contract, the time to complete each test has in general exceeded the estimates provided in the contract document. In addition, MTS staff has requested that testing focus on more time-intensive areas. Therefore, additional funds are needed to complete testing through calendar year 2012. Staff also proposes adding an Orange and Green Line test to the Test 3 schedule. This would ensure that the annual FRA testing is current in the event that there are delays in the upcoming procurement for a new testing contract beginning January 1, 2013.

## BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING OF THE SAN DIEGO & ARIZONA EASTERN RAILWAY COMPANY

April 10, 2012

A meeting of the Board of Directors of the San Diego & Arizona Eastern (SD&AE) Railway Company, a Nevada corporation, was held at 1255 Imperial Avenue, Suite 1000, San Diego, California 92101, on April 10, 2012, at 9:00 a.m.

The following persons, constituting the Board of Directors, were present: Bob Jones, Randy Perry, and Paul Jablonski. Also in attendance were:

## 1. Approval of Minutes

Mr. Jablonski moved to approve the Minutes of the January 24, 2012, SD&AE Railway Board of Directors meeting. Mr. Jones seconded the motion, and it was unanimously approved.

#### 2. Statement of Railway Finances

Linda Musengo reviewed the financial statement for the 1st quarter of 2012 (attached to the agenda item). Ms. Musengo explained that due to server issues (over the past two weeks), current financial data has not been available. Once these issues are resolved, an updated report will be submitted at the next meeting.

Karen Landers added that \$625,000 in income is anticipated as a result of a General Services Administration (GSA) condemnation case, which will replace the Greyhound income that SD&AE no longer receives.

#### **Action Taken**

Mr. Jablonski moved to receive the report for information. Mr. Jones seconded the motion, and it was unanimously approved.

## 3. Report on San Diego and Imperial Valley Railroad (SD&IV) Operations

Matt Domen presented the report of activities for the 1st quarter of 2012 (attached to the agenda item).

Mr. Domen clarified for Mr. Jablonski that the monthly railcar traffic for gas has increased, and SD&IV is going to receive over 100 cars in the next 48 hours. He added that the volume of traffic for gas is averaging 5 to 10 cars per day. Mr. Domen stated that there has been a continuous volume of railcar traffic with over 200 cars in April, and he anticipates about 300 cars in May.

## **Action Taken**

Mr. Jablonski moved to receive the report for information. Mr. Jones seconded the motion, and it was unanimously approved.

## 4. Report on Pacific Southwest Railway Museum Operations

Diana Hyatt presented the 1st quarter of 2012 report (attached to the agenda item). In response to the Museum's request to install a 36-inch drain pipe under the mainline away from the tracks (east of mile post 66 in Campo), Tim Allison clarified for the Board that staff has extensively reviewed the drainage issues over the past years, which are due to the construction of the Campo Hills Housing Project. Mr. Allison stated that the issues are complicated, and there are a lot of factors involved. He added that Bureau Veritas did a lot of work regarding water runoff issues in 2006. Mr. Allison reported that there are concerns that a 36-inch pipe might create problems elsewhere. An engineering analysis of installing a pipe would be needed to research downstream effects, environmental issues, etc.

Ms. Hyatt added that Museum personnel have tried to work with the County of San Diego to help to rectify the issues, but there has been no action to date. She clarified for the Board that the Museum is primarily the entity being affected.

## **Action Taken**

Mr. Jablonski moved to receive the report for information. Mr. Jones seconded the motion, and it was unanimously approved.

## 5. Report on the Desert Line

#### a. Report on the Desert Line

Sheila Lemire reviewed the 1<sup>st</sup> quarter report (attached to the agenda item).

Karen Landers stated that she received an e-mail sent by Ed Kravitz (attached) who was inquiring about two railcars (Metra Coach Car #7774 and Metra Cab Car #8728) that were purchased several years ago from CZRY by his client IFE Leasing but that were never delivered. Mr. Kravitz requested a response as to whether the sale would be honored or IFE's money would be refunded. Ms. Lemire responded that she received the e-mail from Ms. Landers and called Mr. Kravitz. Ms. Lemire stated that Mr. Kravitz told her that he located the cars on the line and took pictures of them; she will follow up on his request and report back to the Board. Mr. Allison added that the railcars are located at Dubbers spur siding, which is north of Interstate 8 toward Carrizo Gorge.

Mr. Jablonski noted that a revision to page 5a-6 of the report (attached) was submitted by CZRY.

## **Action Taken**

Mr. Jones moved to receive the report for information. Mr. Jablonski seconded the motion, and it was unanimously approved.

## 5. Report on the Desert Line - Continued -

b. <u>Assignment of Carrizo Gorge Railway, Inc. Operating Rights</u>

Karen Landers stated that Pacific Imperial Railroad, Inc. (PIR) is requesting that SD&AE and MTS acknowledge and consent to the assignment of the CZRY Desert Line Operating Agreement to PIR (supporting documentation is attached to the agenda item). Under the current agreement, SD&AE, SD&IV, and CZRY are required to consent and approve. The SD&AE Board's recommendation would be forwarded to the MTS Board for approval, and SD&IV would go through its own procedures.

Mr. Jones asked if the documentation supports the request. Ms. Landers responded that the documents were signed by Dwight Jory, who was the President of CZRY at the time that Amendment No. 3 was signed (on January 7, 2012).

### Public Comment:

- Michael Gardiner (Law Offices of Michael A. Gardiner) Mr. Gardiner stated that he represents Ken Kahan, who is a CZRY shareholder. Mr. Gardiner requested that the following issues be considered before SD&AE Board approval of Amendment No. 3:
  - 1. The proposed assignee PIR is a Delaware Corporation and is not qualified to do business in the state of California. Mr. Gardiner believes that bars approval of a contract regarding rights to operate in the state of California.
  - 2. The contract itself is illegal because no notice was given to CZRY shareholders or Mr. Kahan. This contract potentially exposes all of the assets of CZRY.
  - There was no approval by CZRY shareholders or no request for shareholders to approve the disposition of potentially all of the assets of CZRY.
  - 4. There is a failure of consideration for CZRY to have bargained for the acquisition of PIR for SD&IV's rights on the line, which would have alleviated concerns regarding potentially imminent rights over the Desert Line.

Mr. Gardiner requested that this matter be tabled until the next meeting to determine if PIR has addressed its failure to qualify to do business in the state of California.

Randy Polcyn – (New Director of CZRY) – Mr. Polcyn stated that Agenda Item 5b proposes to assign CZRY's rights and obligations to PIR (under "Recommendation"), but further along in the item, the assignment goes to Pacific Imperial Industries, LCC (PII) (page 5b-1 of the agenda item under "a") and then to PIR.

Ms. Landers explained that the operating agreement is currently in the name of CZRY. The Board is aware of moves being made between CZRY and some of its creditors and shareholders. She added that it is not required to do multiple assignments from CZRY to PII to PIR, and that this action is acknowledging that the documents that were provided go from CZRY to PII and from PII to PIR; the

entity that holds these assigned rights (subject to SD&IV and SD&AE approval) is PIR.

Ms. Landers stated that she was not aware of the issue regarding PIR's right to do business in the state of California. It is her understanding that PIR has an interim operating agreement with CZRY wherein CZRY continues to operate and do the work on the line on behalf of PIR (PIR would need to go through STB's processes before taking over the operations).

Mr. Jablonski added that the agenda item states that as of November 1, 2011, there was an Assignment Agreement between PII and PIR (transfer of operating and trackage rights to PIR).

Mr. Jones stated that he is aware of Delaware corporations operating in the state of California and also sat on one of the boards. He added that unless something has changed since 2010, PIR's right to do business in the state of California shouldn't be an issue.

Michael Gardiner (public speaker) – Mr. Gardiner responded that there is nothing wrong with a Delaware corporation operating a railroad in California if it is qualified to do business. The problem is that PIR is not qualified to do business in California. He added that PIR can rectify the issue but has not, which he believes should bar approval of this request at this time. Mr. Gardiner feels that the Board should look into this issue before approving assigning the operating rights, which can be terminated with 30 days' notice without any requirement that this body be made aware of the termination.

Ms. Landers responded that this issue could be resolved by approving Amendment No. 3 contingent upon confirmation that PIR is authorized to do business in state of California.

Mr. Jablonski asked if there is any documentation stating that CZRY will be authorized to continue to conduct business after this action regardless of who owns it.

 Randy Polcyn (public speaker) – In response to Mr. Jablonski's question, Mr. Polcyn referenced page 5b-2 of the agenda item, which states Pursuant to a November 10, 2011, "Interim Operating Agreement" between PIR and CZRY, CZRY continues to operate on the Desert Line, under the supervision of PIR and subject to PIR's discretion.

Mr. Jablonski added that the people who are doing business as CZRY are qualified to do business in California.

#### Action Taken

Mr. Jablonski moved to authorize the SD&AE President to consent to Amendment No. 3¹ of the Carrizo Gorge Railway, Inc. (CZRY) 2002 Operating Agreement (MTDB Doc. No. S200-02-194) assigning CZRY's rights and obligations to Pacific Imperial Railroad (PIR) contingent upon General Counsel's confirmation that PIR is licensed to operate in the state of California (before going to the MTS Board for approval). Mr. Jones seconded the motion, and it was unanimously approved.

Tim Allison reported that he has not been able to access the documents executed because agency servers are down, so he will have that information for the next meeting.

Ms. Landers reported that SDG&E served SD&AE with an eminent domain complaint in regard to its East County Substation Project that will cross SD&AE right-of-way. Ms. Landers stated that there are some deficiencies in the lawsuit. She added that normally SDG&E works with staff to acquire an easement voluntarily. SDG&E has included SD&AE as a defendant with another private property owner in the complaint. Ms. Landers is working with SDG&E to hopefully resolve the issue and will give an update. Mr. Allison added that there will be three crossings involved when SDG&E makes official contact with us.

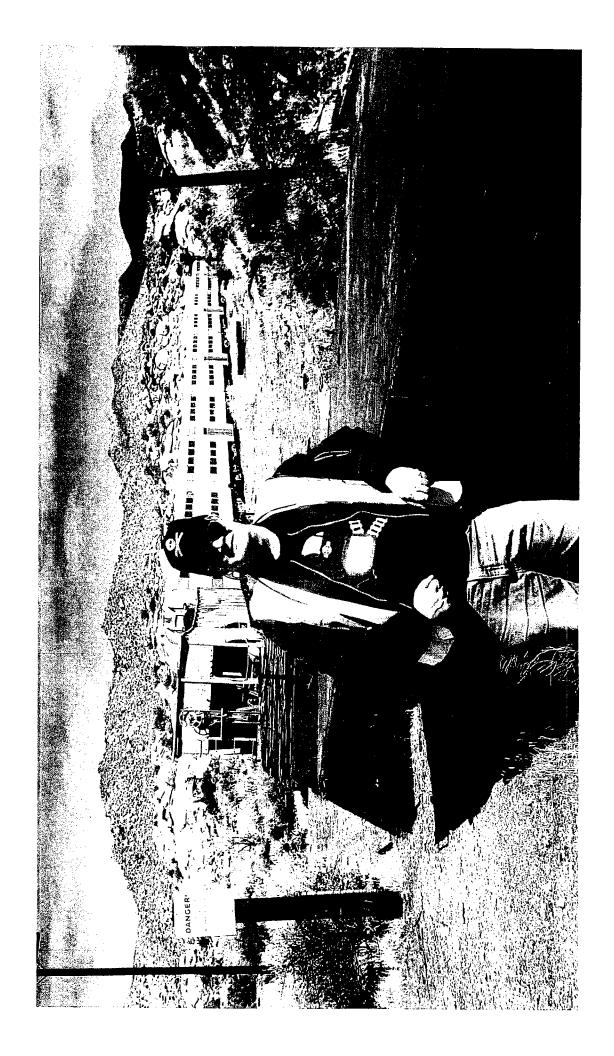

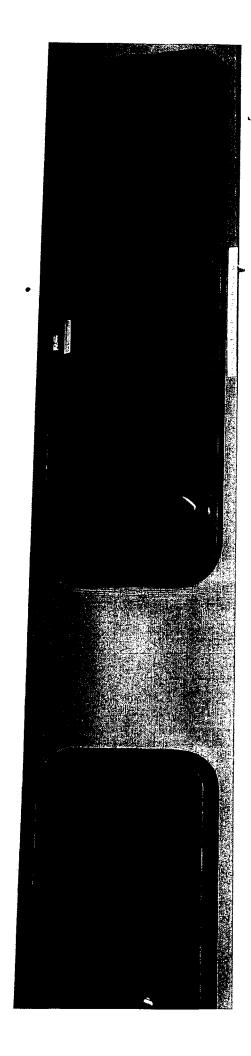

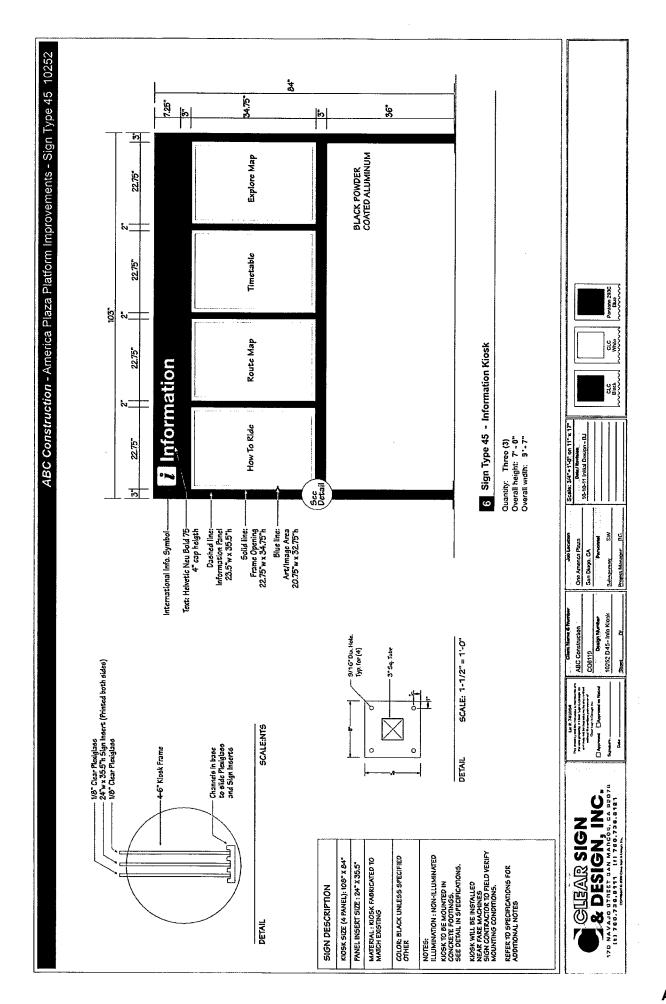

#### DISCUSSION:

Attached are the financial results for the four quarters ended June 30, 2012, and 2011. The current year depreciation expense, which is approximately \$17,000, will be recorded as a part of the audit process. In addition, it is likely that other adjusting entries will be recorded during the three to four months that comprise the audit preparation process.

The current year-to-date results show a \$59,000 decrease in total revenue comprised of a \$43,000 decrease in right of entry revenue, \$10,000 decrease in lease income, and \$6,000 decrease in San Diego and Imperial Valley Railroad freight fee compared to the same period last year. Expenses decreased by \$49,000 due to the timing of depreciation expense and reduced expenses for outside services and insurance premiums. The net income before the audit for FY 12 was \$11,815 compared to the net income of \$22,358 in FY 11.

During the second quarter of 2012, the Pacific Southwest Railway Museum carried 2,882 passengers with no FRA reportable accidents or injuries. Total Income from SD&AE property for second quarter 2012 was \$35,365.00, a check for \$707.30 is enclosed. By comparison, PSRM carried 2,434 passengers during the second quarter of 2011 and total income from SD&AE property for that quarter was \$33,954.16.

The Museum operated two special event trains during the quarter: the annual Bunny Trains and our annual Father's Day BBQ. Both events seem to be increasing in popularity and help boost the Museum's springtime ridership figures. These two events will continue to be annual events at Campo.

The Campo Depot restoration project is winding down with the completion of the interior of the downstairs waiting room. Passengers can now enjoy one of two documentaries about the San Diego & Arizona Railway or the history of the railroad and the Museum's efforts at preserving that history on a large flat screen television. Several more benches need to be purchased as funds are available. The long awaited air conditioning systems have been purchased and are onsite. We are eager to have it operational very soon as the temperatures are already in the nineties during the day.

Maintenance of Way work continues along the right of way, some weeding was necessary to maintain clearances for Cal Fire. Museum personnel continue to perform the monthly signal inspections and remain under the supervision of the signal inspector with Transit America. Recently, there have been some unexplained activations, primarily at the east Highway 94 crossing; it is currently under investigation and more information should be available by the time this board meets in July.

The Museum has closed escrow and is now the owner of 12.9 acres adjacent to the railroad right of way east (railroad south) of the Campo Depot and has entered into a lease to own agreement for another 6.25 acres of land adjacent to both of these two parcels. This is positive news for the museum as the acquisition of both properties has been a long range vision of museum management. This land is expected to be utilized for insulation from surrounding encroachment and future expansion of the museum facility.

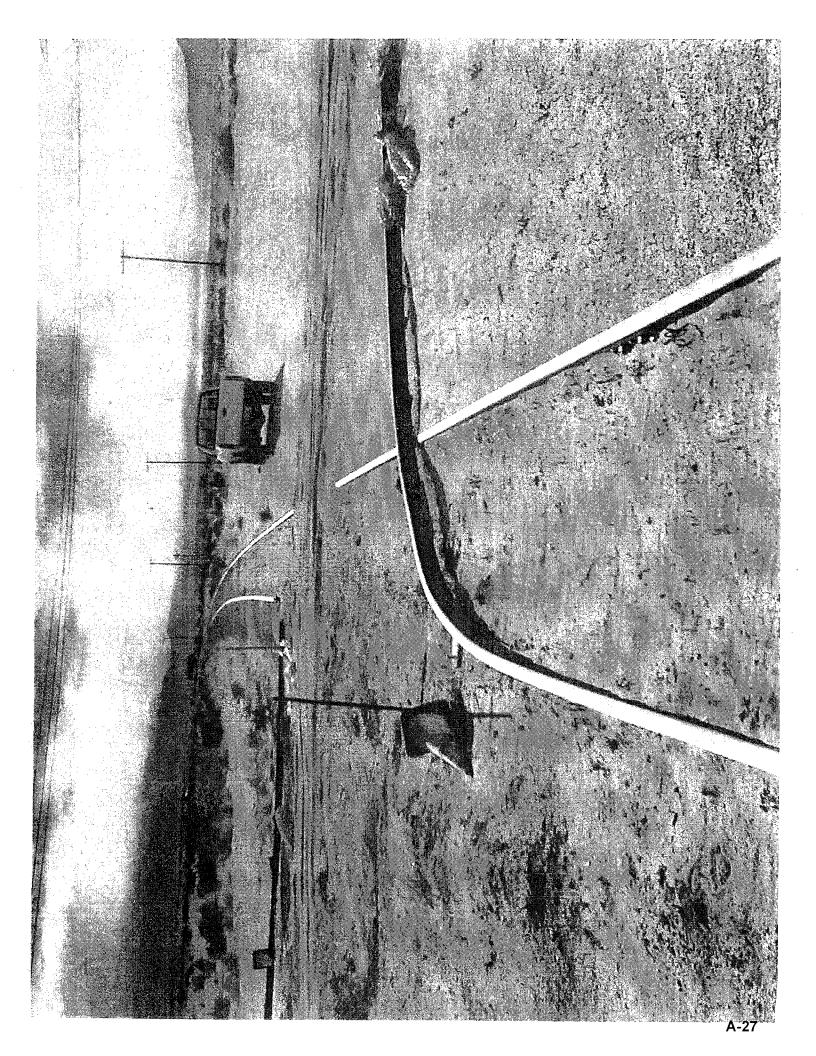
- An inspection of track and right of way between Milepost 93 (Jacumba) and Milepost 129.5 (Plaster City) revealed numerous locations where rock and debris had encroached upon right of way.
- Heavy equipment was employed to clear rock, sand and other debris from the track and right of way allowing for safe clearance of railroad equipment.
- Approximately 60 feet of main line track at Milepost 129 (Plaster City) was repaired and replaced due to damage by construction equipment working on the SDG&E power line during November 2011.
- We are currently working with Cal-Fire (CA Dept. of Forestry) to reinstate the right of way brushing program to establish brush clearances to specifications.
- We are surveying the railroad bridges between Milepost 60 (Division) and Milepost 129.5 (Plaster City) for current condition and repairs needed. Work scope and repair estimates are being developed and prioritized for structures in need of repair.
- Maintenance and repairs are currently underway for the automatic highway crossing signals at Highway 94 (working in conjunction with the San Diego Railroad Museum) and at Highway S-2 in the Imperial Valley near Ocotillo.

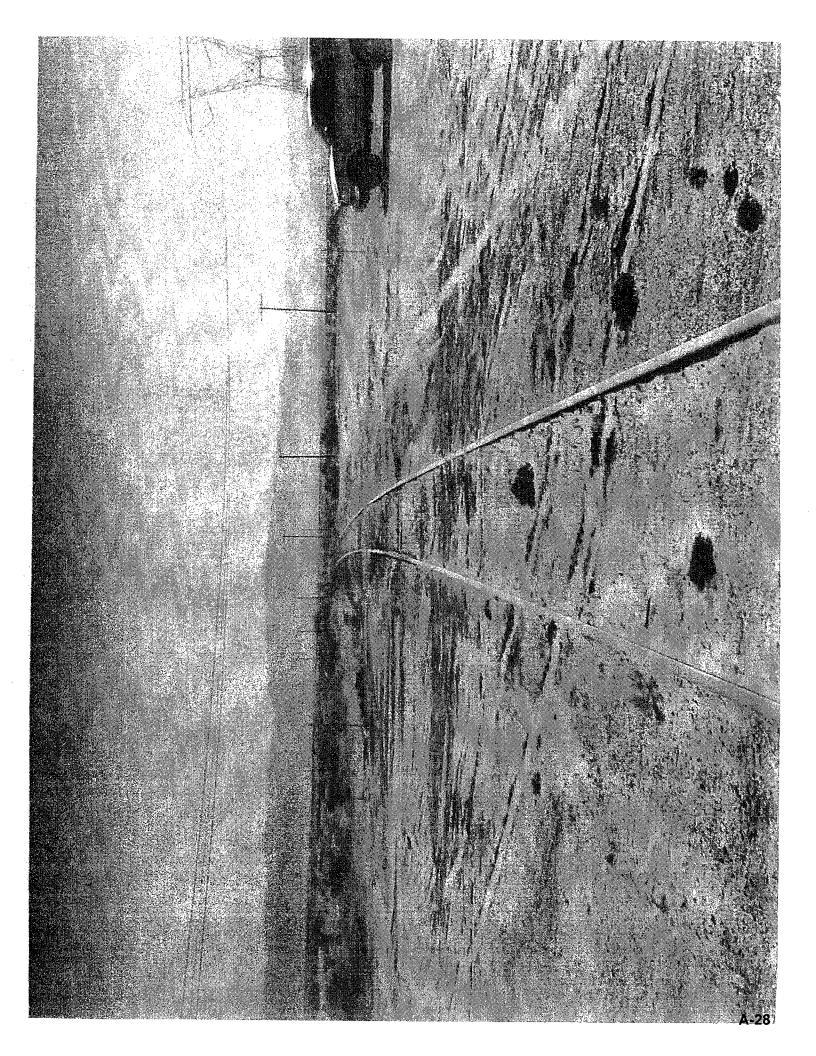

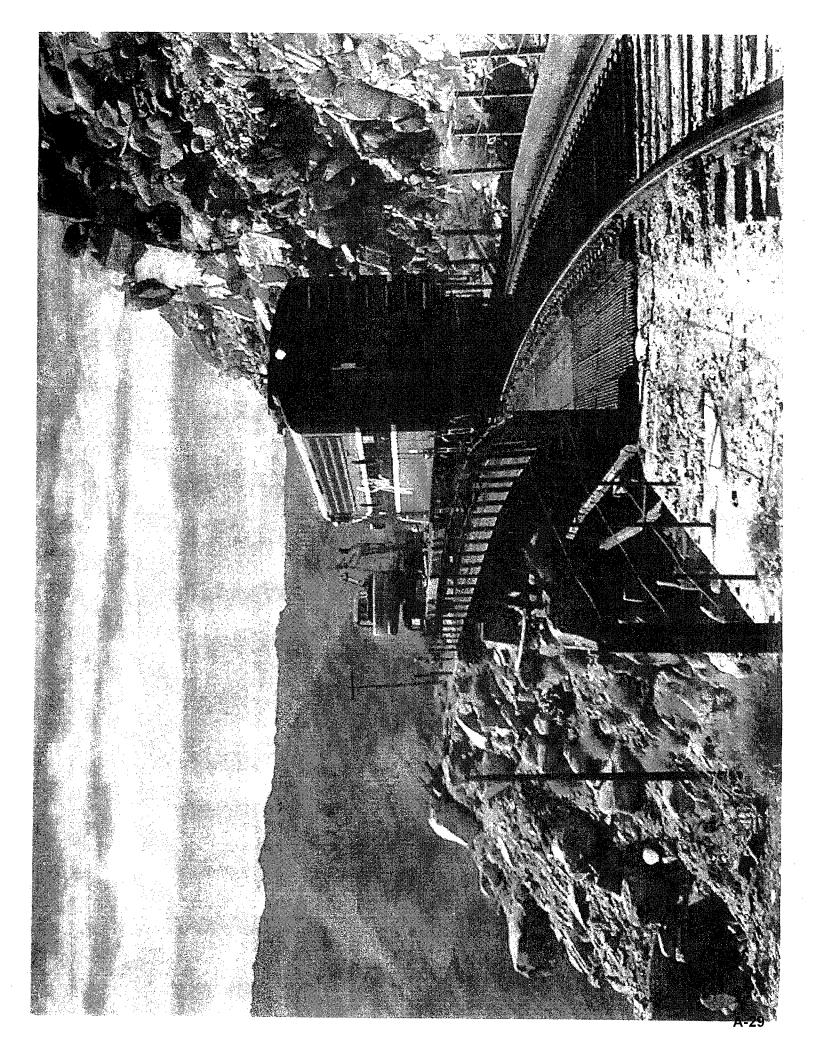

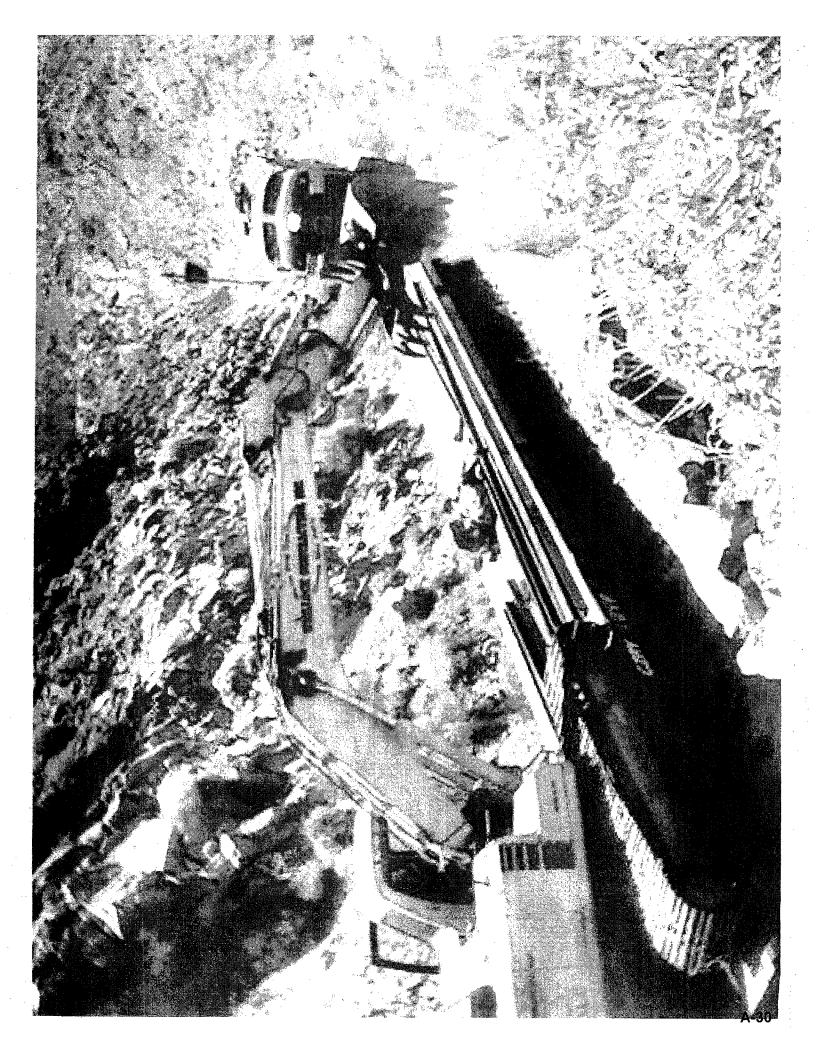

#### DISCUSSION:

On April 3, 2007, CZRy, SD&AE, SD&IV, and USBP executed an agreement authorizing USBP's San Diego Sector to utilize certain portions of the Desert Line for law enforcement and Border Patrol activities subject to its compliance with all operating rules and regulations. SD&AE/MTS has been approached by USBP about updating the agreement. A copy of the April 3, 2007, Agreement is included with this agenda item as Attachment A.

The term of the agreement was for one year and may be amended upon review of the SD&AE Board.

# AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE SAN DIEGO AND ARIZONA EASTERN RAILWAY COMPANY, UNITED STATES BORDER PATROL, AND CARRIZO GORGE RAILWAY TO ALLOW BORDER PATROL ACCESS TO PORTIONS OF THE SD&AE RIGHT-OF-WAY FOR LAW ENFORCEMENT PURPOSES

#### 1. Intent

The Metropolitan Transit Development Board (hereinafter referred to as MTDB aka MTS) purchased and acquired SD&AE, which owns the right-of-way, physical assets, and operating rights, agreements, and licenses referred to as the Desert Line. MTS has contracted with RailAmerica, Inc., a Florida Corporation (hereinafter referred to as RA) to provide all freight service on the Desert line and Blue Line through its assignee, the San Diego and Imperial Valley Railroad (hereinafter referred to as SD&IV).

CZRy is the subcontractor to SD&IV, which operates freight service solely on the Desert Line. SD&AE hereby authorizes and SD&IV and CZRy hereby consent to the USBP utilizing a limited and specified portion of the Desert Line in conjunction with and subject to the operating rules and procedures of CZRy for the operation of on-track Hy-rail vehicles for the purpose of law enforcement. During the term of this Agreement, the USBP shall fully and without reservation, hold harmless MTS, SD&AE, SD&IV, RA, CZRy, and the Pacific Southwest Railroad Museum, Inc. (hereinafter referred to as PSRMA) from any risk of loss, damage, injury, or death that shall occur in connection with USBP's use of the Desert Line under this Agreement.

#### 2. Obligations of the USBP

- A. Safely operate at its own cost a fleet of Hy-rail vehicles on the designated portion of the railroad as provided herein, including providing for regular maintenance, inspection, and repair of said vehicles and adequate safety training and supervision of persons performing the services, at its own expense. Vehicles so designated and equipped as Hy-rail vehicles shall be equipped with two-way radio communications and shall have the ability to transmit and receive on all applicable railroad frequencies. Hy-rail vehicles operating on track shall have either a rotating or flashing highly visible amber warning light that will operate and remain on day or night while the vehicle is in motion on the rail. Additionally the headlights of the vehicle will remain on day or night while the vehicle is in motion on the rail.
- B. At its own cost, maintain an inventory of parts and equipment necessary and appropriate to safely operate Hy-rail vehicles on the railroad and provide the functions authorized under the terms of this Agreement.

- C. Continuously comply in all material respects with all lawfully enacted federal, state, and local laws, ordinances, rules, and directives applicable to railroad Hy-rail vehicle operations, including compliance with all applicable safety standards and operating regulations of CZRy. The USBP shall be solely responsible for payment of fines levied by any regulatory agency relating to USBP railroad Hy-rail vehicle operations, equipment, and maintenance hereunder.
- D. Make timely and accurate reports to all federal, state, and local regulatory and safety agencies having jurisdiction over USBP railroad Hy-rail vehicle activities.
- E. File with CZRy and SD&AE one copy of every report filed with a federal, state, or local regulatory or safety agency at the same time such report is filed with any such agencies as it relates to the use and operation of USBP railroad Hy-rail vehicles used on the Desert Line.
- F. Assume full responsibility for all liabilities of the USBP in accordance with applicable federal and state laws and all causes of action arising out of facts occurring during any period in which the USBP is operating railroad Hy-rail vehicles on the Desert Line and right-of-way and hold MTS, SD&AE, SD&IV, RA, CZRy, and PSRMA harmless from all such claims and liabilities.
- G. The USBP shall designate personnel who will operate and can be trained and certified to safely operate railroad Hy-rail vehicles in the service of the USBP for the purpose of providing law enforcement on designated portions of the railroad. Said personnel must be able to attend a training program taught by qualified CZRy personnel that will include classroom and field training and shall be required to pass a written examination. Following this, each participant will undergo an operating proficiency test to determine if said individual can operate an on-track Hy-rail vehicle safely and be compliant with the rules, regulations, and procedures of the CZRy.

The USBP shall at all times operate railroad Hy-rail vehicles in compliance with the CZRy "Hy-rail and Motorcar Operation Procedures" attached hereto as Exhibit A or such other updated operating procedures as may be agreed upon by CZRy and the USBP.

H. Fully comply with all instructions and orders from the CZRy dispatcher regarding USBP Hy-rail vehicle operations over the railroad right-of-way whether they are received by radio and/or in writing.

#### 3. Obligations of CZRy

CZRy will conduct training and certifications for USBP personnel selected to become certified railroad Hy-rail vehicle operators. CZRy will be responsible for the dispatching and train orders necessary to operate railroad Hy-rail vehicles, motorcars, trains, and other types of on-track vehicles on the railroad. CZRy retains the right to decertify any personnel and preclude decertified persons from operating any railroad equipment on the railroad.

CZRy will cooperate with and assist the USBP to maintain all necessary permits, clearances, agreements, and requirements for operations and maintenance.

CZRy will work with the USBP to ensure that necessary operating schedules for railroad Hy-rail vehicle activities by USBP are planned and implemented to ensure no disruption of any freight or passenger service operated by PSRMA over the Desert Line.

CZRy will provide dispatching and authorizations for use of any given section of right-of-way by both radio and written train orders from the CZRy dispatcher. All instructions received from the dispatcher regarding movement of any rail vehicle over the railroad must be followed.

#### 4. Identification of Designated Track and Right-of-Way

The right-of-way owned by SD&AE over which the USBP will provide law enforcement functions by way of on-track railroad Hy-rail vehicles as described in Exhibit B attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference and in general terms consists of the nonexclusive use by the USBP of the portion of the SD&AE trackage and right-of-way on the Desert Line MP 74 past Miller Creek to Dos Cabazas (Milepost 109) subject to the operations of maintenance-of-way equipment, freight and passenger trains, fire-protection equipment, and railroad security or railroad police. No USBP Hy-rail operations will occur from Milepost 59.9 to Milepost 74 where the PSRMA operates limited passenger services.

#### 5. Term

The initial trial term of this Agreement shall run for one year from the date of signature. Upon review by the SD&AE Board, this Agreement may be amended. USBP must be in compliance with all terms of this Agreement as a condition precedent to the SD&AE considering extending the term.

#### 6. Hold Harmless Agreement

- A. The USBP agrees to hold CZRy, SD&IV, RA, MTS, SD&AE, and PSRMA harmless against any form of claims, costs, liabilities, expenses (including, without limitation, court costs and reasonable attorneys' fees), or demands of whatsoever nature or source arising from: (i) any contamination or environmental problems, latent or obvious, discovered or undiscovered, on the right-of-way; (ii) any personal injury or death of persons whomsoever; or (iii) any property damage or destruction of whatsoever nature (including, without limitation, property of CZRy, SD&IV, RA, MTS, SD&AE, and PSRMA or property in their care, custody, or control and third-party property) where such contamination environmental problems, injury, death, or damage arise out of acts, omissions, or events occurring in connection with this Agreement during the term of this Agreement.
- B. Environmental problems are defined as any cause of action under the Federal Comprehensive Environmental Response Comparison and Liability Act, 42 U.S.C. 6901 et seq., the Federal Water Pollution Act, 33 U.S.C. 1201 et seq., the Clean Water Act, 42 U.S.C. 7401 et seq., and any other federal, state, local, or other government statute, regulation, law, or ordinance dealing with the protection of human health, natural resources, or environmental cause of action arising from similar federal, state, or local regulations or other rules of law, and private causes of action of whatsoever nature that arise from any pollutant, contamination, hazardous substance or waste, solid waste, petroleum or any fraction of petroleum or any other chemical, substance, or material listed or identified in or regulated by any environmental law.

#### 7. Insurance

All policies required shall be issued by companies that are licensed or approved to do business in the State of California and hold a current policyholder's alphabetic and financial-size category rating of not less than A-VI, in accordance with A.M. Best.

USBP shall include the contract number on all insurance-related correspondence; i.e., the insurance certificate itself. USBP agrees to keep the following insurance requirements in force for the duration of the contract:

#### 7.1 COVERAGE REQUIRED - ALL CONTRACTS

#### A Liability

- Commercial General Liability. At all times during this contract, USBP agrees to maintain Commercial General Liability Insurance for bodily injury and property damage in an occurrence form and with insurance companies acceptable to SD&AE. Commercial General Liability Insurance must include coverage for the following:
  - Premises/Operations Liability
  - Products/Completed Operations Liability (for up to a 10-year statute)
  - No Explosion, Collapse, and Underground (XCU) exclusion
  - Contractual Liability, with respect to this Agreement
  - Personal Injury Liability
  - Broad Form Property Damage
  - Independent USBPs

All such policies shall name in the endorsement San Diego Metropolitan Transit System (MTS), San Diego Trolley, Inc. (SDTI), San Diego and Arizona Eastern Railway (SD&AE), and San Diego and Imperial Valley Railroad (SD&IV), their directors, officers, agents, and employees as additional insureds as their interests may appear.

- Automobile Liability. At all times during this contract, USBP agrees to maintain Automobile Liability Insurance (commercial auto coverage on a symbol 1 basis) for bodily injury and property damage including coverage for all owned, nonowned, and hired vehicles.
- Workers' Compensation/Employer Liability. At all times during this
  contract, USBP agrees to maintain Workers' Compensation and
  Employers' Liability Insurance in compliance with the applicable statutory
  requirements. USBP waives any rights of subrogation against MTS,
  SDTI, SD&AE, and SD&IV, and the policy form must permit and accept
  such waiver.

#### 7.2 ADDITIONAL COVERAGES REQUIRED (AS INDICATED)

### A. Railroad Protective or Equivalent REQUIRED

Any exclusions relating to performance of operations within the vicinity of any railroad, bridge, trestle, track, roadbed, tunnel, underpass, or crossing must be deleted. Option: purchase separate Railroad Protective Liability Policy as

required.

### B. Primary and Non-Contributory Insurance

REQUIRED

USBP agrees that all general liability coverages required under this insurance section are PRIMARY and that any insurance of MTS, SDTI, SD&AE, and SD&IV shall be excess and noncontributory (endorsement required).

#### 7.3 MINIMUM POLICY LIMITS REQUIRED

Combined Single Limit (CSL)	\$ 1,000,000
Commercial General Liability (Per Occurrence)	\$ 1,000,000
Automobile Liability	\$ 1,000,000
Workers' Compensation Employer's Liability	\$ 1,000,000

Additional Coverages (as indicated under Section 7.2A, Additional Coverages Required):

Railroad Protective \$ 1,000,000

#### 7.4 POLICY PROVISION REQUIRED

All policies and coverages shall contain a provision for 30 days' written notice by the Insurer(s) to SD&AE of any cancellation or material reduction of coverage. A ten-day notice is required for nonpayment of premium.

#### 7.5 EVIDENCE REQUIRED

Prior to signing this Agreement, USBP shall have provided SD&AE with satisfactory certification by a qualified representative of the Insurer(s) that USBP's insurance complies with all provisions in this insurance section. In the alternative, satisfactory evidence of self-insurance may be provided by USBP and approved at the sole discretion of SD&AE.

#### 7.6 SPECIAL PROVISIONS

The foregoing requirements as to the types and limits of insurance coverage to be maintained by USBP, and any approval of said insurance by MTS, SDTI, SD&AE, and SD&IV, or their insurance consultant(s) are not intended to and shall not in any manner limit or qualify the liabilities and obligations otherwise assumed by USBP pursuant to this Agreement, including, but not limited to the provisions concerning indemnification.

SD&AE reserves the right to terminate this Agreement in the event of material noncompliance with the insurance requirements outlined above.

#### 8. <u>Termination of Agreement</u>

SD&AE shall have the right to terminate this Agreement as follows:

- A. Failure by USBP to safely operate and/or maintain Hy-rail or other rail-mounted vehicles by the rules, regulations, requirements, and stipulations of this Agreement;
- B. Any other material violation of the terms of this Agreement by USBP; or
- C. 60 days' written notice of termination issued by SD&AE for any reason whatsoever.

#### 9. Assignment

This Agreement shall not be assigned by the USBP without the prior written consent of SD&AE.

#### 10. <u>Miscellaneous</u>

- A. This Agreement constitutes the entire understanding and agreement by and between the parties, hereto relative to the subject matter set forth herein. No prior negotiations, statements, warranties, representations, or agreements, whether oral or written, not specifically set forth or incorporated herein shall be permitted to alter, vary, or add to the written terms of this Agreement, nor shall the same be binding upon any party hereto unless first reduced to writing and signed by the party or parties sought to be charged therewith. No written waiver shall effect any other term or condition hereof other than one specified therein and then only for the time and the manner specifically stated.
- B. The right of either party to require strict performance and observance of any obligation hereunder will not be affected in any way by any previous waiver, forbearance, or course of dealing. Exercise by either party of its right to terminate hereunder will in no way affect or impair its right to bring suit for any default or breach of this Agreement.
- C. Any supplement, modification, or waiver of any provision of this Agreement must be in writing and signed by authorized representatives of the parties.
- D. Section 6 of this Agreement shall survive any termination of the Agreement.
- E. In the event that any provisions of this Agreement shall be held to be invalid or unenforceable by a court having jurisdiction over the interpretation and enforceability of the terms of this Agreement, the same shall not affect, in any respect whatsoever, the validity or enforceability of the remaining provisions of this Agreement.

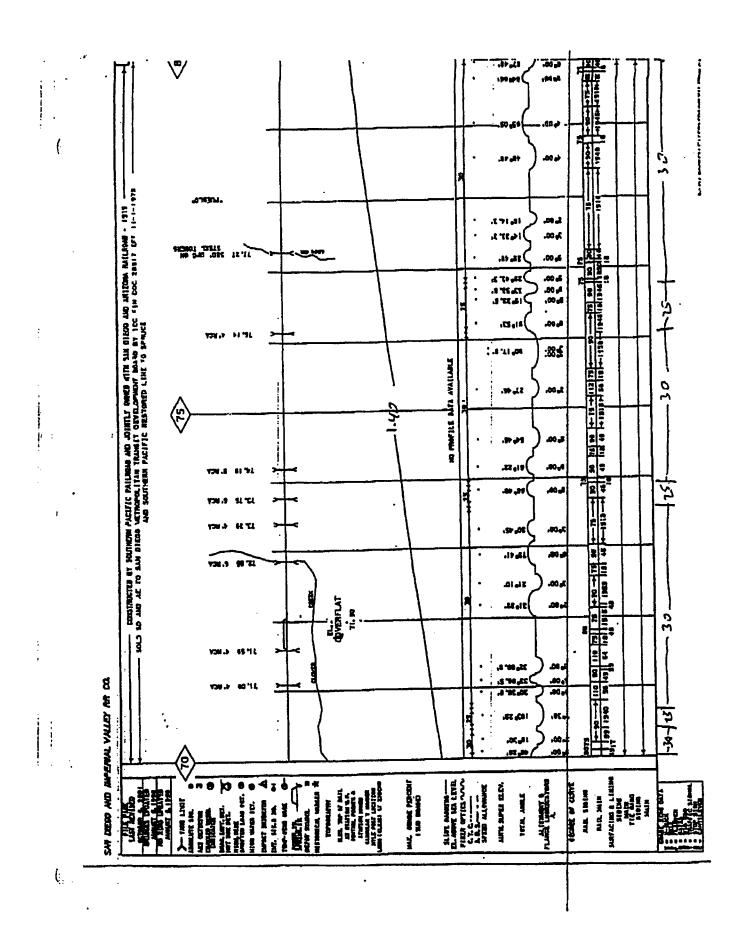

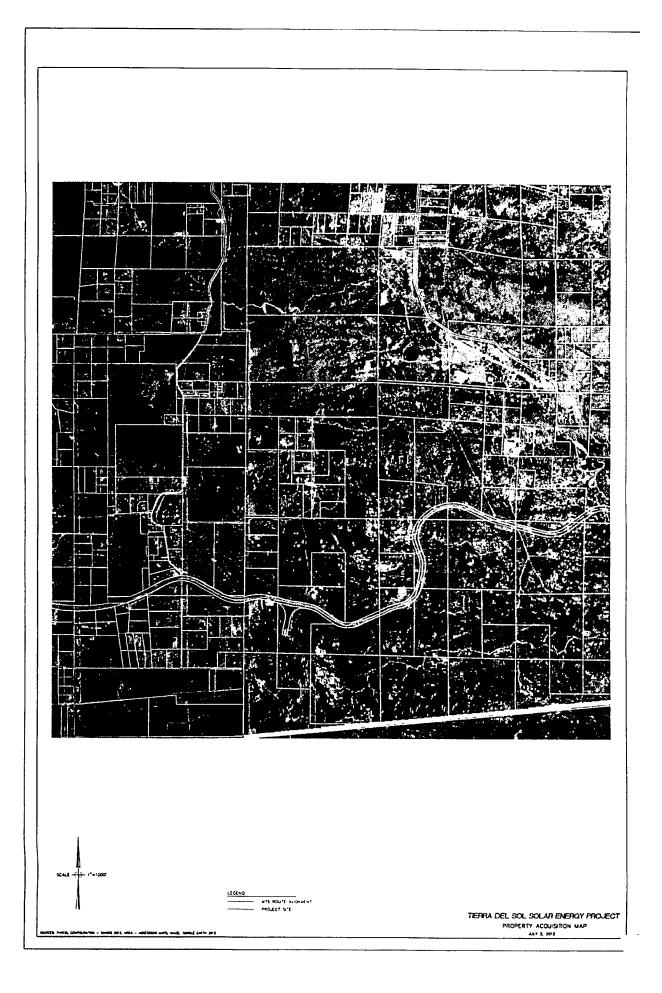

#### RECOMMENDATION:

That the Board of Directors authorize the Chief Executive Officer (CEO) to approve Job Order No. 1337-10 under MTS Doc. No. PWL137.0-11 (Attachment A) with Southland Electrical Inc. for SDSU station fire alarm and security system upgrades and installation.

#### **Budget Impact**

The total amount would not exceed \$700,000.00 and would be allocated under Proposition 1B Transit System Safety, Security, and Disaster Response Account (TSSSDRA) funds for MTS fiscal year 2011–2012 (Capital Improvement Project Budget No. 11325-0800).

#### **DISCUSSION:**

#### **Background**

In order to meet current State of California Deputy Fire Marshall's codes, MTS has an urgent need to upgrade the existing SDSU Station fire alarm to a Simplex Grinnell True-Site fully addressable fire/life/safety detection and alarm system with a train-detection system built-in for SDSU underground tunnels. This project allows the work to be accomplished using TSSSDRA funding and utilizes SANDAG JOC process. This process allows the work to be accomplished prior to the grant funding deadline of March 31, 2015.

The recommended improvements would provide the most current true-site automatic fire alarm system, train location-tracking system, and high-quality, infrared light support security surveillance cameras with automatic detection.



SANDAG and MTS utilize a JOC Program. This innovative program allows the agencies to contract with preapproved contractors in various building trades. The cost of projects administered through the JOC Program is determined by an independent, industry-approved, unit price book that was developed and is maintained by the Gordian Group. MTS has a JOC contract with Southland Electrical Inc. Southland Electrical Inc. is qualified to complete the SDSU Station fire alarm and security system upgrade and installation work. The cost for this project would not exceed \$700,000.00.

The costs to perform work using the JOC Program are prenegotiated through a competitive bid process.

SUBJECT:

RTMS FOR 26 PREMIUM EXPRESS COACH BUSES - SOLE SOURCE

#### RECOMMENDATION:

That the Board of Directors authorize the Chief Executive Officer (CEO) to execute MTS Doc. No. G1481.0-12 (in substantially the same form as Attachment A) with ACS Transport Solutions, Inc. (ACS) to install, test, verify, and warranty Regional Transportation Management System (RTMS) equipment for 26 Premium Express coach buses.

#### **Budget Impact**

This purchase would be budgeted under MTS Capital Improvement Program (CIP) 11290. Funding would come from a Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) grant as part of the Integrated Corridor Management System (described below) awarded to the San Diego Association of Governments (SANDAG) as well as other funding sources to be specified by SANDAG. The execution of this contract would be contingent upon MTS and SANDAG establishing a task order for this project under the comprehensive funding Memorandum of Understanding between the two agencies.

The purchase and installation of equipment, software, and licenses would be implemented on the 26 MTS Premium Express coach buses and would not exceed \$770,763.51. The cost per bus is \$28,142.51 plus 7.75% sales tax of \$1,502.24 for a total amount of \$29,644.75 per bus.

#### **DISCUSSION:**

The Integrated Corridor Management System (ICMS) is a project on the Interstate 15 (I-15) corridor to improve mobility, maximize system efficiency, and provide traveler choices along the corridor. SANDAG received a grant from FHWA to study, plan, and implement the system. Cities along the I-15 corridor and agencies with services in the I-15 corridor are planning this incident-management system, which will coordinate the response to disruptions in traffic flow.



MTS's participation will allow travelers to choose alternate forms of transportation to their destination if freeway disruptions occur. Through the use of real-time passenger ridership information, bus location, and traffic flows on the Premium Express buses, MTS will be able to assist in moving commuters safely and efficiently during an incident.

The RTMS is the radio, computer-aided dispatch (CAD) and automatic vehicle location (AVL) system that MTS uses for dispatching and tracking buses in the MTS fleet. This system also includes Automatic Passenger Counting System (APCS) devices that allow MTS to gather and view information about on and off passenger boardings per stop.

Currently, the 26 Premium Express buses do not have this system, and information such as location, passenger counts, and dispatching is transmitted via cell phone communication between the driver and dispatch. These buses are part of the contracted fleet services currently provided by Veolia Transportation. Adding the RTMS system to these 26 buses will allow MTS staff to receive and manage important ridership data in the same system as with the remainder of the MTS bus fleet.

ACS is the original equipment manufacturer (OEM) of the RTMS equipment on the current MTS fleet of buses, which have RTMS. ACS would provide the new equipment, install and verify operation of the equipment with qualified technicians at Veolia's local facility, and provide warranty support. ACS RTMS equipment is proprietary to ACS, and no other equipment can be sourced to communicate with its equipment or system.

In accordance with third-party contracting guidelines, FTA Circular 4220.1F, Chapter VI, Section 3i(1)(b)1b, a sole source award may be recommended in cases where the recipient (MTS) requires supplies or services available from only one responsible source, and no other supplies or services will satisfy its requirements.

Based on the above information, MTS staff has concluded that awarding a contract to ACS represents the best value to MTS. Pricing and other factors considered, staff finds ACS pricing to be fair and reasonable; therefore staff is requesting Board approval of MTS Doc. No. G1481.0-12 not to exceed \$770,763.51 (inclusive of sales tax) for RTMS equipment, systems, and warranty support provided by ACS for 26 Premium Express buses.

Several American cities have built new or vintage streetcar systems within the past 15 years to spur economic development, reduce parking demands, and enhance pedestrian mobility. Streetcars differ from light rail because they generally feature single-car consists and operate in mixed-traffic. San Diego's last streetcar turned into the barn in 1949, but the recent implementation of the Silver Line by San Diego Vintage Trolley, and the upcoming centennial of Balboa Park, has sparked an interest by many in seeing streetcars once again ply the streets of our area. MTS received a Caltrans planning grant last year to study the feasibility of constructing and operating a streetcar line between Downtown San Diego and Balboa Park. MTS retained Parsons-Brinkerhoff to conduct the technical portions of the study, which is now complete. Staff will provide a final report on the findings of the feasibility study and discuss potential next steps.

That the Board of Directors receive the Semiannual Uniform Report of Disadvantaged Business Enterprise (DBE) Awards or Commitments and Payments (Attachment A).

**Budget Impact**

#### **DISCUSSION:**

As a Federal Transit Administration (FTA) grantee, MTS complies with the federal regulations set forth in Title 49 of the Code of Federal Regulations Part 26 regarding participation by DBEs in the U.S. Department of Transportation (DOT) Program. The DBE regulations require MTS to prepare DBE goals based upon the number of ready, willing, and able DBE-certified contractors available to bid on certain categories of MTS procurements.

The goals of the DBE program are to:

- ensure nondiscrimination in the award and administration of DOT-assisted contracts;
- create a level playing field on which DBEs can compete fairly for DOT-assisted contracts;
- 3. ensure that the DBE program is narrowly tailored in accordance with applicable law;



- 4. ensure that only firms that fully meet 49 CFR Part 26 eligibility standards are permitted to participate as DBEs;
- 5. help remove barriers to the participation of DBEs in DOT-assisted contracts;
- 6. assist the development of firms that can compete successfully in the marketplace outside of the DBE program; and
- 7. provide appropriate flexibility to recipients of federal financial assistance in establishing and providing opportunities for DBEs.

MTS has a race-neutral program with an aspirational goal of 12.6% DBE participation. This means that no special quotas or advantages are provided to DBE contractors. Instead, MTS conducts outreach to DBE and other contractors in an effort to inform them of upcoming MTS procurements. Successful bidders are chosen using race-neutral means, generally through a low-bid or best-value procurement process. For purposes of reporting DBE participation rates to the FTA, MTS may only count participation by certified DBE contractors. Contractors with only women, disabled veteran, or minority-owned certifications do not qualify for DBE reporting. Certified DBE contractors must (1) have a woman or minority as a majority owner, and (2) meet specified income limits for both the business and the majority owner.

#### Summary of Semiannual DBE Report Findings

The current FTA semiannual reporting period runs from October 1, 2011, to March 31, 2012. For projects using federal funds, there were a total of 26 contracts that were entered into during the reporting period (Attachment A), and 22 contracts that were completed during the reporting period (Attachment B).

**Budget Impact**

#### DISCUSSION:

This report summarizes MTS's operating results for May 2012 compared to the amended fiscal year 2012 budget. Attachment A-1 combines the operations, administration, and other activities results for May 2012. Attachment A-2 details the May 2012 combined operations results, and Attachments A-3 to A-8 present budget comparisons for each MTS operation. Attachment A-9 details budget comparisons for MTS Administration, and A-10 provides May 2012 results for MTS's other activities (Taxicab/San Diego and Arizona Eastern Railway Company/debt service).

#### MTS NET-OPERATING SUBSIDY RESULTS

As indicated within Attachment A-1, the year-to-date May 2012 MTS net-operating income unfavorable variance totaled \$823,000 (-0.7%). Operations produced a \$702,000 (-0.6%) unfavorable variance and the administrative/other activities areas were unfavorable by \$121,000.



#### MTS COMBINED RESULTS

#### Revenues

Year-to-date combined revenues through May 2012 were \$88,290,000 compared to the year-to-date budget of \$89,162,000 representing an \$872,000 (-1.0%) negative variance. This is primarily due to an unfavorable variance within passenger revenue.

#### Expenses

Year-to-date combined expenses through May 2012 were \$203,171,000 compared to the year-to-date budget of \$203,219,000, resulting in a \$49,000 (0.0%) favorable variance.

<u>Personnel Costs</u>. Year-to-date personnel-related costs totaled \$102,966,000 compared to a year-to-date budgetary figure of \$102,607,000, producing an unfavorable variance of \$359,000 (-0.3%). This is primarily due to unfavorable year-to-date variances within Administration.

Outside Services and Purchased Transportation. Total outside services for the first 11 months of the fiscal year totaled \$65,588,000 compared to a budget of \$66,338,000, resulting in a year-to-date favorable variance of \$750,000 (1.1%). This is primarily due to other outside service expense favorable variances within Administration, as well as favorable experience with repairs and maintenance costs within Operations.

<u>Materials and Supplies</u>. Total year-to-date materials and supplies expenses totaled \$7,098,000 compared to a budgetary figure of \$7,130,000, resulting in a favorable expense variance of \$32,000 (0.4%).

<u>Energy</u>. Total year-to-date energy costs were \$21,827,000 compared to the budget of \$21,154,000 resulting in a year-to-date unfavorable variance of \$672,000 (-3.2%). Year-to-date energy rates are as follows:

Diesel: cost per gallon was \$3.41 versus a budgeted rate of \$3.45
 Gasoline: cost per gallon was \$3.55 versus a budgeted rate of \$3.44
 CNG: cost per therm was \$0.861 versus a budgeted rate of \$0.909

Risk Management. Total year-to-date expenses for risk management were \$3,336,000, compared to the year-to-date budget \$3,587,000 resulting in a favorable variance totaling \$251,000 (7.0%).

General and Administrative. Year-to-date general and administrative costs, including vehicle and facilities leases, were \$46,000 (1.9%) favorable to budget, totaling \$2,356,000 through May 2012, compared to a year-to-date budget of \$2,402,000.

### YEAR-TO-DATE SUMMARY

The May 2012 year-to-date net-operating income totaled an unfavorable variance of \$823,000 (-0.7%). These factors include unfavorable variances in passenger revenue, other operating revenue, personnel costs, and energy, partially offset by favorable variances in outside services, general and administrative, and risk management.
